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

Message From the Editor:- I am extremely concerned about the youths that are running amok around the building sites in Popley Poets. They are taking some very dangerous risks and don't seem to realize the dangers to themselves and other people. In the report from the Fire Service on page 10 and in the local press, malicious hoax calls are being made to all the emergency services. I am a serving member of the Hampshire Fire and Rescue Service and it is a privilege and an honour to work with these Firefighters. I worked for 28 years in Basingstoke Hospital, 25 of them on the Children's Ward. As a Councillor I have worked closely with the police so I know first hand what massive repercussions can come from stupid and dangerous calls like these. In December I was at the scene of a bad accident where a young student was seriously hurt. Time was of the essence and all the emergency services were involved. When I saw Daniel at his first day back at school weeks later, I was so thankful for all the wonderful people who were involved. Daniel's parents are an exceptionally wonderful couple, would the idiots who make these hoax calls like to have been the one to have said "Sorry the services were at a hoax call and we couldn't get back to help Daniel". THINK. don't be so stupid. Stop think again before you may cost someone their life. If you know who does it then please for everyone's sake report it before it's too late. The great Popley Festival is on 18th May and I hope I see you there. It looks like there will be lots to see and do and bargains at the big boot sale. I hope the weather stays fine as it makes such a difference. I remember one year when it poured and it was so muddy. About 5,000 people still turned up though. The next year the weather was great and we nearly tipped 15,000 people. So much work and preparation goes into this ever popular yearly event, so I would like to thank all of you. 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Due to difficulties in his early life Josh sometimes finds it hard to talk about his feelings and can get angry if he feels he is being put down.

Could you offer a home to someone like Josh? The profile above is fictional but there are lots of Joshes and others like him who cannot live within their birth families and need to be cared for in the



community. At Rural Foster Care we are committed to finding and training individuals and families who can offer the sort of commitment and care that will enable such children and young people to recover from the experiences they have suffered and begin to enjoy their childhood and growing up. It's a real challenge both for the RFC team of social workers here in Hampshire and for those who join us as carers. But the reward for foster carers of seeing a child or young person settle into their family and begin to make the shift to a happier childhood is, according to one carer, 'The best experience ever'.

All children are different and therefore people are needed from all different backgrounds, ethnic and social groups to come forward for training as foster carers. The main criteria is a real interest in children and young people, lots of emotional energy, and a spare bedroom to accommodate a child or young person.

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**Councillors Page:** I went to the Sherborne St John parish meeting on 31<sup>st</sup> March where I brought up several issues and asked the Parish Council for support. Among them was the issue of a safe route from the village to the new Everest College. I was able to inform them that 16 new students have registered for the new school year already and of residents' and my concern for the lack of a safe route to the school. Though the view expressed was that the likelihood would be that the students would be driven there, I was adamant that there should be a choice and that it was not only students that would be walking that narrow road. Some people like to walk or cycle into town via that road. I will be working with County Cllr Keith Chapman to see if there is a way forward.

Another issue was whether the residents of Marnel Park and Merton Rise want to be part of the parish of Sherborne St John paying extra Ccouncil Tax with the precept but being in the ward of Popley West. What were the advantages or disadvantages? The item has been put on the agenda for a future meeting.

Popley West: It seems to be taking a long time to lay the new electric cables, and we are watching to make sure that when they finally finish that all the verges and roads will be repaired.

We are working with some residents of Abbey Road to get the play area upgraded, we have devised a questionnaire for the residents who live in or near the area of the swings and already before we have delivered the questionnaire had some amazing drawings from some of the children of what they would like to be there. There is also a plan to put in a bench to the memory of a much loved resident Emma, a young Mum who died recently of cancer.

Sentinel have started on upgrading the kitchens and wiring in the bungalows in Glastonbury close. The residents have had to live through major disruptions to their lives when I asked how do you cope a resident answered with this is nothing to what we went through in the war, we do have wonderful people who live in Popley.

Popley East. There have been massive problems in the Longfellow regeneration and residents have had to put up with an appalling level of antisocial behaviour since the beginning of April. Reports of kids climbing all over the building site and jumping 40 foot down the lift shafts onto piles of bin bags. Car windows have been broken due to gravel being delivered outside the main building site and left unsecure. Kids have also been climbing onto some rooves and entering gardens in Milton Close. We have complained to Chief Inspector Jill Baldry to get extra resources to patrol, identify and punish the culprits.

A detailed planning permission (BDB/68128) has been submitted with plans for 237 dwellings. The application is in its consultation period and we expect it to go before Development Control in June. A number of residents have voiced concerns and we will be arranging meetings with Sentinel in which we hope they take on board the residents' concerns.

Finally by the time you read this the Election will be over and we hope that Mary and I will be able to be there to see the final stages of all the work that has gone in Popley. Andy McCormick \$\frac{19376}{2}\$

#### Popley: 40 Years

40 years ago in picturesque Hampshire pastures, just north of Basingstoke, instead of planting crops, family homes were built and the community of Popley began. To celebrate, Basingstoke's Willis Museum would like to tell the story of Popley, and we need your help.

Whether you were a local farmer, a builder, a labourer, a new settler from London, a teenager moving from the city to rural Basingstoke, or if you remember the new schools, community centres, public houses, roads, old peoples homes and industries, we want to share your memories.

Do you remember playing in Chineham Park? Or remember that St Gabriel's Church started in a caravan? Did you go to one of Popley's new schools? Did you bring up your family in Popley? Or did you grow up there in the early days? Then yours is a story that has a place in this project. This story will be told using your words, experiences, memories, photographs and objects, so we need your help!

If you are willing to talk to us about your memories as part of the community history project or to lend us objects and photographs so that we can tell the story of Popley and the experience of its people during this period please contact the Willis Museum on 01256 465902. Children from local schools will be involved in recording the story and creating the displays, which will be on display at the Popley Festival on 18 May 2008. At the Festival there will be a guiz for families to complete, which will test their knowledge of Popley, its past and present.

The 'Popley: 40 Years' Project is being funded by Hampshire County Council which has been granted funding through the Big Lottery Fund to deliver family learning projects. The Children's Services and Recreation & Heritage departments are working together to work with families from Popley.

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

Hello to everyone in Popley.



As you all know, there is a lot of building work going on in Popley at the moment. There are building sites in Marlowe Close, Marnel Park, Merton Rise, the old John Hunt of Everest School

site, Marnel School and elsewhere. Some of the work will be finished in the near future, other sites will be the focus of building activity for much longer and new sites will also appear. We cannot escape the fact that building work will continue in Popley for some time to come. When it is all finished Popley will obviously look very different, but it should be a more vibrant and even more pleasant place to live.

We are all curious to know what is going on within the wooden and metal fences that surround building sites and are naturally excited to see the buildings rising from behind the barriers. These barriers are for our protection. No one, young or old, should venture onto a building site without the permission of the site manager. It goes without saying that building sites are extremely dangerous places. There are reasons why workmen wear high visibility jackets, helmets and other personal protective equipment and follow strict rules and regulations regarding health and safety. As new buildings get higher so does the scaffolding and the possibility of a fall becomes ever greater. Clearly people who venture onto a construction site without permission and without personal protective equipment are not only

trespassing (which is against the law) but are putting their lives at risk. We would. therefore, ask people to keep away from the building sites and ask parents and teachers to reinforce to their children and pupils the message that building sites are not playgrounds!

Thank you for your co-operation in this matter. Of course, as Community Wardens we are carrying out regular patrols of the building sites to ensure that no trespassing occurs.

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#### **Home Electrical Safety.**

In most homes today you will find an array of electrical equipment such as televisions, DVD players, stereos and computers to name a few. Some of these items are designed to be left switched on (i.e. fridge, freezers etc). If they are not designed to be left on, then always switch them off and unplug them last thing at night dont leave them on standby (televisions, stereos etc).

Do not overload electrical sockets and ensure that all plugs are fitted with the correctly rated fuse.

When buying electrical garden or DIY tools, look for the British Standard kite mark.

Check cables and flexes regularly for frays, kinks and bared wires. Check plugs to make sure they are firmly wired and not damaged. Replace damaged flex or plugs.

Use a Residual Current Device (RCD) or Power Breaker on all appliances. Fully unwind extension leads before use.

Obviously I am against this for obvious health and safety implictions. If you are a parent I would strongly urge you to warn your children about the dangers they may face. And although tresspassing is a civil issue, the company are still able to take the tresspasser to a civil court where large fines may be issued!

Recently a number of vehicles have been broken into along Abbey Road. Tools and other items were stolen. So once again we would advise vigilance and remove valuables from vehicles when not in use.

Now the weather is warming up, it is safe to start thinking about your summer bedding plants. Busy Lizzies, pansies, petunias, geraniums and more will soon be readily available in most garden departments. Plant up your pots and hanging baskets now, but make sure you can put them indoors somewhere if we should happen to get a frosty night. Otherwise they will be fine outside. A tip for planting up those awkward baskets – stand a small bucket on your bench, then stand the basket in the top of it. Fill up with compost and plant the top of the basket first. When that is done you can hang the basket up and plant the sides. Use water gel crystals mixed in the compost to help retain water and stop it drying out to fast. I usually pop a tiny plant pot in the top of the basket to pour water in, which will prevent too much root disturbance. You could use the 'water wizards' which fit into the top of small cola bottles and water large pots and baskets with those instead.

Vegetable pots can be started now too. Climbing beans can be grown in large pots and trained up a wig-wam of tall canes tied at the top. Poke the beans about 2 inches under the compost around the base of the canes and keep them well watered. Another tip here – to help keep the roots damp, scrunch up a load of old unused wallpaper (not washable or vinyl) or newspaper and soak it in a bucket of water to use in the bottom of the pots.

Tomatoes can be started on windowsills or cold greenhouse now. Again, be careful of overnight frosts if they are outside. There is a huge variety of tomatoes these days, and they can be grown in a variety of containers too. Small cherry tomatoes do fine in hanging baskets, growbags and pots, while the larger fruited ones really need a large pot or grow-bag with canes for support. Follow the instructions on the packet. Try some orange or yellow fruited ones for a change – they are often sweeter than the red ones.

Grow bags and pots can be prepared for strawberries, and salad vegetables. I also managed to get hold of some blueberry plants in a cheapy shop in town this year, they are in pots too.

Whatever seeds you decide to grow, don't get carried away and plant the whole packet of tiny seeds in one tray. They will come up like grass and become tall and weak, and most likely go mouldy and die off. Better to scatter the seeds sparingly and save the rest for next year, keeping them in an airtight container. Old film reel tubs are ideal for keeping both home saved seed and part packs of bought seeds. Make sure you label the pots so you know what is in them!

Now is also the time when the garden pests start to surface. Keep a close eye on young plants as slugs and earwigs can wipe out a lot overnight. My lily shoots already look lacy!

Some of the spring bulbs will have finished flowering and the leaves dying back. Tidy them up by folding the leaves over and secure with elastic bands. You can leave them to die back naturally like this, and collect the dry leaves later on. Plant your bedding plants between them and they will soon be covered.

Checking my pots over the last couple of weeks, the leaf buds on the acers are bursting, the broom bushes are beginning to glow with flower buds, the olive trees (yes olive trees) and figs are sprouting new leaves. Spring is definitely sprung!

If you are new to gardening and don't have a clue where to start, use the library to borrow books on the subject. Pay a visit to your local allotments and chat to people there, they are full of experience and information. Don't be afraid to experiment either. Who knows, in a few years you could be writing this article. *Julie*

## Sentinel

RESIDENTS OF Faroe Close and Maldive Road could soon be living in state-of-the-art homes, if a major £32m regeneration project gets the goahead.

The planning application for the regeneration of Faroe Close and Maldive Road to demolish the 120 outdated blocks of flats and maisonettes and build an exciting new community of 237 new houses, apartments and shops has now been lodged with borough planners. Sentinel Assistant Director Julie Porter said: "This project provides a great opportunity to replace some of Popley's poorer housing stock with a high quality new development centred around a large park."

The project will be partly funded from loans secured by Sentinel, with the balance hopefully coming from government funding via the Housing Corporation. It will feature 355 parking spaces, including 24 spaces for existing shops, plus a whole new road and footpath layout.

Ms Porter added: "We've consulted heavily with residents, neighbours, and councillors, and so far everyone is really positive about the renewal prospects for this community."

Sentinel aims to start demolition early next year, with development progressing in phases over a three to five year period.





#### DIARIES FROM THE OLD CODGER

Yet another month has gone by, and winter now is passed. As I said a few months ago, more and more of our songbirds are staying in this country because of the warmer winters so it was important to keep feeding them as much as you could. Those of you that did so, well done.

One of our readers asked how to make fat balls!!! Dripping, or lard, is best, melt it in a pot, take it off the heat, stir in as much wild bird seed as you wish. Line up your plastic beakers, push a small hole in the bottom of the beaker

and thread a piece of string through and tie a good knot. Just put a bit of Clingfilm on the bottom of the cup to seal it. Let the mix cool or it will melt the beaker. You can then fill and leave a long length of string so you can tie it to a bird table, or hanging bracket. Another way, if you can get hold of them is coconut shells and do the same method. Freeze these and use them when needed. It sounds a bit complicated but its not. Don't forget, if you use the plastic beakers you need to cut them off before hanging out.

Now I would like to address all the schools in Popley. You all have large buildings that birds such as Swifts House Martins and Blue Tits could nest on. If you were to put up nest boxes on the side of the buildings they would nest. Perhaps you could make them or you could get your dads to do it. The House Martin cups are very cheap to buy; there has been a lot of news on the facts that due to building they no longer have places to nest, leaving our gardens in some areas without the songbirds.

The nominations for a Place to be Proud of are now closed. To the wonderful people that are nominated I wish them all well. All my family are true Londoners and I am very proud of that fact. However I have lived in Basingstoke, along with many others that Basingstoke adopted more than half my life so I feel just as passionate about it. In April the out going Chief Constable of Hampshire was on the radio because Basingstoke comes under that area from the radio station. They talked about our town, they picked on deaths, graffiti and shootings. Lets just pick on the shooting, the person that did it as far as I know came from Reading where the radio station is, also why did he single out Basingstoke we have no more or less trouble than any other large town in Hampshire. Look at Southampton, Portsmouth etc. The way he portrayed Basingstoke tells people to stay away. We have great people in the town and I was pleased the station read out my statement about it. I can remember my grandfather saying that they would take things to the pawn shop on a Monday and when they got paid on a Friday they would be back to pay off the amount plus a fee. How many of you remember coming to Basingstoke from London to a new life? I had to bring Her Indoors. Well she said so and I do what she says. It was a bit funny to us at weekends, the town became deserted as people got on trains or in the car and headed back up home. Funny we still say that, yet Her indoors and I would dump the kids in the car and head for the coast. Yes Basingstoke is our home but also many memories of our past in London will always be part of us. All the dance halls and the big bands. Yes they were great times but I would never change what I have now. Well maybe one thing!!

#### SHERBORNE ST. JOHN PARISH COUNCIL

Following the article and comment in last month's Villager on the Core Strategy Consultation, which implied that B&DBC supported the expansion of development to the north of Basingstoke, Councillor Leek was keen to emphasise this was quite definitely <u>not</u> the case and that this document does not identify any allocation of land.

The School Travel Plan for the village school, having been presented to representatives of the PC has been forwarded to Hampshire County Council for approval and action. It was noted that many issues and recommendations overlap with the long-standing concerns of the PC and the Sherborne St. John community. Most notably problems of parking in the village square at school drop off/pick up times; encouragement to use available car parking at the Chute and Village Hall; safer walkways and pavements near the school and also difficulties crossing the very busy A340 at West End. Parents be warned - PC Smith says he will issue tickets to motorists who breech parking regulations in the square.

With the new Everest Community College now taking pupils from the village there are issues for children walking and cycling safely to the school. The PC has raised the issue of a safe path/cycleway south of the village many times in the past but has found little support and available finance from the authorities. Do you think this pathway is a priority? Where would you envisage the potential route from village to school? Please let us know your thoughts on this matter?

With safer travel to school much in mind, the PC is seeking funding for some lighting along Church Path. It is envisaged that two 'tasteful' lights by the pond would operate on timers and assist walkers particularly in the darker winter months. However, some believe this lighting is inappropriate and unnecessary in our village and might disturb wildlife. We are keen to hear your opinions before making any final decisions.

When it comes to adding an extension, a new fence or cutting down that tree it pays to seek planning permission first. This is even more important for those of you living within the village's conservation area. The PC was advised of a number of impending actions against householders who had recently carried out work without planning permission.

With the prospect of a playschool at the Chute Pavilion commencing in September the PC have been asked to consider fencing around the recreation ground's play area. The council is generally supportive and has obtained quotations for this work. And in Cranesfield, in order to dissuade travellers from using an adjacent field and to better protect the children's play area, installation of replacement fencing has been approved by the PC.

The Council were swift in sending a litter picking party to Chineham Road to clear the mass of litter left near the development and new school. They also responded quickly to notice of dangerous potholes in Sherborne Road. So if you see litter, potholes, broken stiles, overgrown hedges etc. whilst on your travels, please take the time to report your findings to Clover Morgan, our Parish Clerk.

It has been a while since I last wrote an article for Popley Matters magazine so its been quite a task compacting all that I have done in to a one page article. Let me start by saying you may have seen me being shadowed by another PCSO these last couple of months. This is PCSO Joel Baker who is set to be the PCSO for Oakridge and I

have been showing him all I can about our job role whilst on the streets away from the classroom.

Over the past month I have been meeting with different agencies regarding the "Get With" scheme. For those of you who may not know, the "Get With" scheme is a project set up to find and organise activities for the youths to do over the summer holidays. This should be good as I feel it is important for the youths of Popley to do something rather than being bored on the streets.

I am sure you are aware that over the next few months a large redevelopment and construction in the Poets are planned and we are already having large amounts of problems with youths climbing on the sites or using building materials as tools. Can I just remind you not to let your young children out on these sites as the dangers are endless. So far any youths caught on building sites in Popley are having letters sent home and Social Services being made aware. Please continue to report any evidence you have of anti-social behaviour in or around these areas as together with the construction team, we can work together to sort them out.

Finally together with PCSO Smith we have now issued approx 100 homes with Smart Water Prevention Scheme and Home security checks. I am also looking at setting up a neighbourhood watch in the area of Chineham Park Court in regards to the recent rise in anti-social behaviour and criminal damage. Any residents wishing to join this or show an initial interest should not hesitate to contact me.

#### **Hoax Calls**

Hoax calls are not funny - this is where somebody contacts the emergency services and reports an incident, knowing it to be false. Hampshire Fire and Rescue Service receive the occasional hoax call but in 2007 the number of hoax calls rose dramatically and continues to be a serious problem in 2008.

Hampshire Fire and Rescue Service have received a whole range of hoax calls in the last 12 months, including calls to small rubbish fires: fires in buildings where people are trapped inside: road traffic collisions: and many others. In one week alone we received 6 hoax calls.

Some of these calls have attracted the attendance of one fire appliance with a crew of 4 people, where as the larger reports have resulted in 4 appliances attending (up to 16 firefighters), plus other services such as the police and ambulance. Not only is this a real drain on finances, it is putting members of our community at risk.

Residents are at risk because, whilst we are attending these calls, the availability of other appliances is reduced which will delay a response to a genuine emergency received at the same time. Residents are at risk because emergency vehicles are driving at speed around the roads of Basingstoke, roads where you and your families may be driving, walking or cycling.

And, of course, the lives of the firefighters, police officers and ambulance crews are at risk whilst they are attending these calls.

We are taking this very seriously and are working closely with the police to identify the people responsible, and when they are identified the police are taking action. Our control operators know immediately where a call has come from - if calls are made from mobile phones control operators can, and have, contacted network providers and had these phones cut off. Making hoax calls to the emergency services can also attract heavy fines and even imprisonment.

If you are aware of somebody making hoax calls we would ask that you contact the police and report this on 0845 045 45, or anonymously to Crimestoppers on 0800 555 111.
