





#### **Councillors Page - Jane Frankum**

Since our last report in Popley Matters where the Community Wardens looked like they were losing their jobs it has turned round so many times my head is spinning. Moments before the report was going before Cabinet the paper was withdrawn and the press told, and they reported that there was a problem and that the Wardens would be with us for some time. Soon that was followed by the resignation of the deputy leader of the Tory led council. As the paper was withdrawn it meant we could not debate the issue in the council that is webcast for anyone to watch. However we had put in a motion to Council that made it possible to talk about, but the time was limited. Only three days before that Council meeting Paul and I had been at the Magic of Christmas that was organised by the wardens. We walked round with the over 200 people and children around some of the roads in Popley Islands. We saw how the children looked up to the Wardens and the youths joined in too. It seems that the Tory council have made up their minds no matter what. If you read the Councillors Page last month you would have read some of the FACTS that show how effective the Wardens have been in the areas where they work, this seems to be getting ignored at the moment. But it was fine when they were picking up the awards and being photographed with our Wardens! If we sincerely believed that Popley and Basingstoke would be better off with losing the staff of 20 to be replaced by 5 PCSO's whoops sorry make that 3 because the Tadley councillor changed his mind when he was promised 2 PCSO's for his Ward. My calculations make that 3 to be spread around the town and villages of Basingstoke and Deane. I wonder what kind of Christmas the wardens and their families had with news like that 10 days before Christmas?

With the accident on Carpenters Down early in December we now have got the promise of speed reduction to 30 mph in Carpenters Down, something we have been calling for for some time now. We have also asked that the placing of the crossing and bus stop be reviewed as a matter of urgency. It appears at the moment that there is nowhere else to place the bus stop so we have asked that a formal crossing is put there and at least signage be put around the area warning drivers and pedestrians alike. There were some amazing people who were involved in one way or another, the Fire-Fighter who took over and took charge. The Children's Nurse who assisted, and the ambulance service, the drivers that Paul diverted away from the accident who were all polite and said they hoped that all will be well, Daniel's parents and family who have been pretty amazing too. Their thoughts have also been, once Daniel is better, how can they make a positive out of it. We will be campaigning together once things are back to normal. Last but not least, Daniel who has surprised everyone with his bravery and road to recovery.

Aldermaston Roundabout will be causing some disruption as the works begin to signalise and make it better and safer. The intention is to give an alternative route for the new housing in Merton Rise so that all the traffic does not come through Popley Way. If you have any concerns or questions the number to ring is 01962 846099.

Finally what would you like to see for leisure facilities in Aldermaston Open Space. There is money put aside from the developers and we would like us the residents to say what we would like. I have asked for a picnic area with fixed tables and seating, an assault course and a nature area for the children to study about the environment. #### Smoke Alarms

At least one smoke alarm should be fitted to each level of your home. In order to make sure your smoke alarm can save your life, it is important to maintain it properly and test it regularly.

#### Looking after your smoke alarm

Most budget smoke detectors will come with a battery already fitted. This battery will last for at least one year. Make a point of changing that battery annually. Consider using one of your children's birthdays, or a special occasion, to remind you to change it.

Remember:

- Once a week test the battery: press the button until the alarm sounds.
- Once a year change the battery (unless it's a 10 year alarm).
- Twice a year open the case and gently vacuum the inside to remove dust from the sensors. If it doesn't open, vacuum through the holes.
- > After 10 years replace your alarm with a whole new unit.

# **Popley Team Wins an Award**

We have great pleasure on informing you about the award given by the police to your Popley Safer Neighbourhood Team. The citation was from District Commander Jill Baldry. We were privileged to be guests at the ceremony where Mark Chatterton, Commander in Charge of Policing in North and East Hampshire, presented the award. The Citation is below.

#### **Citation for Popley Safer Neighbourhood Team** PC Paul Thorne, PC Dan Carter, PCSO Phil Rapley and PSCO Steve Smith

I wish to commend the above officers for their collective efforts in significantly reducing crime and ASB across Popley. Their hard work with partners and public have resulted in glowing praise from a variety of sources within Popley – including residents, local businesses and councillors alike.

Specific examples of their longer term project work includes the Festival Project (joint initiative to reduce ASB in and around Glastonbury Close), Operation HEARDSMAN (PRIME project to reduce ASB in Longfellow Parade) and the formation of a Community Action Group involving key stakeholders from a number of locally based agencies. Much work has taken place on the latter to the extent that it is reaching a state of readiness to be a successful Neighbourhood Panel for the Popley area.

These longer term projects are complemented with excellent individual pieces of work working with other agencies, including:

the successful ASBO application brought against a prolific juvenile offender, which has notably reduced his offending behaviour and improved the quality of life for local residents

Over 400 C12 forms being submitted and 350 VAS1 forms between January and September of this year

Successful community engagement through a CREW (Crime Reduction and Environment Week)

Excellent rapport with partner agencies (ACSO/Community Warden)

All are committed team players who have gained a reputation within their communities for tackling local issues in a timely and co-ordinated manner. Collectively they portray a positive and effective image of neighbourhood policing and as such I commend them to you for their ongoing commitment to serving the public to the highest standards



#### TRY NEW AGE KURLING


Would you like to have a go at this new fun activity which is suitable for everyone and anyone!? (Special equipment is available for those with reduced mobility so that they may play on an equal basis).





It was love at first game, two decades on the passion is still there and things have changed tremendously for the better in that time. Having moved to Basingstoke just over 6 years ago I am now privileged to be involved with the Basingstoke Bison and the enthusiasm is stronger than ever, my reasons? Let me explain.

Think about Ice Hockey for a moment, what are your first impressions? I guarantee most of them will be unfounded, many people don't even know we have a top flight Ice Hockey team in Basingstoke. A visit to the Arena, situated at Basingstoke leisure park ticks all the boxes for a perfect evenings entertainment with the family, and family to me is paramount. The sport itself is fast, it doesn't work well on the TV so if that has been your first impression please discard it and try it again live. The rules are very simple, so simple in fact that by the end of your first visit you will have been able to work out the majority without any help, however there are FREE guides available at every game. The offside rule, unlike football it really is simplicity itself. There is a Blue line on the ice, if the attacking player is the wrong side of the line before being passed the puck, you got it, he's offside. The other rules are just as simple!

The biggest plus point of the sport is it really is a family night out, it doesn't matter if you are 5 or 105 as it offers something for everyone. The game is split into three 20 minute periods with overtime and then penalties if it remains a draw, this adds to the watching through your fingers nervous excitement, the intervals between periods are filled with figure skating displays and games that fans participate in with names like Chuck a Puck, the Shootarama and even Chuck a Duck. I wont even try to explain here just come along and try it for yourself. But for me as a parent it is key for my children to be able to come along and be involved with something that is so family friendly.
