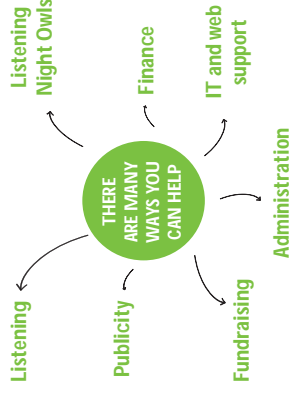

Councillors County: I promised to report back on the Rights of Way issue from Popley to Sherborne St John. We had a site visit and the officer was shown the comments and concerns that residents had contacted us about. Already improvements have been instigated and the overhanging tree removed. There should be already or very soon clear signage as to what is the permitted Right of Way track. The route is about a 30 to 40 minute walk and I have been told there are lots of signs of our wildlife to be spotted.

I have spoken to Highways in regard to getting grit bins in the roads that have been adopted in Marnel Park. Merton Rise is still not adopted but I have contacted the developers and asked if they will put some grit bins in the area. There have also been questions about the road signage especially in Linacre Road and I have been told the missing road sign will be replaced. The street lighting in this area is the responsibility of the management company and should be reported to HML Andersons. Street lighting in Trinity is Persimmons and any broken lights should be reported to them until the road is adopted when it then will be under Hampshire County Council. **Cllr Jane Frankum 01256 819924 email jane.frankum@hants.gov.uk**

Popley West: Firstly we wish all our residents a very Happy Christmas and New Year. We were hoping that with new contractors appointed that waste collection would improve. Sadly that does not seem to be the case especially in the new developments. We are asking that you report when your bins are missed to 844844 or fill in the forms online. We don't think the administration know or will admit to how poor the service is.

After many complaints from residents about the dog fouling in the main community park we did some site inspections and reported back to officers and asked for damaged and missing bins to be replaced and we are pleased to report there will be at least 12 bins around the park. We are now asking that benches are repaired and/or replaced too.

The bin stores in Melrose Walk are not fit for purpose and yet again we had to contact Vivid to get the overflowing bins and rubbish sorted. Vivid have cleared the mess but for how long remains a mystery. A long term solution is needed. When the flats were built there was not recycling and glass collection. There have been reports again of a group of people trying car doors in the early hours of the morning and advice from the police is to check your car doors are locked!

Popley East: Following refusal by the BDBC planning committee to allow Marstons to build a pub/restaurant on the Fire Authority land at Carpenters Down, Marstons successfully appealed the decision to the Secretary of State.

On hearing about the decision, we wrote to Marstons asking that they open an effective dialogue with both the residents and ourselves and seeking information on the construction timetable and start dates. Disappointingly it appears not to have been high on Marstons Agenda as the works were started without any notification to us. We will endeavour to ensure that during the period of the construction all conditions stipulated in the planning agreement are adhered to so please let us know if you believe this not to be the case. We would hope that Marston's dialogue with the community and ourselves improves.

As you know we have been in talks with Hampshire County Council for some time now seeking improvements to the junction at Popley Way to prevent drivers from continuing the dangerous U-turn manoeuvres. We are pleased to say that the works are to be carried out in January and are expected to take two to three weeks to be completed.

Christmas Safety Advice

Christmas is a special time for celebration and should not end in tragedy because of the extra hazards that are present at this time of year.

The following advice should be used in conjunction with other sections of the site, such as the candle fire safety page, due to the fact that candles are also used more and more at this time of year.

Fairy Lights

- Check the fuses are the right type (see the box for the maximum size of fuse you should use)
- If bulbs blow, replace them
- Don't leave fairy lights on when you go out or when you go to sleep
- Don't let the bulbs touch anything that can burn easily, like paper
- Don't overload sockets.

Decorations

- Decorations made of light tissue paper or cardboard burn easily
- Don't attach them to lights or heaters
- Don't put them immediately above or around the fireplace
- Keep them away from candles.

Extinguishing

Many people ask what is the best method of extinguishing a Christmas tree fire should they be unfortunate to experience one. The simply answer is that the UltraFire Water Mist extinguisher from Safelines is the perfect option.



Christmas Trees

Special fire safety precautions need to be taken when keeping a live tree in the house. A burning tree can rapidly fill a room with fire and deadly gases. This can be demonstrated by viewing the following video (<https://bit.ly/1vALWZZ>). Furthermore the best way to tackle a Christmas tree fire is by the use of a Water Mist Extinguisher which you can see by viewing the following video (<https://bit.ly/2P0x1tp>).

Selecting a Tree for Christmas

Needles on fresh trees should be green and hard to pull back from the branches, and the needle should not break if the tree has been freshly cut. The trunk should be sticky to the touch. Old trees can be identified by bouncing the tree trunk on the ground. If many needles fall off, the tree has been cut too long, has probably dried out, and is a fire hazard.

Caring for Your Tree

Do not place your tree close to a heat source, including a fireplace or heat vent. The heat will dry out the tree, causing it to be more easily ignited by heat, flame or sparks. Be careful not to drop or flick cigarette ashes near a tree. Do not put your live tree up too early or leave it up for longer than two weeks. Keep the tree stand filled with water at all times.

Disposing of Your Tree

Never put tree branches or needles in a fireplace or wood burning stove. When the tree becomes dry, discard it promptly. The best way to dispose of your tree is by taking it to a recycling centre or having it taken away by a community pickup service.

Surviving the Office Christmas Party!



Christmas party season is fast approaching and some employees have a tendency to forget that even where an office party is held at an off-site venue it is still time spent "in the course of your employment". Therefore the popular theory that "What happens at the Christmas party, stays at the Christmas party" is unfortunately not necessarily the case. Nobody wants to be dismissed for gross misconduct due to bad behaviour at a social event or for posting something inappropriate about themselves or others on social media.

Where alcohol or even a free bar is provided by your employer you do still have a duty to retain some semblance of sensible and responsible behaviour. Even under the influence of alcohol it is not acceptable to make unwanted advances, air grudges, be abusive, fight, harass or discriminate against others, drink and drive or use the photocopier inappropriately.

Jokes you would not tell or comments that you would not use in the office because they might cause offence, are just as likely to cause offence in a party situation even if they do get a laugh from all concerned after a few drinks. Remember for example that not everyone drinks alcohol, celebrates Christmas or likes social events and their views and beliefs must be respected.

Another often forgotten, but important point, is that it is completely inappropriate to discuss work matters, other members of staff, clients, suppliers or customers in a social environment where you can be overheard by others.

Senior staff also have the added responsibility not to make any rash promises such as agreeing pay increases or discussing promotions or company matters under the influence of alcohol as this could well be regretted later.

The office Christmas party should be a happy and fun experience for all concerned and remain in the spirit of the season of goodwill. One last tip - do aim to turn up on time to work the next day even if you do have a hangover.

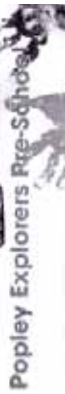

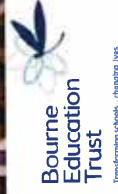

Dear friends. HAVE YOU EVER GOT IT WRONG?

As I write I'm looking out on the most gorgeous sunset and it's a balmy 23 degrees. We're taking a short pre-Christmas break staying with some friends on the wonderful island of Cyprus. Yesterday evening we were treated to an evening out to a local musical called 'The Rock.' This wasn't anything to do with some fearsome wrestler or a guitarist from some heavy metal band, no, it was the story of St Peter and his journey from fisherman to Christ's closest follower. Jesus said to Peter "Simon, you shall be called Peter and on this rock will I build my church." And he did!

Funny thing is, Peter was way far from being perfect. In fact like all of us he was flawed in many ways. He was a rough and ready fisherman, sometimes abrasive, sometimes rude, sometimes, (in fact lots of times) jumping to the wrong conclusions and saying or doing the wrong things (ring any bells?). So why would Jesus choose someone like him to be the leader of this new church that was about to emerge after his death and resurrection?

What came across very powerfully in the musical was the relationship between Jesus and Peter. Even with all his flaws and faults Jesus loved Peter, he loved him for who he was, where he had been and what he was. He saw the true potential that existed deep within Peter and he was determined to help him realise that potential. He did it in and through a deeply personal relationship with this rough and ready fisherman. Peter went on to become one of the founding fathers of the Christian faith and was not shy in proclaiming Jesus as God's son.

At this time of the year I guess we are all busy preparing for the Christmas season with all its attendant shopping for presents for food and drink for Christmas trees and all that other good stuff. Just take a moment, close your eyes and strip away all the sentimentality of Christmas and see it for what it really is. A young peasant girl probably only 15 or 16 years old and her young husband. Weary and tired from a long journey, heavily pregnant and giving birth in a smelly old stable populated by various livestock. Why? Why not some rich royal family in a palace or a least a wealthy businessman's home? Why choose such a lowly place to give birth to God's son?

I guess the fact of the matter is that God isn't interested in wealth or status or position. He's only interested in the heart and what's really there. Like Peter we are all deeply flawed in one way or another, we all mess up, jump to wrong conclusions, suffer from anxieties and fears, make poor decisions etc., but none of that stuff can or will ever stop God from loving us or seeing the true potential buried deep within us. For sure he will want to help you sort it and change it - for the better. Who wouldn't want that? Peter did!

So, this Christmas may I invite you to come along to one of our Christmas services. Come and meet the man born in a stable who grew up, lived and died and lives again for you. Who loves you no matter who, what, where or how you where you are now.
