Water garden opens for HART

IF you love wildlife and would like to visit the finest water garden in the world (according to the International Water Lily Society) there's an important date to put in your diary.

On 15 May the Longstock Park Water Garden is open by kind permission of the John Lewis Partnership for the benefit of HART Wildlife Rescue. The garden, which is near Stockbridge, is only open on 12 occasions during the year and provides the chosen charities with an excellent opportunity to raise funds.

"We are delighted our application was successful, and feel very privileged to have been chosen," said founder June Gibbs. "The day is likely to be one of our biggest fundraising events of the year and it is particularly fitting that much of the proceeds will help us to transform the field adjacent to the new wildlife hospital in our own wildlife haven."

People flock from miles around to see the beautiful secluded lakes which attract an abundance of wildlife in all its forms. In May, the many varieties of primula, which began flowering in March, will still be going strong and the irises will be adding to the colourful landscape.

With entry only £5 for adults and children under 14 just £1, a visit to the garden makes an excellent day out. Teas are available at Longstock Park Nursery where visitors may be able to purchase some of the plants they have admired and many more besides.

No dogs, except those providing assistance, or picnics are permitted within the water garden.



<u>A View from Your Fire</u> <u>Station</u>

Looking back, the Christmas festivities and the snow and ice seem a long time ago. Yet this period of time was testing for all the emergency services including

your Basingstoke fire crews. The Basingstoke Landrover with its 4x4 off road capability was invaluable in maintaining the ability of crews to reach even the most difficult of locations during the adverse weather. The festive period saw the actual number of property fires in the Popley area decrease even though we all now introduce fire risks into the home such as candles and potentially overload electrical sockets. It is pleasing to note that our Community Safety messages are being heard and listened to. The number of car accidents did increase but that was mainly due to the adverse weather and almost all were low speed collisions which thankfully resulted in few injuries.

As we look forward, what are the fire service doing now for the Popley residents and wider Basingstoke community?

Well the Princes Trust are running their 14th Team at Basingstoke from the Popley Scout hut. The team leader is a fire fighter from Basingstoke and all thirteen young people on the scheme come from the local area. By the time this article goes to press they will have completed their community project at Roman House in Winklebury Way having landscaped and improved the outside garden area for the residents. The team will be nearing the end of the 12 week programme and have learnt invaluable skills that will help them in the rest of their lives.

Later in the summer time it is hoped that Basingstoke Fire Station will get a series of new fire appliances. Two new major appliances are planned to arrive, and one will have a newer heavy rescue capability. It will also have a new fire fighting medium called CAFs, which stands for 'Compressed Air Foam'. This will complement our already wide range of extinguishing media used on a variety of fires. A new small rapid response vehicle is also planned called the 'small fires vehicle' which as its name suggests will attend all minor incidents.

As for the coming spring and summer months can we please remember fire safety when considering outside barbeques or bonfires. Many people are injured in such activities all of which are avoidable.

In closing I just want to focus on home safety – we have attended several house fires in Popley over the last few weeks, and the messages to you are the same as before. Never leave cooking unattended in the kitchen and please always ensure you have working smoke alarms in the home. Have a home escape plan and remember in an emergency, Get Out, Stay out and Call the Fire Brigade Out ! Keep well and keep safe.

BEWARE Scams

Scams are schemes to con you out of your money and no one likes to feel that they have wasted or, even worse, been conned out of their money.

Scams can come by post, phone or email and there are hundreds of different schemes such as fake lotteries and prize draws, get-rich-quick schemes, bogus health cures, investment scams, pyramid selling.

Every year, three million people fall victim in the UK, often losing hundreds or even thousands of pounds. The scammers are clever, and all kinds of people from all walks of life get duped. Don't let the scammers con you. Follow these tips to avoid getting tricked out of your money.

Be sceptical

Beware of extravagant promises. Remember: If it sounds too good to be true, it probably is. Don't be afraid to bin it, delete it or hang up.

Take your time

Scammers don't like to give you time to think. They will try to pressure you into making a decision by telling you that if you don't act now, you'll miss out. Resist any pressure to make a decision right away. Consider asking a friend or family member for advice, or even an accountant or solicitor if big sums of money are involved.

Know who you're dealing with

Be suspicious if you're contacted out of the blue by someone you've never heard of. This is often a clear warning sign that it's a scam. And don't be fooled by official looking websites and marketing materials. Scammers are very good at making their scams look authentic.

Protect your financial information

Never give your bank account details and passwords to someone you don't know. Trustworthy firms will never contact you to ask for this information.

Spotted a scam?

If in doubt, don't reply. Instead, bin it, delete it or hang up. You can also report the scam to Consumer Direct at

www.consumerdirect.gov.uk/scams

If you think you've been caught by a scam, call Consumer Direct for advice on 08454 04 05 06.

The second phase of the Popley Islands regeneration is well underway, and a further 55 new homes will be completed between now and the end of May. We expect the third phase of homes to be ready in the late summer and early autumn. Our new planning application for the final phase which includes the old Barbican Public House is due for review in mid April. We'll let you know more once we hear back from the planning committee. If you're interested in moving into one of the new homes, make sure you're on the housing waiting list.

Now building work has finished in Tortuga Walk, you may have noticed landscapers working in the area, planting shrubs and laying turf. We're sorry to say that vandals and thieves are trying to bring the area down by stealing turf and causing damage. Congratulations to Merton Infants for such a good Ofsted report I know it has been achieved by everyone working together. I think everybody is so proud of you all. Congratulations to Marnel who are also doing very well.

I was disappointed that Everest Community College did not start to do any consultation till only a few short weeks before a decision was to be made. I also felt that as it is a community school in the heart of Popley all the people who will be involved like the other schools, nurseries and SureStart Centres should have had more time to respond. Also as the school was built by Hampshire County Council out of what is "our" money, we should have had a say as a whole community, not just the children that are there now. HCC invested 27.8 million in the new school and a further 1.4 million on safer paths and crossings for our children to go to school. I met with the Head and nothing so far convinced me that there is any real advantage in going with the academy quoted in the 19 page consultation booklet. I firmly believe that an open questions and answers session for all people would have be fairer. Why the rush? This is the future of our children for generations to come.

Dear Residents,


Regretfully I have decided to resign from the Council to look after my husband Frank who has Alzheimer's. This is not a decision I have taken lightly.

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Thinking of letting your property to holidaymakers?

- Electrical wiring and appliances must be in good working order and comply with , your visitors won't want to turn up and find the TV or washing machine doesn't work
- You need to keep a proper gas certificate which needs updating every 12 months
- If your holiday property was built after 1992 you need to install smoke detectors and alarms
- Your furniture and fittings must pass the 'match' test and pass strict standards of fire resistance
- You will need an up to date Energy Performance Certificate

There are other things to consider following the government's new rules on the taxation of furnished holiday lettings (FHLs). Government figures suggest that, under the new proposals, approximately 25% of existing holiday properties will not qualify. There will be changes to occupancy thresholds and restrictions on loss relief amongst other proposals which are intended to ensure that only people running FHLs as a commercial business will benefit from the favourable tax treatment offered by the FHL regime. It is complicated and legislation changes all the time so we would advise landlords to take professional advice.

Make sure you have proper terms and conditions for your guests and with a relatively small investment on modern fittings and nice décor you can make your property appeal to as many holiday tenants as possible and encourage them to want to come back. A higher occupancy rate will mean a healthy increase in your income.

SHERBORNE ST. JOHN PARISH COUNCIL – March 2011

We are sad to report the passing of **Vi Neale** following a short illness. Vi was a champion for the rights and welfare of seniors in the parish and, by her regular attendance at PC open forums, a champion for the improvement of our bus services.

Following changes to the bus pass scheme there are indications that due to budget constraints Hamphire County Council will be announcing further cuts to rural bus services this summer. The PC will issue a **transport survey** this month for completion by residents and will summarize their requirements and communicate them to HCC. Please look out for this survey and complete and return it.

Following submissions from the PC, BDBC has agreed to **protect a length of tree belt surrounding the old golf course at Elm Bottom**. However, the PC considers that this protection could be extended further south and to the west and has requested this be considered.

Inconsiderate **parking on Vyne Road during Football Club match days** has resulted in a number of complaints (with pictures) being sent to the PC. A meeting was held with representatives of the Football Club and Chute Management Committee to resolve matters. Actions were agreed and the PC will continue to monitor these arrangements.

On Wednesday 23rd February at 9.30pm yet another vehicle travelling north on the A340 left the road at the bend at West End and crashed into the hedge and fence of No.2. The unidentified driver and vehicle quickly left the scene without reporting the accident. The owner of No. 2 West End and two parishioners attended the **Open Forum** to report that this was the seventh serious event in seven years and requested that action be taken before serious injury or loss of life results. The PC explained that this road is the responsibility of Hampshire Highways and previous actions had resulted in localised resurfacing, moving of the northbound 30 mph sign, new speed warning signs, a crossing island and the introduction of a Speed Indicator Device. The SID is now retained solely on the A340. The meeting considered construction of reinforcement barriers and a further site meeting with Hampshire Highways is proposed.

The PC will press again for a **passing lane northbound at Elm Bottom** and will request that HCC consider improving off-peak traffic flow at the Apollo roundabout by limiting the operation of traffic lights to peak times only.

Dog fouling remains a problem in the village and in Merton Rise and Marnel Park. The Clerk will seek to order additional bins and dog owners are reminded of the hefty fines for being caught allowing this anti-social behaviour.

The PC received a letter from David Wilson Homes regarding a new **development to the north of Marnel Park**. The chairman expressed his concern that BDBC had not consulted with the PC regarding this proposal and meetings are being arranged with BDBC and DWH to discuss this threatened development. The PC intends to hold an Open Meeting to advise all residents and interested parties and discuss the position.

Due to inclement weather, work has not yet started on the **Chute Teenage Ball Play Area**. The contractor is ready but the ground is too wet to move their heavy machinery. The delay is threatening the funding from LEADER and the chairman has determined to resolve this issue.

Due to project delays, the PC's financial reserves are more than $\pounds 10,000$ higher than this time last year. It was resolved therefore to bring forward the payment of a further $\pounds 10,000$ grant to reduce the balance on the Village Hall mortgage.

The PC had a useful meeting with the Marnel and Merton Community Group. The MMCG has no funding and struggles with the cost of hiring meeting facilities. The PC will investigate the cost of room hire and lobby for financial support from HCC or consider support from its own reserves.

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


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DIARIES FROM THE OLD CODGER

I would like to start first with, I hope, all of our Basingstoke family in sending our deepest sympathy for the loss of life in this devastation that is going on in Japan. It will take them many years to recover from this disaster but I also know the world will come to what ever aid is needed to help them not only the short term but long term as well. My next paragraph is insignificant at this time but I have written it because it was a different time back then, a time the



world will not want to see ever happen again. We can only do this by the way the world is gathering to help each other now. I feel if we can only do this all the time it would be a much safer world to live and give our children and their children to grow up in.

It was in 1938/9 my father, on the notion war was coming, joined the Navy. He was an East Ender lad and was about to sign full time with West Ham Football Club. He had played for them from a Junior. All of this changed and after the war he had children to feed and was too old to start picking up from where he left off. During the war he trained at Chatham, H.M.S RYLEY. From there he went on to sail in the Castle class ships. his main ships were Berkley Castle and Carisbrooke Castle. They were mine hunters, tenders, and escort working out of Liverpool. He became a Cox First Class and had a twelve man landing craft. I was told by my Grandfather that Dad was seconded to the Army and was on Special Operations, dropping men behind enemy lines. I had listened to my father when he very occasionally talked of his time in the war years but I found out more doing research after his death and contacting the War Office for his records. What he did in the Army we will never know as most of it was classified, he was at Copra Before D Day.

MY research is still on going and I wonder if any readers of Popley Matters have any records of their fathers or grandfathers that were on Castle class ships? If so if you could send any info to me I would be grateful for that.

Well yet another month of rain sun and frost has gone by, Easter is on its way as I saw eggs in the shops at Christmas. Once Easter is over they will start to sell Christmas stuff and Her Indoors will be in her element. Talk about shop till you drop each year. Now Her Indoors has reached that golden age called retirement, unfortunately she cannot she has cut her hours so we can book all my hospital doctors etc. around that day she has off in the week. As for me, well I will be shut in the house even more. So when we get the new travel vouchers £32! Boy if I have to use a taxi that wont last long.. Yes there are community rides but if you need to go out to get anything or go to the hospital you need to book way, way in advance. Now with this new concessionary pass coming in booking a year in advance well may be not that long off , I hope you get my meaning. So I would on behalf of many disabled and senior citizens thank our County Council for make our houses even more of a prison than they are now. On that note I bet this county council that run Hampshire do not and will not suffer this hardship. Mind you I suffer enough with Her Indoors as well !

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Help Us Find Ratty!

The Hampshire and Isle of Wight Wildlife Trust are looking for volunteers to join an existing team of water vole surveyors, to carry out surveys over the summer in the North East of Hampshire, as part of the Loddon and Eversley Heritage Area project.

Water voles used to be a common sight on many of our streams and rivers. However, in the last 20 years there has been a 90% decline in numbers, making the water vole the fastest declining mammal in the UK. Their decline is due to a number of factors including habitat loss and predation by nonnative American Mink. Occasional sightings mean that we knew that there were water voles still present in the Loddon area. However, the exact status of water voles in the area is not known because much of the information was out of date and many areas have not yet been surveyed.

The surveys will take place throughout May, June and July on parts of the Loddon and Lyde, and will involve searching river banks for signs of water voles, as well as other species. This will help us build up a picture of the current status of water voles in this area, and provide us with information to help landowners manage their habitats sympathetically.

Brenda Parker Way

A new long distance path is being opened that stretches across north Hampshire and runs for 78 miles between Aldershot and Andover. It crosses the rich and diverse north Hampshire countryside taking in heathland, forest, tiny fields and small farms before climbing to the highest villages in Hampshire. The route passes many points of interest along the way, such as Fleet Pond, Hampshire's largest lake; Calleva, an ancient Roman Town; and Highclere Castle, home of the discoverer of the tomb of Tutankhamun.

It is supported by a dedicated website <u>www.brendaparkerway.hampshire.org.uk</u> that gives walker all they need to walk the route. As well as the Brenda Parker Way, which can be walked in one go or over time in stages, the website includes details of many other selfguided walks starting from villages along the way. This long distance path is marked along both directions with the mauve Brenda Parker Way waymark disc. Look out for the chaffinch symbol.
