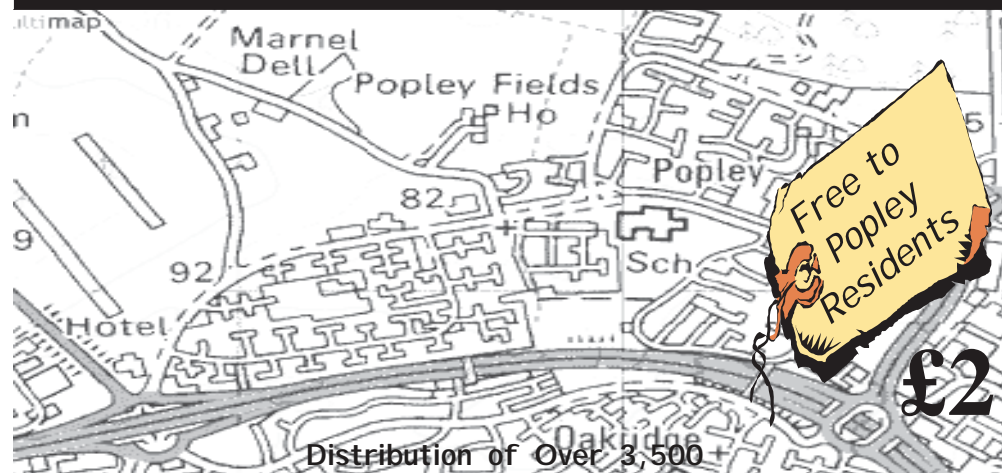

Popley Festival 2006

Well the weather forecast said it would rain, and they weren't wrong. It tipped it down for most of the day, and as we expected the numbers would be way down, but, remarkably, people came out. While we didn't get the 15,000 we had last year, it was still an impressive turnout and we estimate about 4000 plus people attended over the space of the day.

A gang of stalwarts were encamped outside the live stage, complete with raincoats and umbrellas. Most of the acts went ahead as planned. It takes more than a few drops of rain to stop the Popley Festival!

The John Hunt Parents Association burger stall attracted long queues from 12.30 onwards as a brief gap in the rains attracted people to the field.

There was also free food (and healthy food at that) available from the H3CS and NHS joint stall. H3CS is responsible for the catering in Hampshire schools and last summer launched a new range of nutritious school foods. There were cooking demos with stir-fries and they were giving away free fruit kebabs all day.

The Police, Community Wardens, Accredited Community Safety Officers and Neighbourhood Watch all shared a tent which funnily enough was closest to the beer tent. Perhaps they had reckoned on it being thirsty work if it was as sunny as last year. They were giving away free footballs as part of a penalty shoot-out competition.

It was very good to see the Popley Conservation Volunteers again who reported brisk trade inside the school. Nature conservation is an important issue at the moment with the new build: the new tunnels are now in place under the access roads and it is hoped that the great crested and other newts will use these to "commute" between Popley ponds and the ponds at the Vyne. The Conservation Volunteers are expanding and taking on nature conservancy work in the woods behind Carpenters Down.

The architects for the new John Hunt School were also inside and reported about 150 enquiries. They are now able to show pictures of the new school being built. The new school should open in Sept 2007.

There were Firefighters, funfair. Karate, information stalls, craft stalls and a magnificent performance of John Hunts famous Steel Band. The boot sale carried on regardless too.

All in all a very good festival, especially considering the obvious handicap of the weather. We had people say it was the best in spite of the rain. Our thanks go to Suki Binning, the organising committee, the various stallholders and volunteers, plus the staff and pupils of John Hunt school for all their hard work.

Basingstoke & District Railway Society

The Society was privileged in April to receive a presentation on the many railways of New Zealand, as well as a wonderful portrayal of one of the most scenic countries in the world. The presenter, Colin Brading, explained that NZ is a long way from anywhere, but is certainly worth the effort or going there as his photos, selected from a collection of over 2000 taken during a tour in the early part of 2002, showed.

As is usual for most tours of NZ, the presentation commenced in Auckland and following visits to a number of small narrow gauge lines in the area the expedition took the North Island Main Trunk 3'6" gauge line 680 kms. south to Wellington. Here again a number of private railways and museums were visited as well as the cable railway and transport systems of the capital.

Crossing the Cook Strait to Picton, what remains of the passenger system on the South Island was traversed, first down to Christchurch, followed by a trip on the Tranz-Alpine line to Greymouth where gradients as steep as 1:33 are experienced over Arthurs Pass. Then followed a road and boat journey down the scenic west coast, over to Queenstown and south to Dunedin where the main line station is the NZ equivalent of London's St. Pancras. Returning to Christchurch a number of interesting private railways were visited before heading back to Wellington and Auckland.

This was a fascinating evening of wonderful photography, and if you have an interest in railways, the B & D R S meets on the second and fourth Wednesday of every month at the Wote Street Club. Telephone Peter Tran on 01256 326096 for details.
