We used to have a saying in the RAF "Constant change is here to stay – perhaps!" Mostly because the shifting sands of change were ever with us, wherever we were and whatever we were doing. It's a fact of service life. When I became a Christian I read in a Christian magazine "Scientists have a term for life forms that do not change and grow – it's dead!" Finally that gracious lady The Queen Mother once said that "you do not grow old rather you become old by not growing."

We are living in unprecedented times and constant change is something we are going to have to get used to living with, as hard and as difficult as it may be. New ways of being, living, working and using our leisure time and neither is Church excluded from that list. Our hopes, dreams and desires can seem lost. In the words of Mick Jagger and the Rolling Stones song "You can't always get what you want."

Change is never easy, even for those who, like me, take enjoyment in its challenges. One of the most common phrases found in the Bible is "do not fear (do not be afraid)"

## Have your Say on Plans to Stamp out Dog Fouling.

People are being asked to give their views on Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council's plans to get tougher on dog owners who don't clear up after their dog.

The council is proposing to introduce a borough wide Public Spaces Protection Oorder taking a firmer stance on dog fouling in Basingstoke and Deane and is asking people to have their say.

Evidence gained by the council demonstrates that dog fouling in public spaces is a problem across the borough and therefore the council so it is putting forward plans for a borough wide Public Spaces Protection Order for dog fouling bringing tougher penalties.

The draft order makes it an offence if people do not clear up after their dog has fouled in a public space and requires they carry with them an appropriate means to pick up their dog poo and transport it to a bin after their pet has fouled. If they do not comply they could receive an on the spot fine of £100 or be prosecuted at the Magistrates' Court.

Cabinet Member for the Environment and Enforcement, Cllr Hayley Eachus, said: "The majority of dog owners act responsibly and clear up their pet's mess but there are a minority that still do not and this lazy and selfish behaviour cannot be condoned. Dog mess is unsightly, it's dirty and it's dangerous and we have received feedback from residents where it has been a real issue for those using public open spaces.

"We are asking for people to feedback on our proposal to impose this

order across the whole borough bringing a greater consequence to irresponsible owners and giving the council greater powers to enforce."

County Councillor Report: Thank you to all the wonderful people who came together to save Chineham Library from being closed; it was a mammoth victory. It was wonderful to see residents coming together from Chineham and Popley defending the library for our school children and many of us older generation who use it too. Sadly South Ham Library will close. Please use Chineham library so we can keep the threat from future closing away. The library does a lot more than just loan out books. Now that the phase one and two road and path improvements are completed by Hampshire County Council in Popley East, the next phase will begin soon for Popley West. They include a new path that will be created from Tintern Close to the bus stop by Melrose Walk. There will also be a short path from Abbey Road to the Apollo Hotel and Popley Community Park. In the work programme for later on is that a new path will be created by the bus stop at the end of Abbey Road from Abbey Court and Magnolia Court and up to the shops. However with all the cuts it may be a couple of years for those paths.

I am campaigning on improvements for disabled access around the estates. I have got Abbey Road on the work programme and I am in talks about the horrendous gap and step up across from Abbey Road bridge to Oakridge. If you know of other places please contact me. Popley West: You will have noticed the blue railing fence around the front of Popley Community Park the fencing around the back will be less formal. The hedges have been cut back making it easier to see coming out of Don Allen Drive. More work will be done to the entrance to the park and new play and green gym equipment will be installed soon. Paul and I have asked for more waste bins as the eleven that are there now are not enough with the growing popularity of the park. There will also be more parking spaces near the MUGA Court (Multiple Use Games Area). The new equipment will have items for all ages, making the park for all the family, including disabled and old like me! We were very disappointed and angry to see the wanton vandalism to the picnic tables and benches. Developer money may have paid for the equipment but the upkeep will have to be paid for out of all of our council taxes.

Most dog walkers are taking the dogs mess home or putting it in the bins around the park however there are some selfish and lazy people who do not clear it away. It can be harmful as it can cause blindness especially if young children get it on their hands. PCSOs are paying particular attention to this; you may have seen the posters? There are also posters in regard to fly tipping around the estates. Thank you Persimmon for at last cutting back the hedges

along Don Allen Drive after many complaints from Paul, myself and residents. We are pleased they have done it, as requested, in time for the new school year.

We are glad that we are going back to weekly bin collections as, in the few weeks that it was fortnightly, there were lots of reports of overflowing bins, maggots in some bins and fly tipping increased massively. 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Basingstoke police are once again providing residents with some fraud prevention advice, as it continues to be an issue that affects a great many of us.

Fraud is the most commonly reported crime, and anyone can become a victim, regardless of age, sex, or income. Every year the British public loses billions of pounds to fraudsters who bombard us with online, mail, door-to-door and telephone scams. Fraud occurs when someone lies or deceives you in order to cause harm, most commonly by taking money, and there are many types of fraud.

With this in mind Basingstoke police would like residents to bear in mind the following advice:

- -Be suspicious! If it seems 'too good to be true', it usually is. There are no guaranteed get-rich-quick schemes.
- -Take time to consider offers or deals, do not be pressured into accepting things before you have time to think. Insist on time to obtain advice before making a decision.
- -Do not hand over money or sign anything until you have checked the credentials of the company or individual.
- -Never send money to anyone you do not know or trust, whether in the UK or abroad, or use methods of payment that you are not comfortable with.
- -Never give banking or personal details to anyone you do not know or trust. This information is valuable so make sure you protect it.
- -Always log on to a website directly rather than clicking on links provided by an email.
- -Do not rely solely on glowing testimonials: find solid independent evidence of a company's success.
- -Always get independent/ legal advice if an offer involves money, time or commitment.
- -Your bank or the police will never ask you for your 4-digit PIN or online banking password, ask you to withdraw money for them, ask you to transfer money to a new account, send someone to your home to collect cash or banking details, or ask you to purchase goods for them.
- -Do not be embarrassed to report a scam. Because the scammers are cunning there is no shame in being deceived. By reporting you will make it more difficult for them to deceive others.
- -In Hampshire all fraud should be reported to Action Fraud, via www.actionfraud.police.uk, or by phoning on 0300 123 2040. In addition, you may wish to report to the police direct by calling 101.

You can find more information on the types of fraud and scams commonly used and how you may better protect yourself from them on the Action Fraud website and the Hampshire Constabulary website under the 'Advice and Information' section.

#### Wedding Delayed? Don't Forget to Sort out your Will

For those who made plans for their wedding or civil partnership this year, there is little doubt that the coronavirus has caused serious disruption.

Understandably, many couples have decided to delay their special day

until next year.

Although it does not sound very romantic, it is worth remembering that a marriage or civil partnership is a contract, which legally recognises your spouse or civil partner.

Couples who live together but who are not married or in a civil partnership are at a disadvantage as there is very little provision for cohabiting partners should one die.

Claire-Marie Selwood, who is a Wills and Probate Solicitor at Phillips Solicitors incorporating Brain Chase Coles explains: "Despite what many people think, there is no such thing as 'Common Law Marriage'."

"If you die without a Will, your estate will be governed by the Rules of Intestacy, and your life partner/cohabitee will not be classed as your next of kin. The Rules of Intestacy will determine how your property is divided and distributed irrespective of the number of years you have lived together. This could result in your estate being divided amongst your surviving family members to the exclusion of your life partner/cohabitee and this may not be what you would want to happen."

"Therefore, I would strongly advise cohabiting couples who are postponing their wedding or civil partnerships to make a Will."

Ordinarily, a Will made prior to marriage is automatically revoked once the marriage has taken place unless the Will is explicitly made in contemplation of that marriage.

"We can easily arrange for a Will to be drafted with a clause that incorporates the intention to marry or form a civil partnership. This means you don't have to wait until after you are married to make your Will," said Claire-Marie.

"They provide clarity and peace of mind. If you are not sure when your wedding of civil partnership will take place, you can use the time in the lead up to your delayed nuptials to make suitable provision for your future spouse or civil partner."

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## <u>Update on behalf of Chineham Medical</u> <u>Practice Patient Participation Group.</u>

COVID-19 has presented us with a substantial challenge over the past few months and the Chineham Medical Practice wanted to thank patients for their support, patience and resilience during this time. Out of necessity the way care for patients has changed in order to keep both patients and staff safe. This has meant all initial contacts are now made through telephone or video call.

The practice has seen that a lot of the work people would previously attended the practice for, can be delivered safely and effectively via phone and more recently video consultation. In the future in the next phase of how we manage COVID-19, the normal care provided for patients will start to resume, although how this is safely and efficiently achieved is still be considered.

If you haven't already and need advice, why not try using our online consultation, e – consult? This is accessible through the practice web page. You can use this to ask questions about new or existing problems and can submit helpful information about long term conditions like blood pressure monitoring. The practice aims to respond with these in 48 hours and often this will be via a text message. Text messages are playing an increasingly valuable role in both in giving information or advice and also helping GPs understand your issues better. Pictures can now be sent in reply which has helped manage things remotely. Similarly, utilising video consultations regularly have been an effective way of managing many conditions and allows you to remain in the comfort and safety of your own home. There may still be times when you need to physically see a doctor / nurse / health care assistant and this can be done at the practice with full protective equipment.

It is difficult to predict for how long these arrangements will be necessary. Your support and help to deliver the safest and most effective service is appreciated. Thank you.
