

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Cheque guarantee card scheme closure



On 30th June, the UK Domestic Cheque Guarantee Card Scheme your community was withdrawn. This means that it is no longer possible to guarantee a cheque using a plastic card.

On the run up to the closure of the scheme, banks and building societies have been managing the removal of the facility differently. Some removed the cheque guarantee function (indicated by a logo - a hologram of Shakespeare) from their cards before 30th June. Others may be only removing the logo on renewal. This means that although the logo will still be on your cards after 30th June, it will be redundant.

You can still pay for goods and services by cheque but just cannot use a plastic card to guarantee it. A trader can decide whether it is prepared to accept it. The trader will have the certainty that under cheque clearing rules, a cheque will be cleared and will not bounce at the end of the sixth working day after the cheque has been paid into the trader's account. The trader will know it is safe to release goods or services at this point. There are also other alternatives to guaranteed cheques such as:

- debit or credit cards
- cash payments
- online payments
- phone banking payments.

The end of the Cheque Guarantee Card Scheme does not mean the end of the use of cheques. In December 2009, the Payments Council set a target date for the closure of the central cheque clearing in 2018. However, closure will only be confirmed if, by 2016, suitable alternatives to cheques are in place and are being successfully used by individuals and businesses.



They say the figures show that this route is not used enough to justify continuing to subsidise it, and the number 4 will still be available to get to the hospital! Do you use it? 

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

Phillips' Legal Corner



'My mother has sadly passed away, what are the risks if I deal with the probate myself?'

'It is entirely possible to apply for probate and deal with an estate, without seeing a lawyer, but it's not without risks' warns Ben Holden, one of our solicitors at Phillips specialising in wills and probate. 'Many professionally drafted wills contain trusts to save tax, to avoid those who inherit paying care fees and to reduce the likelihood of potential disputes. They can be very complicated. We have noticed an increase among people, who have tried to do probate themselves, returning to us to seek advice when they have made a mistake or found the paperwork too tricky' says Ben.

'A minority of families apply for probate themselves and if they have both the time and the confidence, they may derive satisfaction from taking responsibility for completing the financial affairs of their loved one. But do be careful because some areas are complex and unless it is a very simple estate it will normally take between 6-9 months. In general, straightforward estates are those where the deceased did not own a property of any kind and their personal wealth falls below the Inheritance Tax threshold which currently stands at £325,000.

We do recommend that you take legal advice if any of the following apply:

- You think there is a Will but have not been able to find it
- There is some doubt about the validity of the Will, or it's likely to be contested
- You don't know where the beneficiaries live
- Part or all of the estate will be subject to Inheritance Tax
- There is no Will and the deceased was married with children and the estate is over £250,000
- Irrespective of whether there is a Will or not, a part of the estate is to pass to children under the age of 18
- The deceased has left money or property in a trust, owned a business or was a partner in a business
- The deceased owned land or property that has an unregistered title or is abroad
- Someone is due to benefit from a 'life interest' in the estate
- The estate is insolvent


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Diaries from The Old Codger.

After many years living in Popley I have met and known many people. At the end of July we saw the passing of a true gentleman in every sense of the word, Ken Frankum. I have known Jane for far too long to remember. What I can say is that Ken and Jane have two strong boys,. They will unite to give each other the strength to pull through all of the pain, then remember the good that Ken has done. Her Indoors and I will



remember with fondness the good they have all done. A sad month for their family a month that so many go through in this life. It only hits home when everyone is so close like the people of Popley are, and they too will join me in what I have said about the Frankum family.

WHEN I WAS YOUNG

Boy so long ago now. Old Codge has less and less of the memories but now and then something very small will come from deep within my mind. The story I want to share with you was, for many years, only know by my brother, my father and me, but I want to tell this and you can make up your minds on what my brother and I saw. It was one day no different from the next, we decided to go up to Kenley aerodrome to see if there were any spitfires or hurricanes standing on the end of the runway. We must have been about nine or ten years old. We knew there was an opening into the aerodrome past the guards and would often climb up and sit in the cockpits pretending we were flying in the sky shooting at each other. That's until the guards saw us and then we would be away like rabbits.

We got out of the fenced area and across the road. There were about twenty air raid shelters all about 6ft long and very dark inside. We would find all sorts of things left behind from the war years. Don't get me wrong these shelters had been abandoned as if everyone had just left it. The Mary Celeste comes to mind. We went into one of the shelters and were messing around when deep in the far end we heard a very frightening growl. We shot out like a rockets and ran back over the road. The noise got louder and louder, then out of this shelter came a man with a large chain and on the end of this chain was a huge man. We talk about it nowadays to remember what he looked like. Our dad was six feet tall but this man was well over that and he can only described was in a Michelin Man suit but blue as if he were a spaceman. He let out a massive growl again and we did not stop running till we got home, except to tell a man and a woman that were walking that way with a little girl to not go up there. Needless to say it was quite a few weeks before we ventured back up there. Mind you we went mob handed about ten of us. We never told them what we saw that day. It just leaves to the imagination what was going on in these shelters. Some say they went down many floors in the ground and they did a lot of testing up there. All we know is what we saw, and no matter if we are believed or not. Would this be just a story or were we imagining it, were we just fantasizing? We know what we saw and that is all that we care about. It is a day that has stayed with us all our lives. I am sure as I can be it was not Her Indoors but YOU NEVER KNOW DO YOU!

BATS Next Gen are, we believe, Basingstoke's premier youth musical theatre group. We were formed in 2002 by a group of parents whose children had appeared as the Von Trappe family in a local production of The Sound of Music.

Our ethos is to provide affordable musical theatre experience for children using the skills of local people. Since our formation, local people have volunteered to teach theatre craft, so keeping costs of running the company to a minimum. We are completely self-funding and do not receive any grants or funding from any outside source – all monies made from ticket sales goes back into the company for the next production – and is entirely run by volunteers

Our age range is 7 to 18 but sometimes we have to restrict the age-range depending on the show we are performing. All children wanting to join the company have to audition, and continue to audition for each and every show, so standards are maintained and also everyone gets a chance to be a principal, as different shows need different skills. We run free pre-audition workshops, so children know what the show is about, who the characters are and work on the audition pieces before the audition.

Previous productions include We Will Rock You, Hairspray, Joseph and the Amazing Technicolour Dreamcoat, pantomimes and variety shows. 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
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Cutting Rubbish Whilst Cutting Costs

Residents often tell us that the collection of waste and recycling is their highest priority service. The council has been looking for ways to make the service more efficient while also driving up recycling and reducing costs.

To help achieve this, the council has entered into a new collection contract for waste and recycling, working in partnership with Hart District Council.

The council will still collect residents' waste weekly, but from Monday 3 October 2011, when the new collection contract comes into force, residents with a grey wheelie bin will only be able to put out the rubbish that fits in it. Sacks, boxes or bags left beside the grey bin will not be collected, and, unless an exception is agreed, only one grey bin will be allowed per household.

So the message to residents is to start recycling all they can in their green bin and at recycling sites across the borough, to help cut their waste.

These are the main changes will be:

• One waste bin per household

• From Monday 3 October 2011, households with six residents or less will have one waste bin emptied each week. The waste bin has a capacity of 240 litres. All households should have a green recycling bin (or sacks for certain properties).

Additional bin policy

Households with more than six residents, who are recycling everything possible, can apply for a second waste bin if they feel that they need the extra capacity.

There is no limit on how much recycling we can collect from you and households can still have two or more recycling bins if required.

No excess waste

All waste must be contained within your grey wheeled bin; waste sacks left on top of or next to your waste bin will not be collected.

Once the recycling has been separated, a 240 litre waste bin will be enough capacity for one week's waste from a household of six residents.

We will still be able to collect extra recycling from you. If you have extra or bulky recycling (e.g. cardboard boxes) please put them out next to your green bin on collection day.

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David Wilson Homes are planning to submit a planning application shortly to develop 450 new homes on the fields north of the existing Marnel Park development in the fields at the side of Jersey Close and Guernsey Close along the back of Marnel Park. Before they put in the formal planning application to Basingstoke and Deane they are holding two public exhibitions to show the details of the proposals for the site.

The aim of the exhibitions is to provide all residents in the area an opportunity to view the plans and give feedback on the proposals. Members of the David Wilson Homes project team will be at the exhibitions and will be able to answer any questions you may have.

David Wilson Homes will be putting details of the exhibition in the Gazette nearer the time and will also be leafleting houses on the new estate. They were given the opportunity at a meeting in Chute Pavilion to advertise any meetings or to give information to all of the residents of Popley. So far they have not approached any one on the committee. I made the deadline very clear and the date has passed. This application will have an effect on everyone as it would be on top of the 784 that will be finished in Merton Rise. This will generate much more traffic, put a strain on doctors and all other services. I read in The Gazette that they may be closing the walk-in clinic that is by the hospital. This was supposed to help serve the residents as they moved into Merton Rise and there is the possibility of more development,122 dwellings in the Spinney, (by the Post Office Sorting Office), on the old golf course by the old Park Prewett, then add in the 133 dwellings proposed and refused so far on the triangle in front of the hospital, then add more of an unspecified (so far) amount on the Hampshire Fire and Rescue Authority land by Popley Fields. This is cramming in every space they can.

If residents don't go to the exhibition or make their opinions known David Wilson Homes will take it that residents approve this massive amount of development.

I would encourage all of you to visit the exhibition and find out more about the proposals to enable you to make an informed decision as to whether or not you wish to object to the proposals once the planning application is formally submitted to Basingstoke and Deane.
