

Kiln Farm Field BDB/75761 and BDB/75762

The planning applications have been registered and can be seen on the Basingstoke and Deane web site planning application numbers BDB/75761 and BDB/75762

The overwhelming majority of residents in Popley. Sherborne St John and some residents in Chineham said NO to 450 units 70 of them flats in the fields at the back of Hewitt Road and to the side of Jersey Close.

They have applied despite knowing this and objection letters (over 125 so far) and residents overwhelmingly saying NO for many reason I have listed some below:-

- (1) Next to a SINC site and the impact on it
- (2) Agricultural fields
- (3) Wild life
- (4) Rare species i.e. slow worms, sky larks
- (5) Outside settlement boundary
- (6) Already got more than 5 years sites (why now)
- (7) Roads (already busy)
- (8) Parking
- (9) Lack of provision for social rented housing
- (10) Strategic gap
- (11) Loss of facilities enjoyed by residents
- (12) Loss of leisure facilities to groups i.e. Boys Brigade and Scouts
- (13) Jersey Guernsey road not suitable for main access
- (14) As above but unsuitable for buses
- (15) Chineham Park School returning, lose this and would suspect a further development on that site
- (16) Outside settlement boundary
- (17) Access road in Jersey Guernsey would mean the loss of trees and hedges
- (18) In 1995 the Planning Inspector established concept of non-inter-visibility between Basingstoke and SSJ and again in 2005
 - (19) LDF premature application
 - (20) All about construction equipment on site save DWH money, not about community
 - (21) Mess noise and disruption for years and would continue for more years
 - (22) Size ,of a town biggest settlement already in the borough?
 - (23) Massive increase in number of housing in last 15 years
 - (24) Infrastructure inadequate
 - (25) Promised "structure planting" failed to deliver
- (26) DWH promised buyers of properties that there would be no building on the fields thereby they had good views
- (27) Transport studies done for LDF highlighted that northern ring road will surpass its capacity without adding anymore development like BAS 104
- (28) Pre determination implied by officers quote "Given the status of the site outlined above, its general planning merits, the current land supply position and the lead in times associated with the site it is considered on balance, it would be appropriate to support the principal of permitting development on this site in advance of the site being formally allocated through the core strategy process".
 - (29) Merton Rise not completed, should do that first
- (30) Did not get back or share in writing any of the comments or figures after the public consultations despite them being requested.
 - (31) Not taking any heed or account of community as promised in Localism Act

Popley has taken a vast amount of regeneration and new builds we are already the size of some towns but with the approximate 800 still to be built we will be bigger than most. All this without the facilities and recognition that a town should have.

The planning application will probably go before the Development Control Committee on 5th April and there will be many people that want to speak or show their opposition. We will try to get out the information to you. News Release

It is with deep regret that I will be standing down after ten years as your Councillor for Popley East in the May Elections.

In May 2011, I was made redundant from my job in London, and in July accepted a better position but with one slight snag: it was in Bradford. It has been challenging keeping things going in Basingstoke, with four hundred mile round trips to council and school governor meetings! I decided to see how the first six months went, and now things are moving to a more permanent basis, it is time for me to resign from the Council in Basingstoke.

In the past 10 years there have been many changes in Basingstoke, especially in Popley. Festival Place has opened, and we've seen over £100m spent in Popley, including a new secondary school, extended primary schools, over 1,000 new homes, with 1,000 more on the way, and the regeneration of Faroe/Maldive closes and Longfellow Parade.

Not all these changes have been good: we lost Chineham Park school and two pubs have closed (though most people won't miss them). We had Community Wardens which did tremendous good in Popley, only to be sacked or reassigned by the Tories. And we've had over £20m spent on upgrades to road junctions in and around Popley: but the roads are still congested and people still queue to get out of Popley in the mornings.

One thing that has changed massively for the better is that crime is much lower and the estate is much improved since 10 years ago. We have our Beat Officers and PCSOs to thank for that.

I'm glad I'm leaving Popley in a better state that when I arrived, but I do have concerns with the Government and Council cuts, cuts to tax credits and benefits, rising costs of living including fuel and food. All of this, with low or non-existent pay rises, and people losing their jobs, means that standards of living are dropping fast.

I leave Popley in the capable hands of a team of hard-working dedicated councillors and a hard-working local candidate. They'll need to make sure that we do not allow Popley suffer in the current hard times and slip back to what it was when I first joined the council, when over 30 years of neglect had taken their toll.

It remains for me to sign off for the last time. I'll still be back in Basingstoke from time to time as I still have family here, and a lot of friends.

The winter months can provide the ideal cover for an opportunist burglar as they look for evidence of vacant and insecure properties. The lack of lights on in a house can indicate that no one is home attracting an opportunist burglar to look further for insecurities to enter the property. So ensure your home and valuables are safe and secure by following these simple steps. Shut all windows and lock them when you are not using the room, at night and when you leave your property.

Lock all front and rear doors at night and when you are out. If you have a UPVC door with a multi-point lock ensure you lift the handle and lock it with the key.

Ensure all car keys and other keys are out of sight and not in reach of windows and letter boxes. It doesn't take much for the keys to be hooked through the letter box.

If you are going out for the evening leave a light on so your home looks occupied. If you go out whilst it is daylight and won't be getting home till dark then timer switches are available to set the time for when you want lights to come on.

When you are out shopping don't leave the bought items and other valuables such as phones, sat navs and bags visible in your vehicle.

After Christmas break all wrapping and boxes down and place in your bin ensuring it is not visible and take large boxes to the refuse - don't give criminals the heads up on what nice new valuables you have in your home.

If you are going away, try to make your home look occupied by using timer switches. Cancel milk and newspaper deliveries. Get a friend or neighbour to collect your post and draw your curtains to make your home look lived in while you are away.



Friends of Merton Exciting News

Back in 2008 Merton Infant School formed a PTA (Parent Teacher Association). Parents and Staff worked closely together to raise vital funds to buy much needed equipment that the school budget would not allow for. It was a very successful PTA raising thousands of pounds over the 3 years. Most recently Merton Infants PTA has been working with Merton Juniors School and we have held a joint summer fun day and a Christmas Bazaar, which also turned out to be very successful. In November 2011 Merton infants and juniors held a discussion forming one community group and working together more often.

On 2nd November 2011 Merton Infants School PTA was disbanded and we formed a Friends of Merton Infants group which will enable not just parents, but grandparents and people from the community to get involved and help out with fundraising and events. Merton Junior School had already formed a Friends of Merton Junior group and all that was left for us to do was form a main board which would run over the top of both the committees. This would be called Friends of Merton. On the 9th November 2011 both Committees (Friends of Merton Infants & Friends of Merton Junior) got together and voted in our constitution and formed Friends of Merton. It was decided at this meeting that it might be a good idea if we had a chairperson that was part of the community rather than a parent or staff member. This role would mean the person would have to attend 3 meetings a year and have the final say over situation that might arise.

The way Friends of Merton will operate will be through the two committees (Friends of Merton Infants & Friends of Merton Juniors) running separately, doing their own fundraising projects internally, e.g. discos, sponsored events, Easter raffle, etc... However twice a year they will come together to run a joint summer fun day and Christmas Bazaar, making these much bigger events.

We also have a Bag2school collection twice a year which both schools do together, in which parents and the community collect up unwanted clothes, shoes, sheets, curtains, bags etc... in good and clean condition and a company comes in to collect them on a certain day. The bags are weighed and for every kilo that they weigh, in the schools get 50p. Our first one was on 22^{nd} November 2011 and we managed to raise £200. Our next collection is on 18^{th} April 2012. So if you are thinking about having a clear out we would like to ask you to donate it to the school as we would be more than happy to receive your donations. Please just bag it up and drop it off at one of the schools' reception areas. Due to lack of storage space, please could we ask that you drop them off on the collection day -18^{th} April 2012.



Dear Friends

It's coming to the end of February already and in church this morning we heard once again the fantastic story of something the Church calls 'The Transfiguration'. It's the amazing story of Jesus going up a mountainside with his three closest friends. Whilst there his appearance becomes transformed as God's holiness shines in him and through him. His companions are absolutely stunned and then to cap it all he is seen to be in conversation with Moses and Elijah, two of the greatest prophets of the Old Testament who had appeared alongside him. As this incredible event draws to its close God's voice is heard to say, "This is my son whom I love, listen to him." One of the points we can take from this story is God's power to transform any and everyone of us.

In the few short weeks of Lent, marked by Shrove Tuesday (Pancake Day) and Ash Wednesday we have time to prepare for another great event, Palm Sunday. This is the day that marks the beginning of the holiest of weeks in the calendar of the Christian church. Palm Sunday is the day we celebrate Jesus' entry into Jerusalem at the beginning of the last week of his earthly life. As Jesus and his followers approach Jerusalem crowds rush out to lay down a carpet of palm fronds (hence Palm Sunday) and cloaks as they welcome him with cries of "hosanna to the Son of David" Sadly those cries all too quickly turn to shouts of "Crucify Him".

Lent is the time of preparation for these events. It is a time, not to give up chocolate, alcohol or cigarettes, but rather to deeply examine our hearts and lives and surrender to God those attitudes – things we think, say or do – that cause hurt to others. It is a difficult but worthwhile journey to make and has the power to change the direction of our lives. It is not one we make alone! Jesus promised his followers that he would be with them wherever they go and there is nowhere that Jesus has not been. So no matter what situation you may think you are in, Jesus promises that it can be changed and that he will be with you on that journey. I hope that this Lent, rather than giving up smoking or chocolate or alcohol, perhaps you might take some time out to think about your life; your past, present and future and invite Jesus to shine his light into those places in your heart where you would rather not go and that you would allow him to forgive, to heal and to restore you.

St Gabriel's is now running something called 'Christianity Explored' a series of short DVD presentations that take us through the whole of St Mark's Gospel over seven weeks and includes some exploration and opportunity to ask any and all of those questions you've always wanted, but never dared, ask about being a Christian. It's free and we provide coffee and cake so please feel free to join in on a Thursday evening.

I pray that Lent and Easter will be a time of real blessing for you and your families. Please do come along to any (or all) of our Easter Services, you'll be most warmly welcomed.

'Meet the Newts'at Popley Pond.

Popley ponds, near Basingstoke is a popular breeding ground for the protected Great Crested Newts. Owned by Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council, and managed by Popley Conservation Volunteers, the ponds form a valuable network for the newts.

Great Crested Newts are our largest and most protected newt in the UK. They can grow up to 15cm, and are quite dark in colour, with a bright orange belly with black spots. In the spring, the males develop a jagged crest along their back, with another crest and white flash on their tail. Great Crested Newts spend much of their lives on land, but come into ponds to breed in the spring. They have favourite breeding ponds that they enter from February to April, where they will spend anything from a few days to several months. Come July, most newts will have started to move out of the ponds, and make their way to favoured overwintering sites in the form of crevices under log piles, old bricks, rocks, natural debris etc. They can be quite active at night in warmer temperatures, as they come out to forage in rough grassland, and scrubland. It is while they are making their journey to and from the pond, that they are often seen in people's gardens.

Great Crested Newts, although widely distributed throughout Britain, are suffering from large declines. These declines are mainly due to habitat loss, fragmentation of existing ponds, and disturbance. They are protected by both British and European Law, making it an offence to intentionally or deliberately disturb, destroy, capture, or damage Great Crested Newts, or their habitat. It is therefore really important that we know how to help these creatures, and protect the ponds and surrounding area that they live in.

Have you seen a newt in your neighbourhood?

Come along to Popley Ponds and find out more about the newts in the area. See some up close, and find out why you might find them in your garden, and what to do to help them. Suitable for all the family.

Friday 30th March, 6.30- 8.30pm

Discover the world of newts. An opportunity to use torches to see the newts swimming in the pond. Learn about their life cycles, and what to do if you find one. We will be setting bottle traps to see what we catch over night. Bat detectors will also be available so we can listen out for the different bats flying around the pond.



Saturday 31st March, 8-10am. Come and meet these amazing creatures up close as we see what we caught over night in the pond. Local experts on hand to answer your questions.

For both days, find us at the main pond, north of Tobago Close, Popley.

Phillips Legal Corner



What help is there for first time buyers in 2012?

'Buying your first home is a very exciting step to take but it has become much more difficult to scrape together the deposit' says Alex Preshaw, director at Phillips Solicitors 'Many young buyers get help from the 'bank of Mum and Dad' to raise the hefty deposit required to buy their first house. If this is not possible then you could consider one of the new schemes, such as FirstBuy. Under this new scheme, you will need only 5% deposit, the government and selected house builders will offer you a 20% equity loan which will then enable you to take out a 75% mortgage on the rest of the property. You repay the loans when you sell the property, with the government's share available for reinvestment in more affordable housing. Here's my advice to you:

- Be clear about how much you can afford and just borrow a manageable amount and get a mortgage offer in principle before you start hunting, it'll give you an advantage over other buyers.
- Government schemes can be complex transactions, so choose a solicitor early then

 won't be any nasty surprises.
- Look round some of the local new build developments, you'll find there are some attractive deals and innovative ways of financing the purchase.
- View your house/flat more than once in daylight and dark, at busy and quiet times.

'Finally', says Alex, 'if you intend to buy with a friend or partner you will need to consider how you can protect your share. Sherborne St John Parish Council

1. SS2.2 North of Popley - also known as Land North of Marnel Park, Basingstoke, as well as BAS104, Marnel Park Phase II and Kiln Farm Fields, is now a formal planning application under no.s BDB/75761 and BDB/75762.

The Parish Council is deeply concerned about this proposed development - which is yet one more threat to SSJ as a thriving independent community:

- Firstly the Inspector at the 1995 Public Enquiry into the (then proposed) BDBC Local Plan laid great importance on
 - Maintaining the gap between SSJ and Basingstoke Town (avoiding 'inter-visibility')
 - Avoiding breaching the ridge-line
- Allowing the area time to recover after the Merton Rise/ Marnell Park development was completed. You will note from last week's Villager that Marnel Park has just been completed Merton Rise can only be 30 to 40% complete
 - Secondly the site is green fields
- Thirdly the site is part of a proposal for inclusion in the 2013 Local Development Framework (Local Plan) which is currently out to Public Consultation. This is where BDBC seeks our comments which we assume they will give due consideration. Since BDBC is now allowing the planning application to proceed it seems that they intend to take not one bit of notice of what we say. In other words BDBC is asking you what you want on the one hand whilst indicating that it has already decided what it will do anyway: not much of a democratic process and no recognition of local wishes!

SSJPC have written (twice – once by registered mail) to BDBC Chief Executive – but, as yet, we have not received a reply.

In the meantime, the Parish Council urges you to write to BDBC Planning Department to voice your concerns about the development and the timing of the development. There is a lot of passionate opposition to this application – both in SSJ and Popley. You should have received a flyer on this subject – which is reproduced in the Villager – it is never too late to write!

3. Parish Council Elections – Thursday 3rd May 2012. A new Parish Council is elected every 4 years – the last was in May 2008. This year's election will be for 5 Councillors to represent SSJ Village only. (You will recall that Merton Rise, Speckled Wood Road and Marnell Park will leave SSJ Parish on 1st April.). Local government, democratic representation and community aspirations seem to be under particular threat from any number of directions at the moment. Communities don't just happen, they need care and attention, vision, team spirit. I'm sure you will agree that Sherborne St John is a community worth fighting for – so, you really must ask yourself whether it is time you put your own name up for election. The process is quite simple – if you need some advice or background information, do get in touch with me at julcrawley@gmail.com.

Cllr Chris Cooke (Vice Chairman and Treasurer) has announced his intention not to stand for re-election. He has done a great job for the Parish Council over the last 8 years – for which we all thank him. For myself, I believe that 12 years as Chairman is long enough – and that the Village deserves a new Chairman. So the Parish Council will definitely be appointing a new Chairman in May. I hope that I will be able to help and support the new Chairman as and when required.

Know your rights about secondhand cars

The Office of Fair Trading (OFT) is warning people about problems they might face when buying a secondhand car. The most common problem is that the car turns out to be faulty. Other common problems include the seller giving wrong information about the car or not telling people about problems the car's got. People also often find that they're not happy with the service they receive when buying a secondhand car.

The OFT has the following tips to help you when buying a secondhand car from a dealer:

- before you buy, ask the dealer the right questions such as what mechanical, history or mileage checks have they done?
- any car that you buy from a dealer should be:
 - of satisfactory quality
 - fit for purpose
 - and as described

if it isn't, then it's faulty.

If you discover that the car is faulty, go back to the dealer as soon as possible. If they're not able to help you, contact Consumer Direct on 0845 040506

Warranties are an additional benefit and do not replace your rights Cheaper cars might be available from auctions or private sellers but you have fewer rights than if you buy from a dealer.



Trading Standards Warning Over New Phone call Scam

Hampshire County Council Trading Standards officers are warning people to be on their guard against a new UK cash voucher scam targeting residents across the county.

Fraudulent telemarketer are making unsolicited phone calls to consumers promising them ready cash in a lottery, sweepstake or even an insurance refund. Seventeen incidents have been reported in the last four months from all over Hampshire. The main locations targeted are listed below:

Winchester/Eastleigh 6

Alton/Denmead/Upham 4

The New Forest

The fraudsters often pretend to be bank officials, working for a government body, or lottery representatives, and try to convince consumers that their prize is genuine. To 'release' their winnings however, victims are told they must pay an up front fee using a UK cash voucher to allow the transaction to take place. Using their postcode they are then informed of where they can locally purchase a voucher, and after supplying the voucher's serial number to the cold caller, the victims are promised personal delivery of a cheque. Unfortunately once the scammer has the serial number, they are never heard from again.

This warning follows an incident in New Milton in which an elderly lady was swindled out of money after receiving a call from someone claiming to be from the Ministry of Justice. She was told that if she bought a Uk cash voucher for £150, a representative would come to exchange the voucher for her insurance refund. The fraudulent caller phoned back and she innocently provided the serial number of the voucher but he did not come to the house with a refund and she did not hear from him thereafter.

Leader of Hampshire County Council, Councillor Ken Thornber, said: "This is a new scam which often targets vulnerable residents. In some cases elderly victims have been cheated out of hundreds of pounds as these cold callers can be so convincing with their stories.

"It is important that everyone is sceptical about any unsolicited offers, refunds or prizes, if it seems too good to be true, then it probably is. A genuine government body or lottery operator would never ask someone to pay taxes, insurance or any other fee before receiving their 'winnings'".

The advice from Trading Standards is never to send voucher codes to anyone asking for an up front fee. If you do receive a call about an offer that sounds too-

Making home ownership a reality

Mrs Blunden

During the summer holidays one year my mum took my sister and me to the Holy Ghost ruins, for a picnic. Whilst we were there she told us the story of Mrs Blunden who in 1674 was unfortunately buried alive......

Mrs Blunden was the wife of a successful local malt merchant, who was often away on business. They lived in Wote Street in Basingstoke. Mrs Blunden was described as a gross fat woman who apparently liked a drink, often consuming large amounts of her favourite tipple, brandy.

Feeling unwell in the hot summer heat, she ordered some Poppy-Water, an opium based sedative from the local chemist. As the day went on she consumed more and more of the Poppy-Water, until she fell into a deep sleep. So deep that her servants felt certain she was dead. A doctor was called and could find no sign of a pulse. A mirror was held up to her nose and mouth, and found no signs of breathing. The doctor confirmed after seeing the empty bottle of Poppy-Water, that she was indeed dead. Poor Mrs Blunden was laid out carefully on a table and a messenger hurried to inform her husband of the unfortunate death of his wife.

As it was a very hot summer, the family decided it would be best to bury her straight away. So the very next day she was put into her coffin and carried off to the chapel of the Holy Ghost. In the chapel the coffin was placed on two stools and her funeral service began. During the service one of the coffin bearers told a workmate that he thought he saw the coffin move, but was soon convinced that it was either a weakness in the stools or a member of the congregation knocked into it by accident. The incident forgotten, Mrs Blunden was buried in the cemetery.

A day or so later some local boys were playing in the cemetery and thought they heard ghostly noises, coming from the area of the recently buried Mrs Blunden. Shaken, they rushed off to raise the alarm, but everyone thought it was a school boy prank, including the headmaster of their school who promptly punished them for spreading upsetting stories to the locals. Wanting to prove they were telling the truth, the boys went back to the cemetery and heard the noises again. This time they were believed, and the coffin was eventually exhumed. Unfortunately it was too late for the unfortunate Mrs Blunden. Several people were blamed for her death, but without enough evidence they escaped the death penalty, though Basingstoke was given a considerable fine for neglect.
