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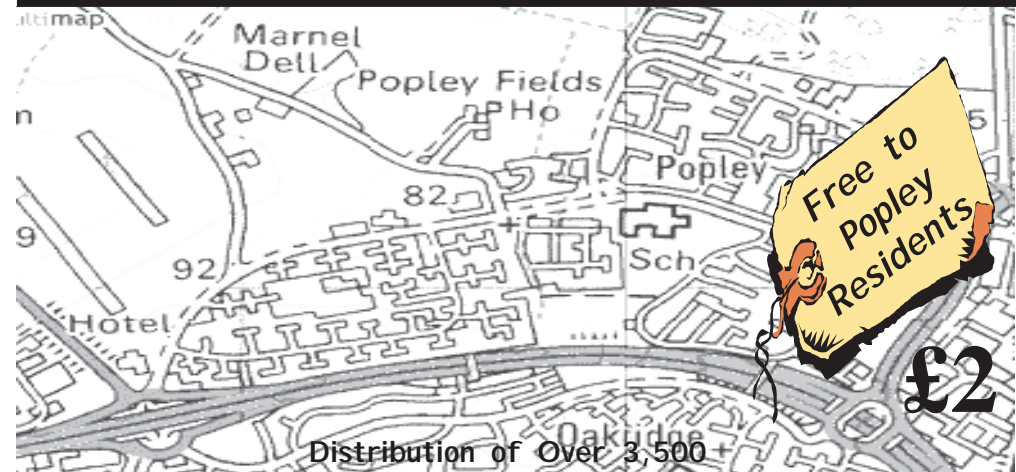

They all seem genuine enough, but they collect the envelopes with the money in from you direct, where most genuine charities will ask you to pay the envelopes direct into their bank account. If you ask for a charity number, and a contact telephone number they put the phone down. Most of the ones I have heard of seem to claim to be some kind of Christian Aid for Africa, but no doubt there are others.

Editors reply; Thank you for letting us know. It is important that you always ask for identification whether at the door or on the phone. Ask for a contact number or, if you are not sure, ring the police. The police have told me they really don't mind if you phone them to check, and we have had some really nasty incidents where distraction burgerlaries have occurred, in particular with our older residents. This often leads to long term phycological results for the victims.

Dear Editor, In the leaflet I saw the advice that we should be careful when leaving bags of items etc out for charity, as they may not be for a genuine charity. You also suggested that we could take it to a charity shop. I can not do this as I don't have a car and I can't carry large or heavy items

on the bus. What do we do with toys, handbags shoes and the like? How do I donate these to charity?

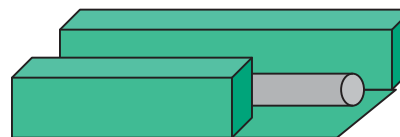
A new sewer for Basingstoke

Since the last issue of Popley Matter we have now started work on site.

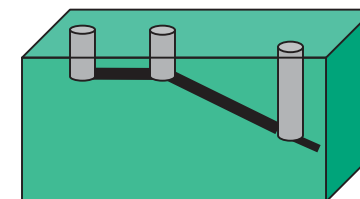
We are continuing our investigation work. If all goes well, we aim to start building the sewer in late September 2006.

We will lay the pipes using two main methods. The first is by open cut. This involves digging a trench where the pipe is to be laid. This method is often chosen when we are working near other underground services such as cables and pipes to avoid damaging them. To limit the disruption, we will be working in short stretches and backfilling as we go.

This second method involves tunnelling. We will be digging a series of deep holes. A small boring machine is then lowered in to join these deep holes together and then we can pull the pipe through. By using this approach, we can tunnel under busy roads and railway lines. The benefit of tunnelling is that it's less disruptive but it can only be used where the ground is free from other cables and pipes.

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Top 10 tips to make your home a safe home

1. Fit a smoke alarm and check it regularly.
2. Make a fire action plan so that everyone in your house knows how to escape in the event of fire.
3. Take care when cooking with hot oil and think about using thermostatically controlled deep fat fryers.
4. Never leave lit candles unattended.
5. Ensure cigarettes are stubbed out and disposed of carefully.
6. Never smoke in bed.
7. Keep matches and lighters away from children.
8. Keep clothing away from heating appliances.
9. Take care in the kitchen! Accidents whilst cooking account for 59% of fires in the home.
10. Take special care when you are tired or when you've been drinking. Half of all deaths in domestic fires happen between 10pm and 8am.

Guided Walk

Binfields Woodland Nature Walk is the new walk leaflet produced by Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council. The walk starts at Chineham District Shopping Centre and takes you on a circular route through Binfields Woodland Park, along the footpaths of Lychpit by Great Binfields Primary School and Centre Court then back into the shopping centre. The leaflet describes the wildlife you will see in the woodland through the four seasons, and as the walk is on hard surfaces and only 1 ¼ miles in length, is suitable for people of all abilities.

The leaflet is available free of charge from the Chineham District Centre Library, Popley Fields Community Centre, and Hampshire County Council Information Centre in Festival Place. Faroe Close and Maldive Road Improvements

Sentinel Housing Association has been working with Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council and architects PRP on plans to transform the homes in Faroe Close and Maldive Road.

Following the extensive public consultation on the different regeneration options which was carried out during March and April, Sentinel's Board has requested that the proposal to redevelop the whole area with a mixed tenure development of up to 240 new houses and flats should be considered in greater detail. All of the proposals will take considerable time to bring forward and the support of both Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council and the Government Regulator the Housing Corporation will be required.

A project team will be set up over the coming months to look closer into design options and regular newsletters will be issued to residents of the area to keep everyone up to date with the latest proposals during the course of the project.

Due to the uncertainty this causes residents about the future, Sentinel are offering the small number of private leaseholders the opportunity to sell back their flat to the Housing Association now, ahead of detailed proposals coming forward. The purchase of flats will have to be in accordance with Government regulations with an independent valuation and legal report being carried out.

It has been a busy summer; over 30 children attended the summer activities each day. There were trips to the beach, the Rose Bowl cricket ground, Saints football stadium and the ArtSway gallery in the New Forest. The activities ranged from sports such as rounders, volleyball, basketball and badminton to a week of art/ photography which culminated in excellent art pieces for the school. The final pieces are on show in the school foyer and are being commented upon on a daily basis.

Funding has been secured for the October half term, so we can continue running the activities for free and keep the age range 8-16 year, so ring us to secure a place.

We are in the throws of enrolling for the Family Learning programme so if you are interested in doing Spanish, a GCSE in Child development or Statistics, pottery or jewellery, dance or want to start a keep fit regime why not join the Monday or Tuesday evening fitness courses. The healthy eating courses are back, come along and cook together as a family with our resident chef! The centre is supporting the National Family Learning week by putting on family steel pans and well-being health workshops on the afternoon of Saturday 7th October. Call us now. The Literacy/Numeracy on Ice project is starting again, Merton Juniors will be first off the mark and we have Eric Braff as the player who will be coming into the schools to work with the children and their families, this is the fifth year of this project and there are now 5 schools involved.

The Children's Conference at the end of the summer school term went really well, feedback was very positive from both the students and the staff. The objective of the day was to embed Rights, Respect and Responsibilities throughout the school and community, to give students a voice and to impact on the curriculum and attitudes towards learning in the school.

A range of workshops were available for the students to choose from including presentations from Dr Keith Thompson, a consultant Anaesthetist and Director of Mercy Ships UK and the Educational Director from 'Save the Children's Fund.' Other workshops involved a video presentation from students from another school talking about their experiences in Uganda. International dance and music workshops were also on offer. John Hunt students ran workshops on peer counselling, lead learners and the role of prefects. In the afternoon JHE staff ran a range of practical workshops all with an international theme. These included the Science Department making volcanoes, Geography doing a trade game, Design & Technology focusing on textiles and the PE area running international sports.

The JHE Student School Council are putting together the fundraising calendar for the year and will again be supporting the local hospital and developing the link with Uganda. Many students have become pen pals and are already corresponding with children at Kakindo Secondary School in Uganda.

Electric Blanket Safety.

Do you have an electric blanket?

Do you know an elderly person who has one?

Has the blanket been checked for safety lately?

Did you know?

- *Old or damaged blankets cause more than 5,000 fires a year.*
- *Each year 20 people are killed and 100 people are injured in fires caused by faulty electric blankets.*
- *Research has shown that electric blankets ten years or older that are still in use in homes in Britain are responsible for 99% of the fires caused by electric blankets.*
- *In the past six years over 4,600 electric blankets have been checked in Hampshire, approximately 45% have failed.*

Electric blanket safety checks:

Make sure you follow the manufacturer's guidelines regarding the use, maintenance and servicing of electric blankets. If you know of an elderly person who uses one, help to ensure that they do the same.

Julie's Gardening Files

I have just finished picking the few fruit off my Greengage tree, but most of it not fit to eat. The latest rain we had just allowed the fruits to swell too fast and the skins burst, so plums may well be affected the same way.

The climbing French Beans I tried in large patio tubs this year have done really well. Next year I aim to try a different variety with purple beans so they are easier to find amongst the foliage.

If any of you invested in a mini greenhouse with the polythene covers which has taken a battering in the wind, you might like to make use of the frame and shelving for another few years. They will happily hold growbags which you can grow a variety of small vegetables or strawberries in. For those of us with small gardens, don't forget you can use wall bags and baskets, or put up shelving to hold the pots. Experiment with what you grow in them, it makes gardening much more interesting and you may well be surprised at what works! How about peas in hanging wall bags? It is something I aim to try next year, so if anyone has already tried this, please do let me know how it went.

The seed catalogues are now going to print, so it is a good time to start thinking about what you want to plant next season. You can mix vegetables into your flower beds to give a productive as well as pretty garden. Some vegetables have pretty flowers too, so check the catalogues or websites for ideas. After carrying water to water my pots and bags every day this summer (and still losing the battle to keep everything alive), I think it makes sense to get something back from it, so the veg will take priority in my garden next year.

Don't forget to think about watering too. There are many plants that cope with drought situations, especially if they are planted early enough to get their roots down before the rain stops. A water butt is essential if you have a water meter, and very useful in a hosepipe ban. You can get them from your water company or garden centre, but shop around to get the best deals.

I have emptied most of my bags and pots into the compost bin now. Break the root systems up to take up less space, and don't forget to add your vegetable peelings. My compost bin has been moved up against a brick wall now, hopefully to help keep the contents warm and break it all down faster. Don't put invasive weeds like dandelion, dockleaf, or bindweed in the compost bin, they will probably survive and the compost will be full of weed when you want to use it.

I have invested in a small garden incinerator to dispose of woody waste from the garden. Add the weeds mentioned above to make sure they are permanently removed from the garden. The ashes are then spread on the garden to put some goodness back into the soil, or dropped into the compost bin.

Right, now I got that off my chest, better get outside and start cleaning out the fish pond.....

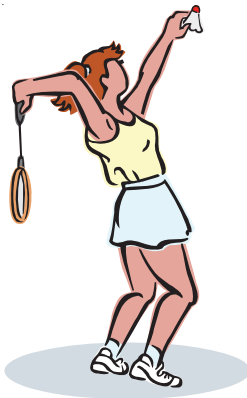

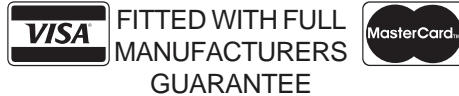

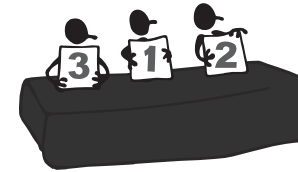

On Tuesday 19th September police conducted an operation in Popley namely Carpenters Down and Popley Way which is now a 30 mph limit. Myself PC Carter and PC Thorne along with the Community Reassurance Traffic Unit headed on the day by PC Mark Talbot were all involved. The operation was targetted on roads that in the past have been used as a speed way. Two static points were used and radar and laser speed guns were untalised and where speeding offences were spotted offenders were issued tickets and points on there licenses. There will be more of these operations in the near future and in the run up to Christmas.

Recently in Popley myself and PC Thorne conducted an operation along with the DVLA and their number plate recognising vehicle. The vehicle's on board camera automatically detects if a car is taxed and police are then in a position to pull over the vehicle and deal with the offences the driver may be committing. The August DVLA operation that we conducted meant that 7 vehicles were seized and crushed. We plan to run a similar operation in October so you have been warned!

PC Thorne and I have also been tackling youth nuisance in Popley with some success which includes sites such as Abbey Road stores, behind the community centre on Carpenters Down and Longfellow Parade. Where we have come across youths with alcohol we have seized the alcohol and poured it away. Underage drinking will not be Tolerated and is also considered anti -social behaviour. On Friday 22nd September PC Thorne and I were in Popley conducting high visibility patrols. Many youths had been spotted out and about and some had consumed alcohol and were generally causing a nuisance.

I appeal to you as parents in Popley to know where your children are at night and to monitor their behaviour. In the last week more Anti Social Behavior contracts have been signed up for youths in Popley and PC Thorne and I will continue to monitor nuisance youths.

With Bonfire Night rapidly approaching please be mindful of fireworks and the inherent dangers they can bring along with the nuisance and distress which members of public can feel around this time. I nearly forgot, also try to have fun!

The Dell is a great place for children to play and a wildlife haven at the top of Tewkesbury Close. But for some time now it's been neglected, being used a dumping ground and fly-tipping hot spot.

Armed with all the equipment and a large trailer the Rubbish Raiders set to work at 10am on 31 August, and by 1pm they had cleared the area so that it was once again a safe play area.
