

Merton Rise and proposed Everest Community College-Project Update

Well We "launched" successfully in early December, and from now onwards the North Popley site shall be known as Merton Rise.

On 1st December 05, the County Council held a Launch Event at the Apollo Hotel, on Popley Way to an invited audience of representatives from the development industry (development companies and architectural practices), together with Members and Officers from the County Council and Borough Council. The Leader of Hampshire County Council, Cllr Ken Thornber made the keynote speech, whilst I and another project team colleague undertook to do the main presentations. The event ended with a question and answer session which demonstrated the significant interest in the project, followed by a buffet lunch. In all some 80 people attended.

The purpose of the launch was to market the name change for the site, but also to share with the development industry the intended basis of sale where there will be a key emphasis on the quality of design in all the buildings on the site.

On Friday 9th and Saturday 10th December then saw the Community Launch of Merton Rise to which all residents in Popley were invited. Although I am sure the weather and Christmas shopping played their part, we were pleased to welcome approaching 130 residents to the Abbey Road Hall and Base 2000 over the 2 days. For those that were not able to attend, the display information is summarised on the community website: www.hants.gov.uk/mertonrise which went live on 1st December 05. Some copies of the community launch brochure together with a Merton Rise calendar were left at both venues and more can be provided if needed.

Finally, by the time you read this the Main School Contract will have started! Wates Construction Ltd are the County Council's contractor for a proposed 16 month contract with a target opening of Everest Community College programmed for September 2007. It will again be necessary to close Sherborne Road for this contract to proceed safely and local diversions will operate via Chineham Lane as before.



Free local NHS help to stop smoking

The NHS is offering a New Year programme of free Quit Smoking services to all North Hampshire residents. Given the right help, people *can* stop smoking. It is not always easy but sometimes it is a lot easier than expected!

Quit Smoking Advisers provide you with positive support, encouragement and, through your GP, help you get on prescription something to help you stop, such as nicotine patches, gum and lozenges (they double your chances of quitting successfully and are very safe medicines indeed). The service is flexible: it does recommend you to attend a quit smoking group*; but if there is no group running in your area or you can't attend a group, one-to-one appointments or drop-ins are often available.

The service currently runs evening and daytime services in various locations. At Basingstoke help is offered at: the hospital, the Vyne School, Church Grange near the town centre, Basingstoke library, the Sports Centre, Carnival Hall, Church Cottage near St Michael's Church, Buckskin, Winklebury, Popley, Oakridge, South Ham, and with more being set up all the time. Services also run at Alton, Bordon, Kingsclere and Tadley. Many clinics have free parking. (You can look up a sample of the clinics at www.bvhpct.nhs.uk (under You and Your Health) or www.northhampshire.nhs.uk/services/quit smoking) If you can't a service to suit you, do call us and we shall try to help).

It doesn't matter how long you have been smoking or how old/young you are. If you would like to know about the free NHS help available simply **phone 0845 602 4663**. Or you can pick up a leaflet at the doctor's- if you can't see any in the waiting room, just asks the receptionist. If you know of a clinic starting that you want to attend, you can e-mail your full details (and which clinic) to: quit.smoking@bvhpct.nhs.uk

*(Studies have shown they are the best way to stop- and so many people say that coming to the group was what helped them most)

Popley Crime News Garage Break-ins

Popley has suffered badly in the last few months with garages being broken into. It would seem that garages in all areas in Popley are suffering. The standard locks on the garages are easy to force and I would urge all

garage users to fit a hasp and staple with a padlock to your garage door **ASAP**. These can be purchased fairly cheaply from DIY stores and will greatly reduce the chances of you garage being targeted.

Have you heard about anyone selling cheap second hand tools or garage equipment in the area? You can call crime stoppers anonymously on 0800 555 111.

Moped Thefts.

This is a constant problem in the area particularly fairly new small engine mopeds. Please do not leave your moped outside in the street at night and again please buy an additional lock and chain your moped to a solid object. This even applies to mopeds kept in garages as these garage are targeted for mopeds so chain your moped to something solid inside.

The mopeds are generally ridden around for a day or so and then burnt out. This is often in or around the Carpenters Down Woods area, so dog walkers please report anything suspicious.

Nuisance youths

The shopping area at Maldive Road has had lots of problems with youths causing antisocial behaviour. Please speak to your children and ask them not to congregate in this area.

Cycle Thefts

Every year hundred of bicycles are stolen in Basingstoke particularly this time of year when lots of new bikes have been given as Christmas gifts. There are a few simple rules which will dramatically reduce the chances of your child's bike being stolen.

Tell your children to never leave their bike unattended even for just a moment even if their just popping into the local shop or going into a friends house. Bicycle locks are available from cycle shops are easily used to lock their bike to something solid like a lamp post or railings. Make sure the bikes are put away at night either in the house, a locked shed or if you do not have a shed make sure your back gate is locked. You will be amazed at

how many bikes I see sat outside the front door at night where children have left them out, gone to bed and forgotten all about them.

The police recover lots of stolen bicycles every year. But most of them have to be auctioned simple because there's no way of knowing who the owners are. You should make a written record of your bike's description as soon as you buy it. Then keep it safe with your other personal documents, so you can hand it to the police if your bicycle is stolen. Take a clear colour photo of your bike and attach it to written record of the description.

You should note the following details:

Name

Address

Make/Model

Type (gents/ladies/sports/mountain/BMX etc)

Frame Number

Position of number on frame

Frame colour/s

Frame size

Wheel size

Tyres (make/colour)

Gears (make/type/number)

Position of gear controls

Handlebar type (standard/straight/drop/mountain)

Accessories (lights/reflectors/chain guard/carriers/bell/toeclips/peedo/pump/tools/etc)

Special features which help to identify it (stickers/badges/marks/repairs/damage)
