#### Dear Parents/Carers

Last week a Year 7 girl was in a road accident on Carpenters Down opposite the Tesco store. She suffered a head injury which caused her to have concussion. She is expected to make a full recovery and return to College this week. Unfortunately, this is the third child who has met with an accident in this one road area.

On Friday 8th October I met with Councillors Jane Frankum and Andy Mccormick and they will be working on road safety measures with the Council. At College, we are starting a petition for a Road Crossing Person to be stationed on Carpenters Down. If you are in College, please sign the petition either at the main reception or the Community reception.

Road safety is a great concern for all of our young people; they are very precious to all of us. We give safety advice to the children at Everest through regular assemblies. Can I please ask for your assistance in reminding students as they leave for College, to be extra aware when crossing roads, and if they are redirected, eg A footpath is closed, they must follow the alternative route.

Can I ask all parents and carers who drop their children off at College and collect them at the end of the day by car, to observe a 5 mile speed limit once you are through the gates. We now have a Hampshire Bus in addition to our two mini buses that transports students. Please do not park where the buses pick up and drop off. If cars are parked in this area, students must walk between cars to get onto the buses which is very dangerous. I would appreciate everyone's cooperation with this request.

You may have read in last week's Gazette, more questions being raised by a very small minority of people in the local community, about our examination results this year. I was approached by the Gazette and felt it important to meet with Emily Roberts to explain to her again, the unique and one off set of results we had this year and why. She explained to me that the Gazette felt that they had to do a follow up story on our examination results this year because of comments they had received on their website from a number of their readers.

I have received email's of support from parents and have also read positive comments posted on the Gazette website. I, like many of you, are fed up with the negativity that a few people in the community have about Everest. Anyone who has concerns is always welcome to come in and see the College in action for themselves and speak with either myself or a member of the Leadership Team. For the past three years we have had a very positive relationship with the Basingstoke Gazette and I hope that this continues, so that we can celebrate publicly the many successes and achievements of our children. If you are, like myself and the students, fed up with negative stories I would urge you to contact the Gazette personally.

#### Bonfire/Firework Safety.

#### REMEMBER:

- Fireworks are explosives.
- Always buy fireworks that comply with the British Standard.
- Follow all instructions and always put safety first.

#### ALWAYS:

- Light sparklers one at a time and wear gloves.
- Dispose of sparklers in a bucket of water as soon as they are finished.
- Never give sparklers to a child under five.
- Ensure that all children with fireworks are well supervised.
- Keep fireworks in a closed box or tin.
- Use them one at a time, replacing the lid immediately.
- Follow the instructions on each firework, using a torch never use a naked flame.
- Light fireworks at arm's length using a taper or a firework lighter.
- Do not drink alcohol if setting off fireworks.
- Stand well back.

#### **NEVER:**

Never go back to a lit firework, it could explode in your face.

Never put fireworks in your pocket.

Never throw fireworks.

#### **BONFIRE TIPS:**

Never use/pour petrol or other flammable liquids onto a fire to get it going.

Always start and keep bonfires away from buildings, sheds and fences etc.

Check the bonfire for animals/pets that may be hiding within it before lighting it.

Be aware of neighbouring/nearby thatch properties.

# Terry's Memoirs Chapter Part 3 "My Fault Again"

I do not know what it is about Christmas festivities that get me in the mire, but on the last day of work at the Town Hall in Fulham Broadway we went across to the "King's Head" pub at lunch time where I entertained on the piano, leading to a glorious singsong. However, none of us were watching the time. On realising our dilemma, we all walked back over the road (more like stagger) back to the office, somewhat later than scheduled. The Town Clerk was beside himself with rage, and gave each culprit a good telling off. Then he came to me. In his opinion, I was the instigator of all things merry and, without a mention of Christmas greetings closed the office as none of us were sober to attend the public enquiries. Back to the pub for the rest of the day!

I then completely lost my head, having been left on the shelf by a long - time sweetheart. I joined the army to forget and I became a member of the Royal Warwickshire Fusilier's Band at their barrack's in Sutton Coldfield. This started the most unpleasant part of my life that would make the going on at the Deepcut Barrack's look like a kid's party. I attended rehearsals each day, directly after Muster Parade. I came under the gaze of two Corporals who took me to the back of the camp and forced me on to my hands and knees on a path with stones. The Musical Director came looking for me, and threw the book at my two protagonists. After this I got lots of abuse from various officers, but I carried on regardless. However at the weekend, not going on leave, I was in my barrack room when one of the lads was taken ill.

With no one qualified in first aid on the camp, a Sergeant arrived. On seeing the young soldier in tears and in great pain, he smashed a heavy fist into the boy's stomach causing him to collapse on the floor. I opened my big mouth asking as to what good such an attack would have. I then got attacked and ended up on the floor as well!

Monday morning's Muster Parade found the Platoon Commander ordering me to his office for an explanation of the weekend's events. Sometime later that day I was told that the Sergeant concerned in the assault had been "immediately" transferred to a unit in Germany where he knifed and murdered, a German civilian in a bar. I then realised that us lads had been very lucky. The whole incident made me feel quite ill, and as a consequence I collapsed in parade with a SLR (self-loading rifle) at my side. I was rushed to RAF Cosford Hospital. My problems were just about to begin all over again. But that's another story.

Dear Friends

I have been struck by all the recent images on TV of the rescue of the thirty three trapped miners from deep in the bowels of the earth at a copper mine in Copiapo, Chile. Over the 69 days of their entrapment in the mine a small town has grown up around those on the surface working to save the miners. This small, tented, town has become known as Camp Hope and their families and friends have gathered along with media crews from across the world to witness the efforts to save their husbands, fathers and sons! As the first miner was brought to the surface there were scenes of ecstatic joy as he was reunited with his family and friends and embraced by them, the rescuers and even the Chilean president. The look of joy and happiness on their faces as they welcomed back the ones they thought they would never see again were just amazing. Dramatic and emotionally charged scenes indeed; scenes that were repeated time after time as each was winched safely to the surface and reunited with loved ones.

I am sure that in Heaven scenes just like this one occur every moment of time and throughout eternity as loved ones are reunited once again. Words like hope, rescue, save, reunited, restored, joy and happiness are very familiar to the Christian and they are particularly poignant at this time of the year for St Gabriel's as we prepare for our annual Bereavement Service on All Saints Sunday at 3pm in St Gabriel's and on 14th November at 1030 our Service and Act of Remembrance for Remembrance Sunday again in St Gabriel's. Please do come along to either or both of these occasions.


More importantly those words of 'hope, rescue and save' take on even greater meaning as Christmas approaches. It is at this time of the year that we begin to prepare again to celebrate the birth of our Saviour Lord Jesus Christ who came to this earth, born as a human baby, to rescue and save each one of us that we might not be lost but reunited and restored to God.

We may sometimes feel in our lives that we are, not unlike those miners, trapped, not underground but by circumstances: families, relationships, finance, health or just the hectic pace of life. If this is you then the good news is that the Rescuer is here and waiting to hear from you. He is waiting to rescue, restore and save you and all you need do is call out to him.

new rights - In England

The government has introduced a new law, called the Equality Act 2010, which gives you better protection against discrimination.

Discrimination means treating someone worse than other people because of things like race, religion, age, sex or sexuality. Some of the new rights in the Act include:

the charity for

your community

- more protection at work if you are a carer. So, for example, you shouldn't be disciplined or dismissed if you have to take time off to care for a disabled parent
- more protection if you're changing your gender, (gender reassignment). You'll no longer have to be under medical supervision to be protected from discrimination and harassment
- more protection at work if you're pregnant or taking maternity leave. So for example, your employer shouldn't discipline or dismiss you for taking too much time off sick when your illness was related to your pregnancy. You can now make a claim for pregnancy and maternity discrimination if this happens
- more protection for women who are breast feeding. You can't be asked to stop or to leave a public place like a café, shop or bus, just because you're breast feeding.

## Revamp of Popley estate completes

Seven years ago, local residents were plagued by antisocial behaviour, and were fearful of walking through the disused buildings, alleyways and garage blocks in and around the Longfellow Parade area of Popley Poets. This sparked a £15m regeneration of the area by Sentinel Housing Association and Basingstoke & Deane Borough Council.

Since then, the area has been transformed with the creation of a new bustling row of shops and 50 outdated flats replaced with 99 new homes aimed largely at families. The relocated One-Stop shop has reported a big increase in trade since opening in May last year, Sentinel and partners marked the completion of the project by dropping in to check on a new resident.

Sentinel Chief Executive Martin Nurse said: "This project is about providing great places to live, and it's clear from the comments we've received that residents and neighbours genuinely feel this project has made a real difference."

Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council's Cabinet member for Housing and Health and Culture Cllr Cathy Osselton said: "After seven years I am very pleased that the regeneration scheme in Longfellow Parade has been completed and that residents are delighted with their new surroundings.

"It takes many years of careful planning by the housing associations in partnership

with the council to undertake regeneration projects within the borough and it is always a triumph for everyone involved when a project comes to fruition."

Meanwhile, Sentinel is continuing the regeneration in Popley Islands, where new residents are expected to start moving in during January 2011.



## **Junction 6**

## Stay Safe On The Roads.

#### Don't drive tired -

- Plan in a 15 min rest break for every 2hrs of driving.
- Avoid making long trips between midnight- 6am and 2-4pm when natural alertness is low.
- Share the driving if possible.

#### Don't drink drive -

- Nearly one in six of all deaths on the road involve drivers who are over the legal alcohol limit.
- The only safe option is not to drink any alcohol if you plan to drive and never offer an alcoholic drink to anyone else who is driving.
- ➤ Driving whilst above the legal limit or unfit through drink carries a maximum penalty of 6 months' imprisonment, a fine of up to £5,000 and a minimum 12 months driving ban.

#### Don't use your mobile phone while driving -

- On 27 Feb 2007, the £30 fine was increased to £60 and three penalty points on your licence. Penalty points = higher insurance costs.
- > If you get six points within two years of passing your test, your licence will be revoked and you will need to re-sit the test.
- If the case goes to court, you could risk a maximum fine of £1,000, which rises to £2,500 for the driver of a bus, coach, or heavy goods vehicle.

#### Always buckle up -

- Drivers and front seat passengers in cars must wear a seat belt, unless they have a medical exemption certificate.
- Children under the age of 14, travelling in the rear of a car that has appropriate restraints, must belt up.
- Adults travelling in the rear of a car must also use seat belts. If they are fitted, it is the responsibility of the adult passenger (not the driver) to ensure that they are using the seat belt.

#### Phillips' Legal Corner



#### Question:

I am nearing retirement age but would like to continue working – where do I stand legally? Answer:

'At the moment your employer must give you notification of your proposed retirement date within 6 to 12 months of that date, but if you don't want to retire you have the right to request to stay on in your job after your employer's retirement date,' says Kelly Rayner, employment solicitor at Phillips 'and your employer has to consider your request.'

'You may have read recently that the government is now encouraging individuals to work beyond 65 and is going to phase out the default retirement age ('DRA') which currently enables employers to dismiss employees when they reach 65.

The impact of these Government proposals for you is that your employer will be unable to issue a new notice of retirement using the DRA on or after 6<sup>th</sup> April 2011 and then after 1<sup>st</sup> October 2011, your employer will not be able to use the DRA to retire you compulsorily.

But Regulation 3 of the Employment Equality (Age) Regulations 2006 will remain and so employers can continue to have a compulsory retirement age providing they can objectively justify the difference of treatment on the grounds of age: if they can prove that it is necessary to meet legitimate employment policy, labour markets or vocational training objectives, and that a compulsory retirement is an appropriate and necessary means of achieving these objectives. There will, of course, still be scope to dismiss employees on grounds of capability, conduct, illegality (e.g. no right to work in the UK) and redundancy.

Working after State Pension Age does not affect your right to the state pension. However, you can choose to delay drawing your state pension while you're still working and this will entitle you to a higher annual income or a lump sum payment when you do retire.

There are several reasons for encouraging individuals to work beyond 65: people are living longer; the financial benefits to employees and the country as a whole; the health and social benefits people gain from working; retirement should be a matter for employers and employees to determine rather than the state; and not forgetting the removal of the costs and associated administration burden of the statutory retirement procedure.

In conclusion,' says Kelly, 'you'll have more choice on whether to retire upon reaching pensionable age (either State pension age or the occupational pension age) or to continue working. There will be a time of transition so if you need help, call me on 01256 854608.'

Diaries from the Old Codger

It was back in the early part of the 1950s when we as a family left London. As a boy I spent most of my time with my Nan and Granddad in West Ham. The house had two rooms downstairs and one up. The scullery was tacked onto the back of the house and the loo was out in the garden. Boy was that a cold place in the winter! At night we had to use the chamber pots under the bed. We never went in the front room of the house, that was kept for high days and holidays. We would all cram into the small room at the back. At Christmas the whole family would come to stay. There were seven of us alone in my family, but with all the aunts and uncles it was a bit of a tight fit, and that was one of the high days. Nan



would let them use the front room, kids were not allowed in it. We all sat on the stairs or were out in the back yard playing games. Then of course we had the street, all the kids out with there with new toys. Many made for them by their dads or uncles, but we didn't care it never bothered us. Sleeping was another thing, You would be surprised how many kids you can get in a bed! And every chair was taken up by the adults. These were the days when family life was hard on us, if you were not at work hard luck, you got no money. It fell on the family and they would all help each other out. The NHS was in its infancy and at that time still very crude. I can vouch for that, when they took my appendix out boy you would think it was a butcher's shop. Another time I had an operation, I was about five years old. I won't say what it was but boy it would make your eyes water fellas to think of it. Happy days though.

I said last month Her Indoors is now officially a pensioner. Can't let her stop work though, I have standards she needs to maintain! Great party with all the family and a few days after her birthday our son came over from Australia for four days, so it rounded off a good week, with yet another get together. Mind you it gives me a chance to have yet another dig at her the OAP. I wonder why the senior citizens and we as disabled have to take the brunt of the usual government cuts, no matter who runs the country. If it is not us, it is the young families. They now want people to work longer in life. Yes some may wish to, but on doing so how can our youngsters get jobs as more and more senior citizens take up jobs in say these big DIY stores and other working sections. There is no logic in all of this, a bit catch 22. My family have been lucky in so much as when we came to the town it was new and fresh. There were two great schools to go to, but both are now closed down. I do not believe we are going in the right direction with this new idea of the academy schools. I believe it tends to isolate a child that may never achieve the high standards of what they require of them. To me they do not take into consideration the skills kids have in other ways. Many kids will leave school with nothing but their wits and their mind that can solve things ten times quicker that of brain box of the class because this is the way people's minds work. I would like to give you one example of this. Our youngest left school with lowest grade GCSEs, he went on to the college to train as an electrician. They told him that with his predicted grades he may struggle, but he got in. Year One was fine but Year Two they nearly all failed and wanted them to repeat the year, We said "No go onto Year Three" I sent him to another college, as a night school pupil, because I believed in him. He passed with flying colours, just three months after he failed. He ended up running the company where he worked for a time. All his clever so called brainier friends now ring him up and ask him to do many electrical jobs, or can he come and program their computers if they break down. He turns his hand to most things and his brain is so quick. Had he gone to an Academy School instead of an all around one would he have failed as well? He can make a computer "sing" and makes it look so easy. People need to look ahead at the potential in kids. Some will disagree as they will have seen the benefit from the other side but....? Only what the school before tells them. We were born with hands and minds some can use both to extremes but many can only dream of this. These are kids that should be encouraged. So please government don't make too many specialist schools as this could leave future generations sadly lacking in basic skills.

Look out for the Old Codger next month. As we arrive into the month to celebrate 40 years of married life and nearly 40 years in the town.

I have never seen it left for two weeks as stated in the letter, I live opposite side and can see when its leaking.

The sewer in question is on a public footpath near a crossing point in Abbey Road which is used by young children going to and from school and I don't think its fair the children have to walk around the mess the leak makes. We should be able to report the leak to the council who could pass on the details to whoever is responsable for the sewer so that the mess can be sorted. I hate to think what sort of health risk is caused with the raw sewage covering the path and running down Abbey Road.

Another thing that was in the letter is about how slovenly the residents of Popley are getting towards dirtiness of the area. It's not the residents in this area that are making the mess but mums, dads, school children from other areas who walk to either Merton Schools or Everest College. We have a street cleaner who does a fantastic job of keeping this area tidy the best he can.

Editors reply:- The responsibility at present is for the resident to contact Thames Water, as much as I agree it was better when the Councils previously had responsibility for the drains.




#### **Councillors Page:**

There was another accident at the junction of Popley Way and Carpenters Down where a first year student at Everest Community College was knocked down. Luckily she was not badly hurt. This was the third serious accident in three years. The 1.2 million pounds of improvements to that junction, new paths, dropped kerbs, traffic islands and the moving of the bus stop should be completed by the end of the year. Most of the new safer crossing points in Popley Way are near completion. There will be even more safer crossings in Carpenters Down that will be finished around Easter. There will also be new paths to help make safer journeys there. I know I seem to be saying this in most of the Popley Matters as we have tried to keep you informed, after it has taken over three years to get Hampshire County Council to agree, find and access the funding and draw up the plans. Then there was the effort to get the Police Road Safety Officer to finally agree to the 30mph speed limit. Although none of the accidents I believe were the fault of the drivers, or down solely to speed. The signage for the 30mph has caused a lot of comment mostly about the lack of it and the poor quality of the signage that is there. We complained and have now been assured that new signs are being ordered and with our insistence school crossing signs to be added.

There is a petition going around asking for a School Crossing Patrol Officer at the accident hot spot. If you want to sign it there are copies in Everest Community College reception. The Fitness and Health Wing, Community Centres, Fastfare Pharmacy, LA Hair and Beauty, the school crossing patrol officer at Marnel School
