

However, not to be beaten, the Club - with the wile and guile that's kept it successfully responding to the needy of the town for 53 years - sought an alternative way to ensure the day was still marked, gaining much valued help from **MORRISONS SUPERMARKET**.

On a global scale the aim of this day, on which Lions Clubs around the world conduct various sight-related projects, is to focus attention on the universal issue of avoidable blindness and visual impairment and thus raise awareness about the importance of eye health and the need for quality eye care services for all.

On **WORLD SIGHT** DAY itself, between 9.30am-4.30pm, members of the Club will be on hand to accept, thank personally and, if wished, explain the work of the Basingstoke branch of Lions International, the largest voluntary association in the world. Perhaps even our mascot 'Lennie' might drop in – socially distancing of course!

So shoppers, take your unloved, unwanted, unused spectacles with you on your supermarket shop – or make a special journey anyway (free parking!); they WILL find another home. Such a simple act can change the lives of the ultimate recipients beyond measure.

The school is nearing completion on the old Chineham Park School site. You can read more about it in the centre pages. They have to run a consultation to ask the government to give final permission to run the school for our very special needs children it will be on line and you can fill in the consultation brochure. I will get some and put some in the community centres. I was interested to know about how they would blend in with the Popley community, I was really impressed on how committed they were to being part of our community and want to involve us in the school. Once up and running they will have meetings and events there. I did tell them that Popley is a great community and has a heart of gold and I was sure we will welcome all the children, staff, parents and carers to Popley all of us? To contact me. Popley West:schools are back and already we have been contacted about inconsiderate parking with some residents not being able to get into or drive out of their garage, by one school and parking for up to half an hour before pick up time at another. Please also remind your children about road safety sometimes in the excitement of wanting to get home they forget to look or cars are parked and they just can't see round them if the road is clear.

The overgrown hedge has now been cutback in Tintern Close at one of the side entrances to the school, after we sent in a load of photos to the council. Some other works have been done and also the spraying of weeds at the entrance to Appleton and Barrington. A tree with dead branches in Selby Walk were cut and removed. There will be a borough wide spraying of weeds starting at the end of the month. The road at the top of Don Allen Drive will have a coned off area wide enough for the students of year eight to use to get safely into school with the new Covid-19 rules. Most residents are considerate about cutting back their hedges especially when they encroach over pathways but some are not. I was unable to stay safely on the paths when travelligz in my buggy and had to go out onto the road, prams and pushchairs would have the same problem, it is even more urgent with the children going back to school.

Residents will be aware that neither play area has had any substantial improvements for many years.

To enable any works to be undertaken we needed to seek funding and in February we submitted expressions of interest requesting funds from the Borough Council Local Infrastructure Fund. The applications successfully passed to the next stage. During the lockdown we then worked on the preparation and submission of the full applications and we are delighted to confirm that both have been successful and so later in the year we will be working with Officers on some initial ideas for the improvements which are hoped to be delivered next year. Public consultation surveys will also be sent to local residents seeking their opinion on what they would like to see.

Basingstoke police would like to pass on the following information from Hampshire's Trading Standards, who look into and try to reduce any financial abuse involved in the sale of good or services, which includes doorstep crime incidents and fraud/scam attempts.

Fraud is the most commonly reported crime, and anyone can become a victim, regardless of age, sex, or income. Every year the British public loses billions of pounds to fraudsters who bombard

us with online, mail, door-to-door and telephone scams. Fraud occurs when someone lies or deceives you in order to cause harm, most commonly by taking money.

Hampshire Trading Standards would like to warn residents about cold callers at the door offering to clean driveways. The warning is relevant Countywide and Basingstoke police have received multiple reports over the past few months of individuals deceiving residents out of their hard-earned money in return for very poor quality work.

The cold callers are offering to clean driveways and will try to do a demonstration. They are very persistent, and will try to persuade the resident to have the work done, sometimes starting without permission. No paperwork is given before the work starts, and any flyers may contain false information and contact details. Payment in cash is requested. They also frequently offer to drive the resident to a cash point so that they can empty their bank account for them.

Advice from Trading Standards:

• TS strongly advise residents not to agree to work that is instigated as a result of a cold call.

• Residents should obtain multiple written quotes from reputable businesses or traders who are either members of the Buy With Confidence scheme or a recognized trade association.

• To inform Trading Standards about cold calling, please report the matter to the Citizens Advice Consumer Helpline on 0808 223 1133. Please also try to obtain a name and address for the company.

Basingstoke police would also advise:

• Be suspicious! If it seems 'too good to be true', it usually is.

• Take time to consider offers or deals, do not be pressured into accepting things before you have time to think. Insist on time to obtain advice before making a decision.

• Do not hand over money or sign anything until you have checked the credentials of the company or individual.

• Never send money to anyone you do not know or trust, or use methods of payment that you are not comfortable with.

School Governor Vacancies

Our Governing Body is made up of Parents, Staff, Local Authority and Co-opted Governors, Co-opted Governors include both parents and members of the community. We currently have opportunities for both Parent and Co-opted governors.

Being a school governor is a challenging but hugely rewarding role. It will give you the chance to make a real difference to young children, give something back to your local community and use and develop your skills in a board-level environment.

Schools need governing boards that have a balance and diversity of knowledge, skills and experience to enable it to be effective. Anyone aged 18 or over can be a governor or trustee (but there are some exceptions) and you do not need to be a parent of a child in the school. There is no requirement for you to have an understanding of the education system, just the necessary skills, character and time to contribute.

Our school needs and would benefit from a range of professional knowledge on the governing board including finance and fundraising, human resources, legal, marketing and public relations, IT and social media, property and estates management, and organisational change.

You should be prepared to commit to the role, be confident in having courageous conversations; curious with an enquiring mind; able to challenge the status guo to improve things; collaborative to build strong relationships, creative and innovative.

BDDF quickly responded to lockdown by moving our services on-line. We focused efforts on

tackling isolation for our members by providing support virtually. Offering both weekly coffee & chat and chair yoga sessions.

We also continued to provide our signposting activities which help those with disability related queries.

BDDF are slowly reintroducing face to face yoga, whilst continuing the online sessions - both are free to attend.

We are also exited to announce our brand NEW weekly Walking Group which again is free to attend, open to all abilities and strictly follows Government group guidelines. Funded by 'Energise Me' these social walks are already being thoroughly enjoyed by our members, an opportunity to make new connections whilst getting exercise and fresh air.

Our next annual disability information day will take place in The Malls shopping centre on Friday 26th March 2021. If you are a local disability service or business operating in Basingstoke and are interested in exhibiting do get in touch.

Over the summer BDDF organised Chineham and Sherfield Park's first ever Scarecrow Trail. With 5 awards all voted for by the public, the community spirit shone and competition for the coveted title of 'best in show' was fierce with 91 displays all based around the theme of books.

Our local charity partner for 2020 was the incredible Sebastian's Action Trust who support children and the families of children with life limiting and life threatening illnesses.

We are so grateful to everyone who supported, entered a scarecrow, sponsored and donated raffle prizes and of course our volunteers. Thanks to you all it was a huge success raising over £5k.

The feedback suggests we would be welcomed back. We plan to reach out in the new year to seek volunteers to be part of the 2021 organising committee.

Update on behalf of Chineham Medical Practice Patient Participation Group.

COVID-19 has presented everyone with challenges during 2020. The Chineham Medical Practice would like to thank patients for their support, patience and resilience during this time. The practice team are currently preparing to deliver the 2020 Flu Vaccination Programme which is one of the most effective interventions we have to reduce pressure on the health and social care system this winter, particularly as we may be faced with circulation of COVID-19 and flu at the same time.

Those most at risk from flu are also vulnerable to COVID-19. We anticipate that concerns about COVID-19 may increase demand for flu vaccination in all groups this year, and some in at risk groups may have concerns about maintaining social distancing when being given the vaccine.

We have therefore planned our flu vaccination sessions on **Saturdays** starting 26 September 2020 until 24 October 2020. Patients who are eligible are being contacted by text and letters if they do not have a mobile number on their records. As we endeavour to vaccinate more than 400 people per day, the vaccination sessions will operate in the following specific way.

 \cdot Vaccination sessions will cover **flu only.** Other vaccines e.g. shingles and pneumonia will not be provided.

·We will have 2 practice nurses and 4 doctors working every Saturday from 09.00 - 16.00·36 patients will be booked in for every half hour. If you are booked and cannot attend please notify us as soon as possible.

 \cdot The car park will be closed.

·We will have 3 marshals on the site to operate a one-way system.

•Patients will be shown where to queue outside the building, entering via the main entrance and leaving via the patio.

·Each patients' temperature will be taken before entering the building.

We hope this approach will ensure all our priority patients can receive the vaccination at the earliest opportunity and thank you for your cooperation and support.

Rotary and the World Celebrate The Eradication of Polio in Africa

We are in the middle of a Covid 19 pandemic and are resting our hopes on a vaccination being developed quickly, so it was a timely reminder of other ongoing work on serious worldwide illness when it was declared, by the World Health Organisation on 25/8/2020, that Polio had



been eradicated in Africa. Polio has long been a feared viral infection that mainly affects children for which there is no cure. It causes nerve injury which leads to

death or partial or full paralysis. Whilst the last outbreak of polio in the UK was in the 1970's there are still many people in our country that live with the paralysing effects of this disease. British children are still routinely vaccinated against Polio and kept safe from infection.

Polic is preventable with vaccination

Rotary has been working to eradicate polio for more than 30 years. Our goal of ridding the world of this disease is closer than ever.

As a founding partner of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative, we've reduced polio cases by 99.9 percent since our first project to vaccinate children in the Philippines in 1979.

We've helped immunize more than 2.5 billion children in 122 countries. So far, Rotary has contributed more than £1.4 billion toward eradicating the disease worldwide.

Today, polio remains endemic only in Afghanistan and Pakistan, but it's crucial to continue working to keep other countries polio-free. If all eradication efforts stopped today, within 10 years, polio could paralyse as many as 200,000 children each year.

These agencies have been working since 1996 to try to eradicate the virus from the African continent with sustained vaccination campaigns. Almost 9 billion polio vaccines have been delivered in the eradication programme and this will continue and needs to be funded

The part played by Jonas Salk

The unsung hero of this battle is a man named Jonas Salk, an American virologist and medical researcher who



developed one of the first successful polio vaccines which quelled one of the biggest outbreaks of Polio in the US when it was introduced in 1952. The rolling out of Polio vaccination programmes around the world has been a great success. Joseph Salk has been hailed for his altruism, he chose to not patent the vaccine or seek any



profit from it in order to maximize its global distribution and in doing so he gave the world a great gift.

Until we end polio forever, every child is at risk.

Smallpox is the only deadly disease to have been eradicated. This was in 1979. Polio is close to eradication but we will need to continue to fund the programme until it is achieved. Rotary Clubs around the world are committed to continue to fund the vaccination programme. Since the year 2000 The Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation have matched Rotary International funding by 2 to 1 to give a huge boost to the programme. We've reduced cases by 99.9% since 1988.

Worldwide scientists are working on a vaccine for Covid 19. Hopefully altruism will play a part so that it will be available to all, not just those who are able to pay but include those in the developing world with less ability to pay



For me the beauty of Italian cuisine is it's simplicity. This dish is a testament to that. Pappa al Pomodoro (Bread & Tomato Soup) is a real classic from Tuscany, a typical peasant dish like so many of the great Italian staples. It is said to originate from 12th century Florence.

The beauty of this Italian recipe, is that it's main ingredients are ones that you'll almost always have in. Tinned tomatoes and bread, but don't be fooled, this simple dish is packed full of flavour. It's pretty versatile too, in that you can enjoy it hot, cold or at room temperature. Making it perfect for any time of year!

> Prep Time – 5 minutes Cook Time – 35 minutes Serves – 4

1. Preheat the oven to 200C.

2. Finely chop the garlic. Roughly chop your fresh tomatoes and place on a baking tray, sprinkle over 1/3 of the garlic. Drizzle with olive oil, balsamic vinegar and season with salt and pepper. Toss then place in the oven for 30 minutes or until nicely roasted.

Method:

- 3. Place a large saucepan over a medium heat. Finely chop the onion, remove the basil leaves from the stalks then finely chop the stalks. Add the onion and basil stalks to the pan along with the remaining garlic and a splash of olive oil.
- 4. Once the onion has softened, approx 10 minutes, add the two tins of tomatoes. Fill one of the empty tins with water and add too the pan. Bring to the boil and then turn down to a low simmer for 15 minutes.
- 5. Roughly chop or tear up your bread and basil leaves. After 15 minutes, add the bread and basil to the saucepan. Give it a good mix to get all the bread coated. Keep over a low heat for a further 10 minutes.
- 6. Remove your tomatoes from the oven and tip into the saucepan, including all the juices, oil and sticky bits. Season with salt and pepper, add the 50ml of olive oil then mix into the soup.
- 7. The soup should have a thick, porridge like texture with some larger lumps of bread remaining (although they should have softened). If it's too thick you can loosen with a splash of warm water.
- 8. Serve a generous helping with a light shaving of Parmesan and a light drizzle of olive oil. I like to allow it to cool for 5 minutes before tucking in, so that it's warm but not piping hot.

How and Why I Became a GP (S)



Probus Club member, Dr Nick Waring, many years a partner at Gillies Health Centre in Brighton Hill, tells what prompted his calling.

His father was involved with the St John's Ambulance Brigade and the fact he also manufactured surgical needles encouraged

Nick Waring's interest in medicine joining the Welsh National School of Medicine in Cardiff in 1966.

He recalled instances during student training that showed that practicing on patients was part of the curriculum. There was a saying "see one, do one, teach one."

The first baby he delivered as a student arrived the evening man landed on the moon. It was a boy and, of course, named Neil.

His first job was in Southampton working for Prof Donald Acheson, who became the national Chief Medical Officer and then to work for WHO. Even though now qualified as a doctor, training involved two more years in various jobs in hospitals followed by another year as a trainee.

In 1972 he started in Basingstoke as a GP. His personal list grew from 0 to 3,500 in eighteen months. They had an on-call rota system working one night in five with a full day's work either side. The Hantsdoc co-op came just in time as most GPs were on their knees.

Hand written patient records gave way to computerisation with today, ancillary staff taking on more of the roles

traditionally carried out by a GP. It is a different job to the one he started out with.

Retiring in 2007, he is aware of how difficult it is to know when to seek medical help. He appreciates how problematic it can be for people to decide either self-care or use the medical service responsibly. But it is better to call unnecessarily than not call at all when you need to.

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NEW SEN SCHOOL PLANNED IN BASINGSTOKE FOR CHILDREN WITH SOCIAL COMMUNICATION NEEDS

Background

The Austen Academy is a Special Educational Needs (SEN) school that has been proposed by Hampshire County Council and sponsored by Catch22 Multi Academies Trust (MAT).

The Academy will offer full time education and therapeutic support to 125 pupils aged 4 to 16 years old with Social Communication Needs (SCN) associated with a diagnosis of Autism and who cannot be adequately supported to access education in mainstream schools. Located in Basingstoke, the pupils attending the school will be nominated by Hampshire County Council. The Academy will be based at Shakespeare Road, Basingstoke, RG24 9BP in a newly constructed building on the site of the old Chineham Primary School. It is planned that the Academy will open in April 2021

Our Vision and Ethos for the Academy

Catch22 MAT provides young people with a full-time educational offer to enable them to progress and succeed in sustained education or employment.

We believe all children and young people have the capacity to learn regardless of their life situation. It is our role to unlock that learning potential. As well as providing the opportunity for young people to achieve academically, the school will provide personalised therapeutic support which will enable children and young people to build the confidence and the emotional resilience they need to manage their everyday lives, and develop the language and communication skills necessary to engage positively in the community and eventually to live an independent life through employment and further education.

Education & Curriculum

The school will follow the National Curriculum for all age ranges, reflecting our aim to provide a strong focus on academic attainment for all learners.

Led by the Headteacher Liz Cooper (M. Ed) (*Photo attached*), the academy team will include qualified teaching and learning support staff and advocates who will work with other specialists such as Educational Psychologists, Special Educational Needs Coordinators (SENCOs), Speech and language therapists and Occupational Therapists. Together they will work not only with the young people, but their families and agencies too.

The Primary Curriculum will provide learners with a solid foundation in literacy, numeracy and other national curriculum subjects, as well as a focus on emotional well-being and social understanding and interaction.

Compulsory subjects at Secondary level are Maths, English, Science, Information and Communications Technology, Personal Social and Health Education, Physical Education and Religious Education. There will also be opportunities to develop more practical skills in art, music, drama, food technology and design technology. Students will be taught how to manage their anxiety and emotional regulation and develop a better understanding of the world in preparation for adult life. There will be an emphasis on developing skills for employment and students will have the opportunity to study additional vocational subjects depending on interest and ability. Work experience placements and opportunities will be sought for the students as appropriate.

Admissions

The Austen Academy will specialise in providing places for learners with Social Communication Needs associated with a diagnosis of Autism identified on an Education Health and Care Plan (EHCP).

There will be places for 125 pupils aged 4 to 16 of all genders who will be offered a full-time place.

For a young person to be admitted, the school must be named, by a local authority, in the child's Education Health and Care Plan ('EHCP'). Catch22 will collaborate with the Hampshire County Council's SEN team to ensure that the school is the right place for the prospective pupil. Parents wishing their children to benefit from our provision should contact Hampshire County Council.

The Austen Academy is committed to equal opportunities and all pupils will have equal access to the curriculum

In summer 2018, Hampshire County Council selected Catch22 Multi Academies Trust to be the sponsor of their proposed free school and to proceed to the pre-opening stage.
