



Please also take care to dispose of all your waste in a responsible manner.



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

Dear Friends,

Why is December 21st one of my favourite dates? Because it's the winter solstice; that is, it's the shortest day of the year. After that date it starts to get lighter by a couple of minutes each day and to me it feels as though we've turned a corner. New Year's Eve into New Year's Day is another turning point. We leave the old year behind and welcome the new with all its possibilities for our expectations, hopes and dreams. It's been a pretty intense start to the New Year for me. In the past week I've taken two funerals at St Gabriel's. The first for Fred Herbert, the husband of one of our congregation, and the second for a lady called Debbie Ridgers.

Fred was in his eightieth year and had been struggling with ill health over the past year; Debbie was just fifty and worked for many years at Merton Infant School. For both services the church was full and it was a real testament to the kind of people that Fred and Debbie were that so many gathered to remember them with such love and affection. For me it's one of the greatest privileges I have to be with families at such a time and to listen to the tributes both during and after the service. Neither Fred nor Debbie left behind vast amounts of wealth, property or possessions; they left behind a legacy that will endure much longer than any of these, that is to say, the relationships with families and friends and the lives they touched, however briefly, and in whatever way. Not so much of "what's in your wallet?" but "what's in your heart?"

For Fred and Debbie's families and friends the edge will have been taken off the Christmas and New Year celebrations and greatly dulled and perhaps for many of us it is already only a dim and distant memory and yet the legacy of Christmas, the life of Jesus Christ, lives on in the hearts of 1.2 billion Christians around the world and in their relationship with Him who was born to die and yet be raised again to eternal life for each and every one of us!

I know that many of you received our Christmas leaflet inviting you to one of our services over the holiday period. I know too, that many of you responded. All our services were well attended this year. Many of you also picked up on the advert for our forthcoming Alpha course on the back of the leaflet and have been asking for further details.

The Alpha Course is an opportunity to find out about the Christian faith in an informal atmosphere. We begin with a meal and then a talk and then break into small groups, individually led, for the chance to talk and ask any questions. There is absolutely no pressure and better still – no cost involved – at least, not to your wallet. Popley Conservation Volunteers

As you know from previous articles in Popley Matters, Popley is the home of the Great Crested Newt, a European protected species. Protection of this species is taken very seriously. When work on site recently threatened the safety of these amphibians, the contractors of Marnel Park development, Hampshire Wildlife Crimes Officer, DEFRA and others were called to a meeting on site to resolve the problem.

It is good to know that protection of this species is written into the development of Marnel Park. It is known that many of the newts used to spend much of their terrestrial life in the field which is now destined for new

housing. In order to mitigate against the loss of this habitat, areas of land around the development have already been planted with trees and shrubs and new ponds have been excavated. All this work is to enhance the habitat for these amphibians. However it is known that the newts migrated north from Popley Ponds towards Spiers Copse in Basing Forest. With the building of a new estate this migration route will now be denied.

Therefore a new corridor is being created to aid the migration. This consists of a corridor along the side of Carpenters Down road. A problem arises at the points where access roads are being constructed into the new estate. Newts do not travel quickly and stand a good chance of being squashed if they have to migrate across roads. To overcome this, newt underpasses are being constructed under the access roads. These constructions as far as is known, have never been used before. So in this respect, Popley is at the cutting edge of conservation. Lets hope the underpasses work.

Popley Conservation Volunteers always welcome people who want to contribute towards environmental conservation in and around Popley.

Roadworks: yes we've seen quite a bit of them recently, but you ain't seen nothing yet! Work is due to start putting in traffic lights on the A33/ringway roundabout and the A33/Popley Way junction later on this year. The Popley Way work is to cater for the new build and is designed to take the extra traffic away from Carpenters Down. The A33 roundabout is so busy it needs lights to cope with the rush hour queues, plus it has had 43 accidents in the last 3 years, the second worst rate in Hampshire. At least we will have some tangible improvements, unlike the complete farce at Brighton Hill roundabout, but nevertheless expect considerable delays for several months when the works go ahead...you have been warned!

Marnel Park: you will have noticed the return of the one-way traffic lights in Carpenters Down after the Xmas break. Work is starting on the second access road, and more drainage works are planned which will also affect Carpenters Down. A Planning Application has been submitted for Phase 2 of the build: it's much the same as Phase 1, which has already been granted permission. Construction of Phase 1 should begin in the springtime. I'm in contact with the project manager and hope to keep you updated via my web site.

Longfellow Parade: Sentinel expect to hear back from the Housing Corporation on their grant application some time in March 2006. We can expect a detailed Planning Application to be submitted some time afterwards. I'll keep you posted of events and for latest developments see my web site.

Schools: By the time you read this John Hunt will have received another kicking in the press over league tables. They give far too simplistic a picture of what goes on in our schools and should be abolished. Work will soon start on the new John Hunt site as the new school is expected to open in September 2007. It will be a fantastic school with good public access sports facilities on offer including a proper floodlit running track, provided the NIMBY's in Sherborne St John don't cry foul. We could do with the new sports facilities as most of the existing ones are in the south of the town.

Sure Start Children's Centres: at long last it looks as if we will get one in Popley! Sure Start Children's Centres have been very successful in other parts of the country in raising the attainments of our schoolchildren by providing them and their parents with much needed support in the first few years of life. We should have had one in Popley years ago: it will make a very real difference to our schools.

Popley Festival: 4 months to go! This will be the last on the current site and we intend to make it even better than last year when we had 15000 visitors.

London Marathon: this year I will be running in aid of the British Heart Foundation. I will be doing a lot of promotional work in the local press and with local schools, if anyone wishes to sponsor me, please let me know.

Mind you sales are now on all year round as far as I can see. Oh by the way her in doors did get stuff in Next but it was for our lovely new grand daughter born just before Christmas! *The old codger*

Merton Rise and Everest Community College - Project Update

2006 will see an increase in activity on the Merton Rise site compared with previous years where lots of progress has been made "behind the scenes" in terms of securing planning approvals and funding the replacement school but physical evidence of progress has been rather less obvious.

The Main Contract for the replacement school has now begun in earnest with further ground works and foundations being progressed. As part of these works, Sherborne Road will again be closed (from Monday 30th January) to allow for safe movements of vehicles to complete the preparatory work for the playing fields for the school. On the basis of good and continued progress the new school is programmed to be completed Summer 07 in time for an opening in September 2007.

The second contract to implement the required advance servicing works, which will involve the introduction of traffic lights to the junction of Sherborne Road with Popley Way and the construction of the Spine Road between Sherborne Road and Chineham Lane, is due to commence in May 06 to provide access and servicing for both the school and the first 2 phases of housing proposed on the Merton Rise site.

Further archaeological investigations are currently being undertaken on the land between Sherborne Road and the A340 to the west and the remainder of the ridgeline planting is due to be undertaken shortly to complete this important area of structural planting.

Following the Community Launch of the Merton Rise site before Christmas, the Launch for the first phase of land on the Merton Rise site was held on Friday 20th January. This event was attended by prospective purchasers (developers) and their design teams and there has been a very encouraging response to the design-led strategy proposed for the Merton Rise site. The outcome of the marketing exercise will not be known for several months, but it is proposed that another community event will be held involving the selected purchaser(s) to share their proposals with local residents - probably in the Autumn.

Finally, once the contract 2 works are completed (c. January 2007) it is proposed that the new road will be open for public use. The road will of course need a name at it is proposed that the name could be selected through a consultation process similar to that held for the naming of the replacement school last year. I am in discussions with Steve bate from the Popley Warden team to see how we might do this as part of the forthcoming Popley Festival event where it is likely that the County Council will have a stall to provide an update on the project. Malawi

Going to Africa is a very humbling experience. People live on an average wage of 50p a day: a benefit claimant in Britain would be considered rich in comparison. Many aspects of life have not changed since Dr Livingstone was in Malawi: I still saw villagers drawing water from a pump just like we would have done in Victorian Britain. Some of the mud hut villages I visited had no roads.

People remain in very high spirits, in spite of the many things that can go wrong like illness, starvation, and the depressingly high infant mortality (seeing a funeral procession Soweto-style with a 3ft coffin at the front was particularly poignant).

Steve, an old mate from Uni, had gone back out to Malawi to teach. He had done a stint with VSO for 2 years before deciding to go back to England and study for a Post Graduate Certificate of Education. After 2 years of the National Curriculum and dealing with problem parents he had enough with teaching in England and wanted to go back overseas again as it was more rewarding.

Malawi is relatively well off: it has a relatively stable economy and its government is reasonably well behaved (unlike neighbouring Zimbabwe). People talk of corruption in Africa – I saw very little evidence of it but I did see incompetence on a grand scale, like the Government selling off the maize reserves to Zimbabwe, then realising the rains had failed in the north of the country and people risked going without food. This was reported as "famine" in the western press, before they got bored with the story and started talking trivia about celebrities.

Very little works, and things are best in the cities, where they have running water (still advisable to boil it before drinking) and electricity (most of the time).

Blantyre, the main city, has a population of about 2 million, but no motorways or underground system like a Western city of that size would have. Few people own cars – at 60p a litre, petrol costs more than a day's wages. Most people walk everywhere, some even walk for days across country to neighbouring towns. Most of the streetlights don't work: people tend to steal the wires, someone even tried selling them back to the electricity company.

For those who don't want to walk there are the bicycle taxis – popular in rural areas. The buses are Toyota camper vans filled with about 20 people or big smoky 50-year old things with 100 people with luggage (and occasionally people) piled on the roof. There are no timetables as such, they leave when they are full. The fares are not publicised and depend on the distance and popularity of the route – and police roadblocks. These are set up to stop gun running. I encountered one on the road to Mulanje near the Mozambique border. It looked as if the police were going to strip the vehicle but the Conductor (a man in a removal coat with "conductor" written on it) took the policeman behind the bus and handed him a few notes.

The local currency in Malawi is the Kwacha and there are about 225 of these to the pound. My wallet was filled with 500 Kwacha notes – I had about 4 inches worth stashed in various places. For those of you who watch Eastenders, it looks a bit like 10 grand in fifties – and probably is worth the equivalent to an average Malawian.

It goes without saying you have to be careful when going out after dark in downtown Blantyre – as a "rich person", the risk of mugging is very real but it is a very quiet city compared with

foreign ones like Nairobi and Addis Ababa. Of greater risk during the day is being mobbed by street traders. I parted with £18 for a rucksack full of carvings from 6 people but there must have been another 20 waiting.

Beer costs about 80p in Western bars and a bottle of wine costs the equivalent of a month's wages. The local beer is only a fifth the price but is undrinkable. Most Westerners drive everywhere, even to the pub after dark. Nobody cared about drinking and driving: a bit like Britain in the early 1970's.

Westerners and middle class Malawians make up less than 1% of the population of Blantyre and there is a small community feel as a result. Steve and his friend Raye host a show on national radio and I was asked to appear as a guest.

We spent a few days on safari in Liwonde National Park, staying in a lodge with no electricity, and camped out in mosquito-proof tents. The wildlife is astonishing and we saw plenty of impala, waterbuck, warthogs, some elephants and a baby hippo on night safari. There were only two rhinos in the park and we didn't get to see them.

Christmas day was spent on the Mulanje massif – a mountain range near the Mozambique border. Its average height is 7,000ft above sea level, so it is much cooler. There were also no mosquitoes (no need to sleep under a net, sheer bliss!). We had a spectacular thunderstorm when we were up there, it caught us on a day trip before we could reach the safety of the mountain hut and we got soaked in minutes. Lightning hit the plain we were walking on just a few minutes after we made it back inside. The mountain guide we hired for 1000 Kwacha a day predicted the storm because he heard the chameleons singing.

Most people go to Lake Malawi, but unfortunately I couldn't make it for various reasons, not least having to wait 2 days for my luggage to arrive from Nairobi. I was lucky to get on the Air Malawi flight in the first place as they only have one jet plane – the other one had a bird fly into its engines - and when I arrived in Nairobi at 11pm, despite reconfirming I was not booked on the flight the next morning, I had to wait to 630am to sort it out. Little did I know that the plane stopped at Dubai first and the passengers had filled the hold with TVs, microwave ovens, and the like.

Steve teaches in Blantyre at a "posh" school – it has glass in the windows for a start. Pupils sometimes have riots, and most schools are too poor to make repairs.

Steve has two servants whom he pays about £1 a day. This is good money, and he has been criticised for paying them too much. When he leaves, they will struggle to find jobs which pay as well. This can really screw up the economy if repeated across the ex-pat community. When the South African Shop Rite supermarket opened in a posh shopping mall designed for rich people like Steve, they offered hourly rates better than daily wages for many other jobs. People must have jumped at the chance.

If anything is going to change in Africa, it will not come about through the traditional Western means of "helping out". Raye is a veteran of Ethiopia and has very few kind words to say about Bob Geldof and Bono. We give them food and steal their doctors and nurses, give them debt relief and screw them in other ways. The best hope will be that the new generation who have been to Uni in the West will come back and run things. Many are doing very well running broadband services and mobile phones, which are owned by more people as land lines are so expensive. Maybe there's hope for Malawi and Africa yet. *Andrew McCormick*
