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

"North Popley and Replacement John Hunt of Everest School - Project Update"

Since my last contribution, the project has continued a pace over the summer. Following the completion of the initial infrastructure works which saw the introduction of traffic lights (with a pedestrian phase) to the Popley Way/Chineham Lane junction and construction of the first part of the spine road that will serve the replacement school, the Enabling Works for the replacement school have been undertaken. These works have involved the cut and fill exercise to create the playing fields and formation level for the proposed replacement school buildings. With the good weather these works have finished earlier than anticipated, and this means that before the commencement of the Main Contract in the New Year, it has been decided that Sherborne Road will re-open for the interim period. Once the Main Contract and the second infrastructure contract starts Sherborne Road will be again closed to allow the works to be undertaken in an effective manner.

Unfortunately, September saw the visit from some unwanted "friends" on the North Popley site and this has necessitated the introduction of earth bunds along the new access road and down the Chineham Lane and Sherborne Road frontages to prevent further access opportunities.

This autumn will see further site preparation works including further archaeological investigations (now on site), together with further parts of the strucutural planting along the ridgeline of the site.

The first phase of the existing school site was marketed this summer, and the projected site value supports the cost envelope for the replacement school project and has allowed cost certainty for the school project to be achieved. The selected purchaser for the phase 1 land has presented a contemporary scheme of very high quality and is just the kind of scheme we are seeking as a precursor to the quality of development we hope to achieve for the North Popley site.

One of the most significant pieces of work undertaken in the summer has been a branding exercise for the North Popley site which is so called as a consequence of the Local Plan designation for the site. As the owner of the site, the County Council has been keen to create the right image for the site which both reflects its ambition to achieve a high quality scheme of development whilst at the same time creating strong links to existing Popley. Through consultation with the community a new name for the site, Merton Rise has been identified. The key message associated with the new development is "A Connected Community".

A formal launch for the site is planned in early December, to be followed by a series of community events. There will be new sites boards (planning application for these being currently determined), a launch brochure aimed at the community available in December, a future project magazine and a new website: www.mertonrise.co.uk which is currently under construction. With the commencement of the Main School contract, the marketing of the first pahse of development land on the new Merton Rise site in January 2006 the project has entered a very exciting stage. Watch out for more updates in Popley Matters, local mail-outs, events and importantly the new project website.

Diaries from the Old Codger

I don't know how many readers of this page are Cockneys. For the people that do not know, it is a person born within the sound of St Mary-la-Bow church and the dialect has been born out of that area. Someone said we are common, someone said we are uncouth but the truth is we are a caring and friendly bunch willing to help anyone in need. At our house at meal times a place was always ready in case some one came in, they would be invited for a share of the meal that was in front of us. I never knew a Cockney that had the back door locked, no one came to the front unless you were a stranger; then you would be invited in, not left on the door step. This is how I was brought up and my children as well. If having a what we would call a good old fashion knees up (party) then yes we did have some good times, food and drink flowed but no trouble came into the house.

I was one of five children born in or just after WW2 We still had ration books but we made life as comfortable as we could. As I go around talking to people in Basingstoke no one turns their nose up at the way I act or talk, so when you read in the local press that a person is calling us common or that Cockney accent hurts it is racist against a people that were the back bone of the country in both wars by keeping supply lines open in order that the country survived, Men and woman working along side each other unloading ships of food, working in the munitions factories so we could defend the country. Men and women dying side by side when the bombs were raining down on London. These are the people that one person in Basingstoke has insulted to a degree that they should make a written apology to them, o.k. the Old Codger gets up and shouts but it is for my people that I do this, it is for the Cockney spirit yes, we can ignore it and turn the other cheek but why should we. The over spill was 35 years plus ago how long is it that this person has been grieving over this, have they been festering all this time. We are proud of Basingstoke for what they gave us and in return we hope we have paid Basingstoke back by what we have put into this great town. I know our local paper has to publish letters but to publish what I feel is a racist letter was not in keeping with the Gazettes good reputation. I hope I have not upset too many of you by this page this month but we are trying to get harmony among us all, not start to divide the community into segregation Cockneys Popley Poets, Welsh the Abbeys, Scots the Islands, is this what our town now wants? I only want a life now of peace for her in doors and me. The one thing that has come out of all this is the emails I have had and the outrage of people over the comment in the letter.

Now lets move on. On 19th October in Popley Dell we saw the erection in the trees of all the hard work the local schools have put into their projects The work by the chilren was outstanding. I would like to thank the council, Q.M.C, the art tutor and poet that spent so much of their time in helping the children. It has been a great success I hope now this can go forward onto the main plan for this area which is to landscape and put in the monoliths with poetry on them, then for schools to use the area as an out door activity. Well done to you all, by the way thank you Merton School for letting me come along and see your efforts, oh yes and the lovely mess the teachers got in to they were having as much fun as the children. My name is Julie Pior for those of you who do not know me I am the Scheme Manager of Magnolia Court in Popley Way, managed by Downland Housing Association, which is Sheltered Housing for older people who want to lead an independent life in their own home. It is designed to provide independence in a secure and friendly environment. My role is to support tenants, encourage independence and help tenant's in organising social activities. If necessary contacting Social Services or other health professionals on residents behalf to arrange for additional help to be given in your own home. For example, meals on wheels, or help with personal care.

Scheme Managers are not on duty 24 hours a day and cannot provide nursing or home care services. We have out-of-hours cover provided 365 days a year emergency service to ensure that help is available even when the Scheme Manager is not on duty.

We have Bingo once a month, hairdressers on a Wednesday and Friday and coffee mornings every Thursday at 10.30am. All are welcome
