Sherborne St John have submitted their last regular page article as Marnel, Merton, Oxford Way and Speckled Wood will no longer be part of their parish. The questionnaire sent out by Basingstoke and Deane Electoral Services at the request of the parish came back with an enormous amount of people wanting to de-parish. All these areas have

been, and will continue be, in the Popley West ward and will continue to cast their votes at Melrose Hall in Abbey Road. We continue to fight against the application to build at this time on Kiln Farm Fields. Though technically in the ward of Sherborne St John the impact of an additional 380 houses and 70 flats has the biggest impact on Popley. I owe an apology, last month I said in this column that 242 dwellings would be built on the old John Hunt site and as the article on page 29 said it is the regeneration on the Islands. As ever we need more people to deliver Popley Matters and if you can spare an hour a month to help it would be greatly appreciated.

BASINGSTOKE AIKIDO CLUB

Although founded in Basingstoke in 1968, the club only moved to the Oakridge West Community Centre some 4 years ago. Until recently, we mainly kept our practice sessions to those participants who came with the club, but having purchased new mats we are now actively recruiting new members.

Traditional Aikido is a relatively new Japanese martial art developed from the Ju Jitsu schools along with the various self defence, bayonet and short weapon techniques in the early 1900s by the founder Morihei Ueshiba. Derek Eastman (whose Black Belt 1st Dan was signed by the founder in 1963 and 6th Dan presented by his grandson Moriteru Ueshiba) is still active in the club now run by Mark Eastman (graded 3rd Dan Aikido by H Ellis) and Brad Beeden (graded 2nd Dan Aikido by H Ellis and 1st Dan Black Belt Shotokan K Oneada). All grades by these Senseis are recognised by their respective head Dojos in Japan.

Being a small world it was interesting to discover that Brad's father, who also lived in Oakridge, wrestled as Buffalo Bill, whilst another visitor to our club, Ted Stratton, went under the name Kendo Nagasaki. This only came to light when we represented Basingstoke on one of the twinning visits to France where perhaps we partied too much and various people joined in the merriment, one of whom, who is now a professional magician, wrestled as Catweasel. This brought back memories of the all-in wrestling community, who back then usually trained in the many Judo clubs, which having matted areas also housed the Aikido and Ju Jitsu community. Many of the members would have come from the Forces having been demobbed and found work as doorman in the drinking and dancing establishments.

With little money these were tough but fun times; you could always get into the clubs and halls as this was a fairly small community and everyone would help each other. There were many characters and one, Norbut (Big Ron), when walking down from the Kenshio Abbe Judo Club in Sandwich Street, on passing tailors dummy gave it such a blow its head rolled down the street. On being asked why on earth he had done that the reply was: "Well he would not stop looking at me."

<u>Hampshire Autism Strategy – tell us what you think</u>

A new approach to helping adults with autism is being set out by the Hampshire Autism Partnership Board and is now out for a three month consultation between 27 February and 18 May 2012.

The draft Hampshire Autism Strategy for Adults will run from 2012-2015 and is the first part of a Hampshire lifespan autism strategy. The second part for Children, will be published in 2013.

The draft Hampshire Autism Strategy for Adults is a joint piece of work by Hampshire County Council, NHS Hampshire, Hampshire Autistic Society, the voluntary sector, people with autism, their parents and carers.

The strategy, which aims to give adults with autism the same opportunities as anyone else to live a rewarding and fulfilling life, can be viewed online at www.hants.gov.uk/autism-strategy-consultation or by visiting one of our consultation events (details below).

It is estimated that more than half a million people in the UK have autism, with around 10,000 adults living in Hampshire. It is recognised that services they receive need improving from the point of diagnosis to accessing the right services and helping families and carers.

The strategy places adults with autism, their families and carers at the centre of planned improvements to service delivery and will be achieved through health and social care agencies working together

The strategy aims to increase awareness of autism amongst GP's, ensure that people with autism have better housing choices and the chance to gain employment and continue to support the development of pastoral support in education settings. The County Council wants to ensure that initiatives for apprenticeships and job tasters within the County Council include people with autism. The strategy also says that people with autism should lead on change and be able speak out when things are not right.

Hampshire County Council's Executive Member for Adult Social Care, Councillor Felicity Hindson, said:

"Autism is a lifelong hidden disability that affects the way a person communicates with, and relates to, people and the world around them. The County Council wants to ensure we do everything we can to help people with autism live their lives as they wish and make sure we provide all the information and help we can.

"I would urge everyone to take time to read this strategy and feedback any comments you may have. I want to make sure this strategy is as robust as possible so it can make a positive difference to people."

The Hampshire Autism Strategy will take forward the Council's commitment to meet requirements of the Autism Act 2009 and the National Autism Strategy of 2010 and it is expected that the finalised Strategy will be launched in late summer/autumn of 2012.

I'm not a celebrity, so why should I have a prenup?

'You may not be a wealthy celebrity but if you are planning to get married, you should think hard about having a prenuptial agreement because they are for ordinary people too' advises Emily Poynter, family solicitor at Phillips. 'Marriage is about love and sharing the rest of your lives together but in the eyes of the law, it's a contract between two people and it deals with the financial consequences of the marriage ending.

Clearly you are not going into marriage thinking that your relationship might break down but unfortunately that happens more frequently nowadays, so here are some good reasons why you should have a prenup:

- If you are much wealthier or poorer than your partner, then a prenup can ensure that your partner is marrying you for who you are, and not for your money or lack of
- If you are remarrying and you have children from a previous marriage, own a home
 or other significant assets, then a prenuptial agreement can ensure that when you
 pass away, your assets are distributed according to your wishes, and that neither
 your first family, nor your new family are cut off
- If you own part of a business and your marriage ends, your spouse could end up owning a share of your business if you don't have a prenup. You and your business partners may not want this to happen
- If your partner has a lot of debt and you don't want to be responsible for these
 debts if your marriage ends, then a prenuptial agreement can help ensure that this
 does not happen

It's tough to talk about your loving, committed relationship as if it were a business arrangement and it may seem unromantic' concludes Emily, 'but if you can sit down and discuss your future plans and expectations, logically rather than emotionally, you'll find it much easier. A legal professional will help you to understand the different kinds of issues that might be covered in a prenup. The better informed you are, the easier it will be for you to explain things to your intended.

February 2012 (PCDC Blogs)

5th- PCSO's from Basingstoke, Safer Neighbourhoods Team, helping out with a gas explosion on Abbey Road (BBC report)

13th- My first day back at work this month! It's always nerve racking coming back to work after a holiday. The day is pretty much written off with paperwork, and those dreaded emails. I had about 120 to wade through, and many with read receipts. So, it's not as easy as just deleting them. In the afternoon I did something more fun..I twitter trained PC Matt Sard from the Basingstoke Investigation team. Look-out for tweets from his team on @ BasingstokeCops.

14th- Happy Valentine's Day everyone. Today I managed to get out on my bike early. Miles of patrolling Popley, and Oakridge. I reported some fly tipping, and damage to a bus stop. This was reported to the council, via FixMyStreet. Good little phone app. I also

reported on a burst water-main on Cayman Close. Later I assisted PC Karen Binney, after she arrested several males in Popley on suspicion of possession of class A drugs.

Karen gets all the glory and I'm typing this whilst looking after one of her suspects! Swings and roundabouts so they say.

15th- A very slow day today. There were a number of ASB reports about youths throwing stones at builders on Popley Way. Patrols dispersed a large group of youths. The bus-stop on Popley Way, reported yesterday, has been further damaged today. Please call 101 if you know who is responsible.

In other news: the Popley team continue to patrol the three core priority areas: i.e: 1) ASB Sark Way 2) Drug issues in Pitcairn Close 3) Arson in Popley. There has been a marked reduction in all 3 issues.

16th- I attended Alton Maltings Centre today. I completed a refresher day on investigations.

In other news: I'm looking forward to Operation Slipstream this weekend. It's warm so there should be a few arrests for the team!

17th- In the afternoon I patrolled Popley and Oakridge with Sgt Paul Markham. Sgt Markham is the most pro-active Sgt I have ever known. Always willing to get his hands dirty and a real motivator to our team. We patrolled the Popley Hotspot areas and all was in order.

We received reports of youths causing ASB at the Melrose Community Centre. On attendance a large group of youths were dispersed. The area has been subject to criminal damage and verbal abuse by a number of youths.

In other news: I crewed up with PC Mark Gallagher to patrol the town centre for another weekend of Operation Slipstream. PC Chris Whittington made an arrest for assault in the top of town. Mark and I assisted with statements. We also dispersed a few people. I had also arrested a male for an assault, however, the aggrieved refused to cooperate, so I de-arrested the male.

18th- I crewed up with PC Chris Whittington for Operation Slipstream. A much colder and busier night in town. I located a female smoking a cannabis joint on Wote Street. Thankfully she was eligible for a cannabis street warning.

Half an hour before I was due off duty, I arrested a man for section 5 public order

20th- I crewed up with PC Rich Heard today to conduct plain clothes cycle patrols as part of Operation Nemesis. (Burglary Op) No burglars just drug users! I located a male smoking cannabis in Falkland Road. I reported the male for summons. I also located a male smoking a spliff on Shakespeare Road. The male was given a cannabis caution. PC Heard also located a male in Westray Close with cannabis. The male received a cannabis caution. Any info on drugs then call me on 101.

21st- I patrolled all the Popley hotspots today. I took details of a criminal damage to two cars in Abbey Road. the suspects were described as two white youths with dark hair. Both youths are aged approx 12 years old. One of the youths wore a dirty white hooded top.

I also took a harassment statement from a family that have been suffering from verbal abuse.

In other news: I reported some fly tipping to the council.

22nd- More solid patrols of Popley today. The weather was awfully windy. I took a loss statement from the victim of yesterday's criminal damage.

In other news: I attended Peugeot on Aldermaston Road after another theft of catalytic converter. On-going work is being conducted to prevent further thefts.

23rd- Today, I along with all Basingstoke Safer Neighbourhoods Teams, took part in the South Ham "Day of Action" I issued a male with a cannabis street caution and arrested another on suspicion of burglary. Great work by everyone involved with numerous arrests/cautions/positive warrants and community engagement. Look out for the Popley "Day of Action" on 23rd March.

intelligence analyst. Phil is the longest serving PCSO in Basingstoke and we will all miss him.

25th- Lots of patrolling Popley, Oakridge and Chineham prior to Op Slipstream. I visited the traveller site on Don Allen Drive after reports of travellers, however they had left prior to my arrival.

In other news: Tragic news of a hanging in Carpenters Down Woods: PCSO's Tarren Porter and Pete Windust were on the scene guard.

The FedsOnPeds were out in town again. Many arrests and positive action from the team.

26th- Normal Sunday patrols in Popley and Oakridge. I issued an harassment warning letter to a youth, who had been verbally abusive to a family. Marnel Park was heavily patrolled after reports of ASB in the area. Several youths were verbally warned.

In other news: I attended Abbey Road in relation to a parking dispute. Hopefully this is has now been resolved.

29th- I was meant to attend court today, however, I was Stood Down. I was updating the computer when a call came over the radio...An allegation that a male had indecently exposed himself. I attended the War Memorial Park and arrested the male. I handed the male over to an investigation team. Later, the male was charged and remanded for court in the morning. After I had completed more paperwork I headed into Oakridge. I located a male in Forsythia Walk with a wrap of heroin. I arrested the male. Later, the male was cautioned and released.

March 2012 (PCDC Blogs)

1st- In the morning I assisted shift officers by attending Crockford Lane. A member of public had reported that travellers had moved on to the site. I attended, however, the travellers had moved on. As luck would have it though, I located a male smoking cannabis on the same road. The male was given a cannabis caution.

In other news: I patrolled the hotspot areas in Popley but the night was fairly quiet.

2nd- Another busy night for the #FedsOnPeds. I crewed up with PC Rich Heard to conduct patrols in Popley, and Oakridge. As always, the hotspot areas were heavily patrolled. I located a male smoking cannabis outside the Popinjay public house. The male was given a cannabis street warning.

In other news: The usual team crewed up for Operation Slipstream in the town centre (tackling violent crime). observation Drugs are prolific in Basingstoke. We seize drugs off people daily. Usually cannabis/cocaine and heroin. There is also a batch of valium (diazepam) doing the rounds at the moment. People ask me if I think cannabis should be legalised. I am quite happy that we will never solve the drugs issue, however, if we fail to enforce the drugs laws there would be chaos in my opinion. Most normal people won't even know there are drugs about (thankfully) but they are there in our communities, and towns, wrecking lives. We will do all we can to prevent drugs on the streets. The Basingstoke Safer Neighbourhoods Teams are more robust than ever, with drug offenders, and we are always working on ways to tackle the problem.

3rd- Operation Slipstream round 2! The night was hectic but very enjoyable. I reported another male for possession of cannabis after door staff at Lloyds Bar smelt cannabis on a male. PC Rich Heard arrested a male for possession of cocaine and assault. We also dispersed a few drunken volatile people. All our live tweet updates can be found on twitter along with photos @BasingstokeCops.

4th- Paperwork day I need a PA.

7th- Patrols of Oakridge and Popley with PC Rich Heard. I located a male smoking a spliff in Normanton Road. the male received a cannabis caution. PC heard also located a male smoking cannabis.

8th- I crewed up with PCSO Tarren Porter, and PCSO Pete Windust. As we entered Oakridge, on Norn Hill, I stop checked a male. The male was wanted for recall to prison. The male also had stolen beauty products. 2 arrests for the price of one!





What is state pension age

Your state pension age depends on when you were born. Currently the State pension age is:-



- 65 for a man born before 6 December 1953
- 60 for a woman born before 6 April 1950
- between 60 and 65 for a woman born on or after 6 April 1950 but before 6
 December 1953. This is because state pension age for men and women is
 being equalised gradually from 6 April 2010 onwards, so a woman born on
 or after 6 April 1950 but before 6 December 1953 will have a higher state
 pension age than 60, depending on when she was born.
- between 65 and 68 for a man or woman born on or after 6 December 1953 but before 6 April 1978. This is because state pension age for both men and women is being increased gradually from 6 December 2018, so a man or woman born on or after 6 December 1953 but before 6 April 1978 will have a higher state pension age than 65, depending on when s/he was born.
- 68 for a man or woman born on or after 6 April 1978.

Changes to the State Pension Age

In his Autumn Statement, on 29 November 2011, the Chancellor announced that the State Pension age will now increase to 67 between 2026 and 2028. The government said it took this decision because of increasing life expectancy, to help manage the cost of State Pensions. If you were born in the 1960s, you could be affected.

This will mean that people born after 5 April 1961 but before 6 April 1969 will have a State Pension age of 67.

People born after 5 April 1960 but before 6 April 1961 will reach State Pension age between 66 and 67.

This change to the timetable is not yet law and will require the approval of Parliament.

Sherborne St John Parish Council Villager / Popley Matters – April 2012

After such a tremendous turnout for the February Parish Council meeting, it's great to think that these notes will be already understood by so many people in the Parish! The meeting focussed on the proposed development at Marnel Park / North of Popley and hit home on a number of levels – firstly it was a coordinated expression of local concerns (which were widely reported by the Basingstoke Gazette and Basingstoke Observer), and secondly it showed the community of Sherborne St John pulling together when threatened.

BDB 75761 / 75762 North of Popley. The Parish Council's 2nd Objection Letter was duly submitted on the 5th March and can be seen on the Parish Council website - www.ssj.hampshire.org.uk. The letter attempts to clarify any mis-understanding on the part of BDBC Cllrs, identify shortcomings in the planning application, and expose the apparent disregard for due process. Following the meeting, the Parish Council has been pursuing legal options (and has taken advice), planning consultants, local pressure groups and the possibility of retaining a lobbyist. Discussions with SOLVE (Save Our Loddon Valley Environment) have been very helpful and shown that our aspirations are now more closely aligned with their aims. This has prompted us to approach Country Watch - 'an environmental pressure group formed in the late 1990s with an area of interest that covers the whole of the Loddon & Lyde river valleys from the eastern boundary of Basingstoke Town to the Borough Boundary and beyond. We believe the valley's natural and built environment – in some cases unique - to be something special, a jewel in Basingstoke's crown and an area to be protected for its biodiversity' - with a view to becoming a Member.

In the meantime (the result will be known long before this reaches you), we await the outcome of the High Court action brought by the Manydown Co. against BDBC concerning the exclusion of Manydown from the pre-Submission Core Strategy process. If this action is unsuccessful, we understand that SOLVE/Country Watch will then bring their own action – which is based on a different argument (see SOLVE web site info@solveloddon.org).

Full marks to Cllr Syd Abraham who is relentlessly pursuing BDBC to agree to install earth bunds to assist in screening Marnel Park from SSJ Village!

Meanwhile, the Parish Council has also submitted a formal complaint to BDBC about the parlous state of the so-called 'screening' installed by David Wilson Homes as part of the existing Marnel Park development.

You might ask - is there anything else happening in Sherborne St John?

Parish Council Elections – Thursday 3rd May. Please think about doing your bit for the new Sherborne St John Parish (we say goodbye and very good luck to Marnel Park, Speckled Wood Road and Merton Rise at the beginning of April – and we hope to see a new Parish Council there in 2016). If you would like to stand for election you can obtain instructions from BDBC (01256 845355), or from Mandy Haworth, Parish Clerk (ssjclerk@gmail.com or 07714 770940). You must submit your application no later than 4th April. In essence you need to live in or near the Parish and be supported by two eligible residents. Obviously, not everyone will be putting their name forward – but please make sure you vote on the 3rd May! As already stated, for my own part, I believe that 12 years as Chairman is long enough – so it is time the Parish Council deserves a new Chairman.

Good News! The Chute Pavilion now has a 8kWp PV Solar panel array, which is already generating electricity. The Parish Council is pleased to be able to play its part in providing renewable energy, and supporting the Greening Campaign – please ask yourself whether you can support them too!

The Villager has passed 'seamlessly' to new management – well done Andy Page and team for the last two years, and good luck to Crissy Humphreys and the new team. It is very encouraging that people are prepared to give up their own time for the common good.


The Jubilee Celebrations are well advanced (see this Villager) – well done Tracy Jeram et al. Please make sure you join in!

April Fools Day

April Fools Day is thought to have begun around 1582 in France with the reform of the calendar under Charles IX. The new Gregorian Calendar was introduced, and New Year's Day was moved from 25th March – 1st April (new year's week) to 1st January.

In those days communication travelled slowly and some people were only informed of the changes many years later. Others refused to acknowledge the changes and continued to celebrate New Year on 1st April.

These people were labelled 'fools,' and were subject to ridicule and sent on 'fools errands,' and had other practical jokes played on them. The butts of these pranks became known as a 'poisson d'avril' or 'April fish'.

Over time it became the custom to play practical jokes on 1st April. This tradition gradually spread throughout Britain and Scotland in the 18th century and was introduced to the American colonies by the English and the French. Later it spread to other countries, each country celebrating April Fools Day in its own way.

In Scotland, April Fools Day is devoted to spoofs involving the buttocks and is called Taily Day. The butts of these jokes are known as April 'Gowk' another name for the cuckoo.

In England, jokes are only played in the morning, as its considered bad luck to play a practical joke on someone after noon.

In Rome, it's known as 'Festival of Hilaria' or 'Roman Laughing Day,' and celebrates the resurrection of the god Attis.

In Portugal, April Fools Day falls on the Sunday and Monday before lent. People celebrate by throwing flour over their friends.

In India, the Huli Festival is celebrated on 31st March. People play jokes on one another and smear colours on one another to celebrate the arrival of spring.

Wise men all agree that it is okay to be foolish at times and in fact, every silly act is a step to wisdom. So don't be embarrassed when someone plays pranks on you and calls you 'April Fool'.
