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

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## Simone's Column

I'm Simone Heath, I am currently a year 10 student at Everest Community College. As you know, we have just moved to a brand new school, which has been an exciting and eventful experience. The building itself is pretty amazing, with its unique, modern, high - tech design.

The school now has some of the best technology and sports equipment around Hampshire, like the new ICT facilities which are fantastic, with computers that are built into the tables. So if you need to use a desk for writing in your lesson as well as a computer, you just push the screen down and you have a desk. That isn't the only great technology that we have, for instance the electronic windows that open to what ever extent you like and all by the push of a button. And if the room temperature gets too high or too low, then the windows automatically open or close. The college also has a swipe card system that *allows us* students and teachers to get in and out of the school, to register (which is still under construction) and also to pay for school meals.

Another great new thing about the college is the sports equipment and the huge courts and pitches. Most of the pitches have Astro turf and flood lights for later matches or clubs. What's more, is we now have a gym that will be opening soon, mainly for public use, where you can use some of the great, new apparatus to keep fit.

The layout of the school has been cleverly thought out, as each block is colour coordinated, to help everyone know where they are or which lesson they should be in. Block 'A' of the school is the green section. Block 'B' is the orange section. And lastly block 'C is the blue section. In every students planner, at the back, is a site map.

The feeling of being in a brand new school is quite bizarre, but it is a privilege to all. It has been very hectic moving over to the college, but still its been exciting. I personally like the college and am having a good time learning in this new environment, yet it still feels strange, as many students would agree But in general I think most pupils are also enjoying their time at ECC.

I would like to make a point about the youth of Popley, as I think most other teenagers would agree that Popley doesn't offer much for us to do. The only thing I know of, is the youth club which is held at the community centre in popley fields. I don't really know much about it myself. I personally think a few more things should be set up for the youth to keep everyone more occupied, instead of just moping around the streets doing absolutely nothing. One suggestion I think most teens would be interested in, is if the council would build us a skate park over Popley fields. It wouldn't have to be very big, but I know a lot of talented young people who ride bikes, skates, and skateboards etc. and they would love to be able to have a local place where they can show their talent. I think that all the teens in favour of a skate park should sign a petition, as I know that loads of youths would really like the idea. I think this would keep the young people of Popley out of trouble, and I think it is good because it will help people to socialise.

### Children and young people in care need you

Jane fosters 14 year old Elliott who is challenging but always rewarding. For the past seven months she has been helping him to build his self confidence through a range of activities, including sailing. "To see improvements in his behaviour and the laughter and excitement in his eyes, especially after sailing, is my reward, and makes it all worthwhile – it is what fostering is all about," she said.

At any one time there are around 1000 children in the care of the local authority with almost 700 currently living in foster families. Foster carers are highly valued members of the community and play a vital role in supporting children in care across Hampshire.

A bus campaign is currently underway across Hampshire acknowledging the excellent work our foster carers do but also encouraging those with an interest to find out more about the profession. Whilst the focus this year is on teenagers, the campaign hopes to recruit an additional 65 foster carers.

Commenting on the new campaign Councillor Patricia Banks, Hampshire County Council's Executive Member for Children and Families, said: "Fostering is all about making the lives and futures of children and young people better. If you enjoy working with young people please do contact us and find out more about fostering.

"There are different types of fostering. These range from providing vital respite care, emergency foster care, short term placements to providing long term placements, where a child will stay with you until they live independently. Whatever type you are interested in doing you can rest assured that it will make a real difference to a child or young person and their family."

Foster carers come from all walks of life. If you can take on the often challenging role of a foster carer, have the time and space in your life to care for a child, have an ability to understand how a child or young person feels when their life may not be going smoothly and enjoy being and working with children and young people, then fostering could be for you.

Full training and support is available as is an allowance to cover the cost of caring for the child or young person placed in your care. You will need to be able to work with children, their families, schools, therapists and social workers. Young people come into care for a variety of reasons and in most cases the aim is to get them back with their own families as soon as possible.

Fostering can become a career with some foster carers undertaking further training; able to take on more challenging placements and therefore they attract a skills fee in recognition of their contribution.

#### Dear Friends,

I wonder if you saw the programme on the TV remembering the 'Great Storm' of 1987 – twenty years ago. For many its difficult to forget that night and the damage that was done – I'm embarrassed to say, but I slept right through it, though not my wife who said she was waiting for the roof to come off and the windows to come in! I guess if you ask some of the older folk in our community they'll be able to remember storms of seemingly equal power and ferocity in the past but what struck me was that at the end of the programme one of the commentators said something like 'we can control many things but we can never control the weather!'

We all like to be in control, or at least think we are! It's an issue that seems to govern so many aspects of our lives today often in a powerful way. We like to feel we are in control of our careers, relationships, health, finances and so on. But what happens when we lose that sense of being in charge, when we feel that things are spinning out of our control! Oddly enough, panic is the most common reaction and people can begin to behave in the most irrational ways – so much so that they seem not to be the people we know and love anymore. St. Mark tells how the disciples are at sea in their ordinary, wooden-hulled fishing boat with its smell of salt and damp and stale fish. The stained and wet sails are straining under the increasing wind, and the ropes creaking – all so normal and familiar. But the power of the wind and the waves increases out of control, and Jesus is woken up in their anxious panic and they suddenly witness a much greater power and authority than anything in the created world as Jesus commands the storm to be still!.


Jesus was actually asleep and the disciples woke him up to tell him to start worrying! It's worth remembering who were among the crew of this vessel - Peter, James and John all experienced fishermen. But the lake of Galilee was known for its sudden and ferocious storms with waves reaching over 20ft in height. With the stormy waves pitching the boat up and down, and water coming in over the side, it was beginning to look like a *Titanic* situation, and there was Jesus fast asleep in the bottom of the boat!

Sometimes we do that too, if life seems very scary and everything seems to be wildly out of control. We scream out to Jesus, demanding that he take notice and do something. It's almost as if we want him to join in our panic.

Often in life we will find that when we have invited Jesus into our boat – into our life – we don't get so thrown by all the stormy problems (things like quarrels between friends, loved ones moving away, financial problems, pressures and stress at work). And if we're panicking about them so much that we can't see Jesus helping us to weather the storm, then often we'll find that we're given a breather – a bit of space – where things are calmed down long enough for us to realise that, with God in charge, we don't actually need to be terrified.

## **Pebbles Children's Centre**

The new children's centre for Popley was officially named ' Pebbles Children's Centre' during the summer, following a

very successful logo and naming competition that involved local children and families. Over the coming months, it is hoped that all families in Popley will become familiar with the name and delightful logo. Currently most of these activities continue to take place on the Marnel Infant School site, in what was previously the Early Years Centre.

Early next year will see the extension of both Marnel Infant and Junior Schools, and the new Pebbles Children's Centre will be developed on the Chineham Park Primary School site. The staff who have been working with families at the Early Years Centre site will be relocated to the new children's centre. The centre will act as a coordination point and 'one stop shop' for local families to access information and a range of services. However, much of the services will be delivered as outreach in the community, The Pebbles Children's Centre logo will soon be used at venues in the community, including schools, community centres and health centres where children's centre activities and services for families and young children will be run.

The most important part of setting up the children's centre services is to involve the parents and children in having a say about what services they need, and how and where they want them to be delivered.

Each children's centre will have a Parents' Forum, run by parents, that will work with the centre manager to help ensure that the centre works effectively with the whole community and that parents are satisfied with the services offered.

Over the summer, a number of community arts workshops were held across Popley that provided an opportunity for parents, carers and children to begin to share their ideas for the children's centre. The families created some wonderful art and produced three large canvasses which will hang in the new centre when its completed next year. In the meantime they will be displayed in various locations around Popley for everyone to admire - so look out for them!

Pebbles Children's Centre will belong to the community and it is therefore really important that everyone has the opportunity to share their ideas and get involved.

### Firework Safety

- **Never** put fireworks in your pocket.
- Never go back to a lit firework, it could explode in your face.
- **Never** throw fireworks, it s stupid, dangerous and illegal: it's a criminal offence with a maximum penalty of a £5000 fine.
- Never return to a lit firework it could still be live.
- Never wear loose clothing & long dangly scarves can very easily catch alight. If anyone's clothing does catch fire, follow the rule...

STOP don't run. DROP to the ground. ROLL to put out the flames.

#### DONT FOOL AROUND & NEVER THROW FIREWORKS ONTO A BONFIRE!!

Always follow all instructions and always put safety first.

Always store your fireworks safely: in a closed box & out of reach of children.

Always keep children well away from fireworks, and never let a child handle or light one. Even sparklers can be dangerous if unsupervised!

Tips:

\* Have a full bucket of water handy for any emergency & for putting used <u>sparklers</u> in.

\* At the end of your display, douse any 'dud' fireworks with water, then completely bury them in the ground. Alternatively, ask your Fire Brigade for advice as soon as possible.

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## "Haloween without the mask!"

Sorry that this article comes a bit late because Halloween will be over by the time you read this but a number of people have asked me why we shouldn't get involved with it so here we go! Many centuries ago, the pagans had 1<sup>st</sup> November as their New Years Day. 31<sup>st</sup> October was "New Years Eve". The pagans had priests called Druids. The druids believed that to have a good new year, they had to honour "The Lord of the Dead" who would call up the spirits of wicked dead people believed to be trapped in animals because of their past bad behaviour (hence the proverbial "black cat"). These "bad spirits" would then return to their old home looking for an offering to appease them. People thought that if they didn't get an offering or gift, these spirits would torment the lives of the people living there. (Doors opening and shutting, footsteps, funny noises etc). This is where the term "trick or treat" comes from.

When the Christian Missionaries first came to Britain, the church compromised with the pagans and allowed them to keep 31<sup>st</sup> October as a special day but called it "All Saints Day" or "All Hallows Eve" (shortened to Halloween).

What does the Bible say about all of this? Firstly the spirits of dead people, good or bad, cannot be recalled nor can they speak to us. For example *1 Peter 3:18* says (that for the 3 days that Jesus was in the grave) He went and preached to the spirits of people who had died and who were kept in prison (awaiting judgment). In other words they cannot be released back into our world. So who or what was being released by the Druids? Spiritual beings called angels (meaning messengers of God) were created by God. At some stage, Lucifer, the highest ranking angel in heaven, attempted to overthrow God's government with the backing of, possibly a third of the population of heaven. He lost that battle and was exiled. He was renamed "Satan" All the angels that rebelled with him suffered the same fate. They are no longer known as angels but as demons/devils/evil spirits etc. They are expert at mimicry, can copy the voices and mannerisms of dead people and transform their appearance. (*1 Corinthians 11:14*). Where did they go after being thrown out of heaven? *Ephesians 2:2.* The earth (or the spiritual territory above it).

When Jesus died on the cross, taking the punishment we deserved, Satan thought that he had won the war that he started ages ago but realised, too late, that he had lost it after seeing Jesus alive and well. Jesus took from him the "keys of hell and death" (*Revelation 1:18*).

When we give our lives over to Christ, he gives us eternal life and power over the fear of death and the grave. Satan and his cronies only have power when we give it back to them. We don't need Halloween or any other occult practice to do that!

The £9.5 million, 14 month improvement scheme by Hampshire County Council will provide traffic signals on all six approach arms at the Aldermaston roundabout, together with road widening on the A340 between the roundabout and Priestly Road.

The proposals also provide additional pedestrian footways on Popley Way northwards from Abbey Road, on Oakridge Road from Osborne Close to the roundabout, and southwards along Aldermaston Road South to Hubbard Road. Essential major maintenance work to the carriageway and the drainage network will be included in these works.

The scheme will reduce overall congestion through better traffic management, provide more reliable travel times with new signals and improve road safety.


The Priestly Road junction will be altered to incorporate a new access to the Merton Rise development. A new residential-style road and footways will be constructed between the A340 and Sherborne Road to serve Merton Rise. The road will connect to an earlier phase, which is nearing completion on site. Work will include the installation of surface and foul water drainage and utilities (electricity, gas, water and communications) to serve the new development.

The County Council's Executive Member for Environment, Cllr Mel Kendal, said: "The A340 Aldermaston improvement works aim to improve road safety and junction efficiency in managing traffic growth, in an area that is rapidly expanding – there's outline planning permission for 950 dwellings, a neighbourhood centre and a new secondary school that is now open. Widening the roundabout carriageway to create additional lanes will work together with the traffic signals to optimise the traffic flow.

"We'll shortly be selecting a contractor, after which time we'll have a better idea of the programme of works. But due to the nature and scale of these works a number of statutory diversions will be in place before the works start, as well as advance warning signs.

"The County Council will do its best to minimise disruption to traffic during the works and has been liaising with the emergency services. However we do not anticipate that the traffic situation on the A340 during the works will be significantly different to what drivers currently experience."
