The report praises the speed in which the school has improved and recognises the excellent relationships between staff and students.



County Councillor Report: Hampshire County Council have a website that enables you to check on what is happening in relation to the COV19 virus it also gives helpful advice https://www.hants.gov.uk/socialcareandhealth/coronavirus. Please try to keep safe and look out for our more vulnerable neighbours. Advice is changing from day to day and its hard to keep up with it all but the websites are updated on a daily basis.

The double yellow lines and road markings should have or be about to start being painted on the roads in Marnel Park, of course that is assuming that there will be the staff available to do or it has not been moved because of the effects of the virus.

The government have given councils more money to fix potholes but quite frankly they are so bad and so many it will still be priority ones that are done, in other words deep potholes on main roads and bus routes first. If you see a deep pothole you can report it on the Hampshire County Council site https://www.hants.gov.uk/transport/roadmaintenance/roadproblems/ potholes if you can get photos that would help but please do not put yourselves at risk. Popley West: The local elections have been moved back by a year so till then your Councillors will remain the same as they are at present. Paul and I will continue to be the borough Councillors for Popley West.

The work has started on Popley Community Park and the fencing will be replaced by railings it will be good to get rid of broken and rotted wood fences and unsightly chicken wire type. The new equipment and other upgrades will be done over the warmer summer months. We are happy that we will be able to be your Councillors to see the park finished.

I am on the Access4All committee and we met with the Council officer and the Communications Manager of Serco and said how bad the collections are we focused on the hazards as disable people though Serco were in the main talking about poor sight, however we pressed on about bins being left across kerbs, blocking dropped kerbs and when not collected its two days of an obstacle course around the estates. Serco showed us their training film it is at least a start. They have now acquired a modular building and are furnishing it so they can have somewhere to train their operatives. It should result in an improvement as guite a few of the staff English is not there first language I am sceptical but at least give them a chance to improve. Bur we did say that getting the bins done on the specified date is as important.

A Substantial length of footpath connecting Penrith Road to the Bermuda and Marlowe Surgery has been re-laid following the concerns of residents and this well used footpath will now provide a safe walk through and access for those users with mobility scooters, wheel chairs, buggies and the Like.

As spring fast approaches and the practical work tasks for Popley Conservation Volunteers come to a close, Alan has kindly taken the time to reflect on what has been a very successful season for the group.

Early in the season when the pond was dry we were able to coppice an area on the margin of the pond that had

become very thick and overgrown, the purpose of this work was to open up a glade to improve regrowth of vegetation and promote diversity, this area was once full of Meadow Rue and attracted masses of bees, Hover flies, Butterflies and various other invertebrates. All the brashings and reeds from this work were layered in a nearby area in an attempt to create a hibernacula for Grass Snakes - I have seen Grass Snakes in this area twice some years ago and it would be nice to encourage them back after all the disturbance over the last 10 or so years.

Some work was done in the small pond that is situated at Speckled Wood Close end of the site, we were able to clear some of the Hazel and Willow from the margins of the pond to allow light in, this was a very successful breeding pond for all three species of newt some years ago but becomes choked with an annual Algae bloom due to nutrients leaching into the pond from felled willow trees being left in situ - there are plans for these to be removed but it is quite a big job involving chainsaws and winches. I can already see some improvement in regrowth of water mint - I plan to do some surveying in the near future to monitor the level of egg laying in the pond.

Another task that is very important for the group to carry out is removal of Reeds from the floor of the main pond. Reeds can spread quickly and become the dominant species, this causes aquatic plants such as Water mint and Water Forget-me-not to decline, these are the favoured plants for Great Crested Newts, smooth Newts and Palmate newts to lay their eggs on, any decline in these species is detrimental to the successful breeding of all three newt species, we were able to do some of this work before the pond became flooded but it wasn't enough, this will be an ongoing task for as long as the group exists.

Once the pond had flooded we had to move our activities to a safer and drier part of the reserve so we switched our attention to the grassland in the mitigation areas, where when these areas were created in the early years of development several hibernacula were put. These were duel purpose, over-wintering for amphibians and spring and summer basking sites for reptiles, these have fallen into a bit of dis-repair and have been encroached by surrounding Blackthorn and Hazel our job was to clear back the scrub to expose them to light, thus encouraging regrowth of vegetation to encourage Slow worms and common Lizards back to the site. I have noted a gradual spread of Cowslips around these hibernacula several years ago but have not seen any for the last two years, this is also due to the lack of light and encroachment of scrub, I am hoping we will encourage them to re-establish.

The group has also carried out a few litter picking sessions in and around the pond recently - a bit less interesting and glamorous but non the less an essential part of what we do, litter causes all sorts of hazards for all wildlife in the Reserve as well as looking very unsightly.

We have quite a good nucleus of a group now and during this season we have had good numbers attending work tasks, we have been very pleased to welcome new members including two families with young children - the future of the group, the reserve and conservation.

#### Symptoms of stroke

#### Signs of stroke - FAST

Face: Can the person smile? Has their face fallen on one side?

Arms: Can the person raise both arms and keep them there?

Speech problems: Can the person speak clearly and understand what you say? Is their speech slurred?

Time: If you see any of these three signs, it's time to call 999

The FAST test helps to spot the three most common symptoms of stroke. But there are other signs that you should always take seriously. These include:

- · Sudden weakness or numbness on one side of the body, including legs, hands or feet.
- · Difficulty finding words or speaking in clear sentences.
- · Sudden blurred vision or loss of sight in one or both eyes.
- Sudden memory loss or confusion, and dizziness or a sudden fall.
- A sudden, severe headache.

#### If you spot any of these signs of a stroke, don't wait. Call 999 straight away.

Ambulance paramedics are trained in stroke, and will take the person to the best hospital for specialist treatment





Dear friends, March is when we celebrate our wedding anniversary, 47 years ago Marilyn and I were wed in St Albans Church in Havant. We've accumulated so many memories over those years and sometimes its really good to reflect on them. Thank God for our ability to remember.

I remember one of the first computers I worked on was made by a company based in Reading called DEC. The computer, a PDP11/34 came with a massive 1Mb memory on six circuit boards each almost the size of an A3 sheet of paper. Later, one of the first Apple computers I used remember that unbelievably it came with a 20MB Hard Drive, almost the size of shoebox. Ha!

Today my mobile phone has 64Gb of memory (that's 64 million, million) and even now you can attach a Tb drive that's e equivalent of one million, million, million! Phenomenal. But even these figures do not come close to the capacity of the human memory and what it can both store and retrieve.

So why when I go into the kitchen why do I sometimes stop and think "now what did I come in here for?" Funny thing our memory isn't it? Do you have a way of remembering things? Some folk tie a knot in their hankies or put a rubber band on their fingers or more lately use a digital assistant. School children will often write on their hands to help them remember.

The classic example in my role and one that most ministers will know and quake with fear is when I meet someone from the past and their opening line is "You don't remember me do you?" One out of possibly thousands of faces. I'm usually pretty good with faces but names are another thing so if I haven't seen you in a while please forgive me if I recognize you but fail to remember your name and blush red. You could begin with "Hi, I'm ...."

It does serve though to emphasize the value that we place on being remembered and recognised. If possible, by name, which is why I suppose in the Bible God spoke to people by name rather than just "Hey you!" in fact he was so determined to remember them that he followed the example of schoolchildren and said "I have written your name on the palms of my hands." Which I guess is God's way of saying "I will never forget you." Whenever he opens his hands to do things he has us in mind!

Now f course God doesn't have hands or elasticated arms stretching down from heaven but he does have your hands and mine. They are the practical means by which he shows his care for people and reveals that they are remembered and not forgotten. Right now in the hospitals, surgeries and care homes God is using healing hands. In communities, neighborhoods and families people are showing how they care with acts of love and kindness. Helping with the shopping, a phone call to keep in touch. Wherever this virus is healed, pain is eased or fear and anxiety removed the hands of God are at work and people know that they are not forgotten. (Isaiah 43.1-3/ 49.15-16)

Prayer: Lord help us today to use our hands, our love, and our lives to remind those in any kind of need that they are not forgotten. AMEN

Samaritans have been a presence in Basingstoke since 1969 and have been offering emotional support to the town and beyond from the early 1970's from our base in Essex Road.

Samaritans is a unique charity dedicated to reducing the feelings of isolation and disconnection that can lead to poor mental health, and in the saddest cases, to suicide. Every six seconds someone contacts us, every six seconds we can help someone turn their life around; our listening volunteers can make a real difference to someone's future.

Our brilliant volunteers took over 19,835 contacts from callers and gave over **3016 volunteer hours last year.** Every person supporting Basingstoke Samaritans is a volunteer.

Along with supporting callers by phone, email and face to face, we also have strong Outreach Teams supporting our Community. In the Basingstoke area we continue to receive reports that people's cars are being broken into, tampered with or stolen. As a result we would like to keep residents up to date with relevant crime prevention advice, so that you have a better awareness of how you may protect yourself and your belongings.

Remember – most of these offences are opportunist in nature – by taking even simple precautions you can greatly reduce your likelihood of becoming a victim.

• When leaving your car, close all windows and lock your car. This is the best way to protect your belongings.

- Upon locking your vehicle try your car door to ensure it is actually locked!
- Take all your personal possessions with you and do not leave items on display.

• Even items of little value, such as shopping bags and clothing, may tempt a potential thief to break into the vehicle to see whether they contain anything worth stealing. They may even be tempted by such things as coins for the car park, sunglasses, packs of medication or other items that can earn quick cash.

• If your car does not already have an alarm or immobiliser, consider having a Thatcham approved product fitted.

• Keep your car keys away from any windows and doors to prevent them from being "fished" through letterboxes, or seen by opportunist thieves.

- Ensure that your front door is locked correctly (lift handle and turn the key if UPVC door).
- If keys have been taken, change car locks immediately.
- Register your possessions for free at www.immobilise.com in doing so you will assist the police in returning your property should it be lost or stolen.

• Secure your number plates with tamper-resistant screws. The easiest way to change the identity of a stolen vehicle or avoid speeding tickets and parking tickets is to fit stolen number plates. Using security screws to attach your vehicle's number plates makes it harder for thieves to get your number.

• Fit locking, anti-tamper wheel nuts to secure alloy wheels. Stolen wheels are valuable, either as parts or for their scrap value. Using locking wheel nuts reduces the risk of your vehicle's wheels being stolen.

• Secure anything that's on the outside of your vehicle. Anything left on roof-racks, tailgate racks, holiday top boxes or in tool chests are easily stolen when the vehicle is parked. The use of cable locks, padlocks and self-locking tools chests, which are secured to the vehicle, makes them more secure, but still, don't leave things in them if you can avoid it.

• Report all suspicious activity or offences to the police. Even if we cannot take immediate action it well help us build a better picture of the issue which will help us combat it more effectively in the long-run.
