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

Neighbourhood Renewal Schemes 2008/2009

Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council is proposing environmental improvements in the area which includes numbers 1-213 Abbey Road and also Selby Walk. The aim of these projects is to make the area a better place to live, visit and walk through. The council has set aside a budget to tackle some of the highest priority issues and open spaces.

So we can make sure we deal with the issues that would make the most difference to local residents, we would like to hear your views. As a guide, the types of issues that we can look at include the following:

- enhancing neglected areas by tidying up overgrown plant beds, replacing fencing, benches and bins;
 - improving the layout of footpaths and removing steps;
- removing isolated grass and planted areas, possibly turning some in to small areas of off road parking;
 - reducing nuisance issues such as ball game playing;
 - upgrading open spaces with new street furniture;
 - providing community maintained gardens; and
 - providing new link paths.

Unfortunately there are some issues which are beyond the scope of the project. These include residents only parking schemes, installing CCTV, large scale resurfacing of footpaths or roads or garage areas, putting up private fences and additional street lighting.

We are also asking for suggestions from other groups, including your Ward Councillors, the Police, Community Wardens, Street Care Officers and Sentinel Housing Association.

What happens next?

Once we've got local views, we will then look at the issues raised to draw up schemes suitable for implementation.

It is possible that we will receive a wide range of responses, some of which may conflict with each other or simply will not be possible to do.

A full update will be circulated to all residents letting you know the results of the consultation and what we are planning to do.

When works will start to happen?

The first phase of work is anticipated to start in August/September and will carry on until the end of the financial year (end of March 2009). Subject to Portfolio Holder approval, the works are likely to carry on into the following financial year.

The Parish AGM and Annual Parish Meeting - was held at the Chute Pavilion on Wednesday 7th May. The minutes of the meeting are available on our website - www.ssj.hampshire.org.uk.

Over twenty five members of the Parish were present to witness the election of the new officers, and receive the reports of the Chairman, Treasurer, Borough and County Councillors as well as local organisations. The Annual Meeting is an opportunity for all residents to air their views – the main topics of debate this year being traffic calming (both in the Village and on the A340), and development and the threat of 'greater Basingstoke'. The loss of the bottle bank was also discussed.

After refreshments and the chance for informal discussion, we were treated to a comprehensive (and concerning) outline of the Basingstoke & Deane Local Development Framework Core Strategy. This will replace the Local Plan on adoption in 2011. Anyone who enjoys living in Sherborne St John and supports the concept of a local community must be concerned by the implications of increased development and house-building promoted by central Government via the SE England Regional Assembly and the SE England Development Agency. As the Parish Council's letter (published last month) implies, the Parish Council will require your support in fighting the expected threat to Sherborne St John resulting from the process. Nevertheless, our thanks go to Mark Lambert (BDBC) for his excellent presentation.

Parish Council Meetings – are held on the 4th Monday of each month; the next meeting is Monday 23rd June at 7.30pm in the Village Hall. You will be most welcome!

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Councillors Page: I have asked for a meeting with Hampshire County Council Officers with the other Popley Labour Councilors to talk about developer money where and how it should be spent in Popley. I have been promised that there will be a consultation with the residents as to where it will be spent and on what! Year 7 Story-Telling Competition

Everest Community College's first ever Year 7 Story-telling Competition took place in the Main Hall on 30th April. There were fourteen participants, all of whom had beaten off strong opposition to get to the final.

Each English-teaching set, had originally been given the challenge of creating a story which was original and entertaining and could be delivered to a large audience, with clarity and without the aid of amplification. Students had to work co-operatively to create a group story; a lot of collaborative skills were learned in the process!

Each class then selected the best group to go forward to the final.

Stories were varied in genre, ranging from science fiction, comedy, gory mystery and fantasy, through to ghost stories and regular but new and amazing fairy-tales. All students acquitted themselves very well, mesmerising an audience of well over a hundred with their fascinating tales.

Finally, the judges made their decision and Liam Rump and Sam White won the day with a fantastic and amusing tale of life in a fridge!

Science Investigation Day

15th May 2008 Everest Community College

Rocket Design, Build and Launch.

As part of the Gifted and Talented Programme at Everest Community College, 30 Year 8 and 9 students from Everest and Wavell School in Farnborough took part in an action-packed day, examining the science and engineering behind rocketry.

Students spent 2 hours in the morning designing rockets, using computer-aided design, to work out how high the rocket would reach once launched and investigating the effects that different materials would have on rocket performance. During the design process students selected the materials to be used for their rockets and decide on the number of phases and motors the rockets would have in them. Students then constructed their design idea and launched their rockets on the Everest playing field during lesson 5. Blast-off was scheduled for 2.30pm and there were some tense moments and last minute adjustments as countdown began. All rockets were launched successfully, with some estimated to have reached heights of over 400 metres.

The day was a great success, enjoyed by both staff and students and the parents who came to watch.

Maths Challenge

On 1st May, 90 Year 7 & 8 students, chosen for their mathematical talent and enthusiasm, took part in the annual United Kingdom Mathematics Trust Junior Challenge at College.

The Challenge is aimed at the top 35% of students in each Year group and tests their reasoning skills and mental agility. The questions are designed to stimulate interest in mathematical problem solving and to make students think!

Everest's top 90 worked really hard and managed to solve lots of the problems. They showed a fantastic positive attitude and real determination when the questions got tougher. They are now waiting to find out their scores and results.

Successful students will be presented with Gold, Silver and Bronze Awards depending on their final scores. If they are placed in the top scorers list, then they will be invited to the next round of the competition to represent the College in the Junior Mathematical Olympiad.

Hello to everyone in Popley.

Recently, many of you have highlighted to us a variety of issues concerning wheelie bins. These include bins blocking pathways and points of access, bins on highways and

children using bins to climb onto garage roofs. Most of these issues are a direct consequence of people not keeping their bins inside their property boundaries between rubbish/recycling collection days.

Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council provides residents with a weekly rubbish and recycling collection service using black and green wheeled bins. The council asks residents to place their bin out for collection by 7am on their day of collection. Bins should be placed on the edge of resident's property nearest the collection point. Residents should put their house number on their bins to ensure they are returned to the boundary of the correct property after they have been emptied. After collection, residents are asked to take their bins in as soon as possible and store them securely on their property. Remember, keeping your bins inside the boundaries of your property stops them acting as an obstruction to residents who have buggies or use wheel chairs.

You can find out when your rubbish and recycling bins are collected by visiting www.basingstoke.gov.uk/go/waste or by calling the council on 01256 844844.

For residents who are elderly or disabled and are unable to put their bins out for collection, the council provides an assisted waste collection. If you feel you are eligible for this, please contact the council on 01256 844844 or email waste@basingstoke.gov.uk

However, large amounts of soil, rubble or garden waste should not be put in either wheelie bin. These items can be taken to vour nearest household waste recycling centre. Alternatively a skip can be hired from a local skip hire company.

Malicious/Hoax Calls.

Hoax calls don't just cost money, they cost lives!

Hoax calls commit fire engines to incidents that do not exist, this means genuine callers' lives are in danger, as fire cover in the county is reduced. A life was lost in a fire in Southampton when the nearest fire engines were attending a hoax call.

In 2007 Hampshire Fire & Rescue Service received 721 hoax and false alarm calls.

Hoax and false emergency calls have cost Hampshire Fire & Rescue Service £140,000 last year.

14 people who made three or more bogus calls had their phones cut off. 12 pranksters were prosecuted, including six who were issued a fixed penalty in 2007 or some other punishment.

Did you know?

- Calls from landline phones give Control Staff immediate access to the number and location of the phone, all calls are digitally tape-recorded. In the case of hoax calls these details can be passed to the Police for prosecution.
- Text messages will be sent to mobile phone hoax callers warning them that if they persist, their mobiles can be cut off. Should multiple hoax calls be received from mobiles, HFRS Control staff will contact the network provider and ask them to cut the mobile off.

A340 Improvements and Merton Rise Access, Basingstoke

The construction of the A340 I mprovements and Merton Rise Access Project has progressed to programme. The work which is now in its 26th week is expected to achieve completion in December 2008. The recent works progress along the A340 Aldermaston Road resulted in the completion of surfacing of the new proposed southbound carriageway which will now follow by the construction of the proposed central reservation. This requires alteration to the current temporary traffic management arrangement which will be affected on 27th May 2008.

After Tuesday 27th May, all traffic on the A340 Aldermaston Road heading towards the roundabout (southbound) will switch onto the newly constructed carriageway. Northbound traffic, out of Basingstoke, will be unaffected. The ambulances and emergency services will benefit from a dedicated lane between the southbound traffic lane and the central reservation. This arrangement is expected to be in place for a maximum of 4 weeks.

Work to the centre island of the <u>Aldermaston Road Roundabout</u> is now taking place with the installation of the drainage network. No traffic lane restriction is required at this stage.

The construction of Merton Rise Access Road between the A340 and Sherborne Road is also underway. The works will cause no disruption to passing traffic on the A340 Aldermaston Road.

Summer is approaching fast. We have already had an extended spell of hot dry weather which nicely killed off small lupin plants I had in trays outside all winter. Bedding plants are ready for planting out now, and hanging baskets can be planted up and put outside without risk of frost. If you haven't grown seed for tomatoes, cucumbers, peppers etc keep your eyes open at car boot sales and fetes for plants. It will be too late to sow them from seed now. Don't forget you can plant them in large pots or grow-bags. Small cherry tomatoes will often do well on a window sill if there is enough light.

The grass must have grown about a foot in the last couple of weeks. I was a bit slow in dragging the strimmer out of the shed, and ended up spending a back-breaking half hour on grass that had been flattened. You can probably get away with strimming the edges once a month now over the summer. Keep your mower on the longest setting for another month to keep the soil moist, and don't worry too much about raking up the grass cuttings unless there is a lot of it. Leaving it encourages worms which improve the quality of the soil and retain moisture helping the grass stay lush. Look out for products in the shops to feed your lawn and help it stay healthy.

Wild flower seeds and annuals that can be sown straight on the ground should be planted now. Just scatter the seed on fine soil and give it a gentle rake over. Mix the types of flowers you sow or buy a pack of ready mixed seed. The 'wild' random look reminds me of the old cottage gardens when I was a youngster. Different types of flowers encourage different species of insects to visit your garden, and with the insects you will find more birds visiting too.

I have a big problem with greenfly on my roses already. If you don't like to use chemical sprays on them, try diluted washing-up liquid. It works just as well, but you will have to repeat spray a couple of times a week to control them. If you find little clusters of bubbles on your plants, that is also a sign of aphids. Inside the foam lives a little green insect that is merrily sucking the sap from the plant. You can also reduce the amount of insect pests in your garden by planting certain flowers. Your garden centre should be able to advise you on which ones to use.

A few years ago, I did an experiment with watering my plants. I divided everything in the greenhouse into 2 lots. One side I watered with tap water, the other with rain water saved from the guttering. I was really surprised at the difference it made where I used rain water. The plants were bigger and healthier. I was lucky at the time as there was a broken section of guttering at the back of a garage that was in my garden. I made full use of all the water that drained off the roof, saving it in a large plastic bin. I don't have that luxury anymore, so I am looking into buying a special device that fits into a down-pipe fed from the house guttering. It diverts the water straight into a water butt until I need to use it. I also make use of water gel crystals in my

planters and baskets to try and save water there. They dry out very quickly in hot weather and it can be difficult to get the compost wet again if it gets too dry. The gel crystals help retain water in the compost and the plants tend to last much longer. If you have large planters, you can also use old newspaper or ordinary wallpaper in the bottom of them. Soak it well, and put a layer of compost in the bottom of the planter, then the wet paper. It will encourage the plant roots to go down and stop them drying out and dying off between watering. If you plan to go away for more than a couple of days this summer, remember to ask a neighbour or friend to water your pots for you!

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Development update - Longfellow Parade

Work on the £14m redevelopment of Longfellow Parade is progressing well, Sentinel Housing Association has announced this month.

The first phase in Marlowe Close to provide 25 new homes for rent and shared ownership are due to complete in October. This site has attracted attention from youths in the area, resulting in Sentinel's contractor Mansell PLC installing extra security features, and 24 hour guards. The police have also made related arrests. The partners have produced some site safety pointers below and are visiting schools and houses to highlight the risks.

Meanwhile, the second phase at Shelley Close and on the green by Longfellow Parade flats has now started, with the area currently being cleared to allow ground workers to lay the foundations. This phase will provide another 22 apartments.

Finally, we are close to resolving our plans for the third phase, which will include a new One Stop shop for Shakespeare Road, plus two further shops and an additional 10 apartments.

Sentinel and Mansell would like to thank all residents within the area for their incredible patience and understanding throughout this scheme.

As we hope you are all aware, we have set up a drop-in day every Tuesday and Thursday at the Mansell site office in Marlowe Close. We also intend to arrange a further evening drop-in session for those residents unable to attend during working hours.

TOP TIPS FOR SITE SAFETY

- Stay completely out of any construction site. They can be dangerous places even to qualified personnel.
- 2. If you must go on a site, make certain that you have permission and have reported to the main entrance of the site where the 'gateman' can guide you safely to the site office. He may request that you wear appropriate safety clothing before he will let you in. This is to ensure your safety while on site. It is imperative that you follow all instructions and do not venture onto the site unaccompanied.
 - 3. If you do enter a site without permission, you do so entirely at your own risk.
- **4.** Using the site as a playground or for practising 'Free Running' skills is something Sentinel and Mansell will not tolerate. Anyone identified on site without permission, will be reported to the authorities who may then start legal proceedings.
- **5.** Please be vigilant and report any unauthorised people seen on site to the Police, Community Wardens, Site Security, Site Management or Sentinel, giving as much detail as possible.
 - 6. CHILDREN are not allowed on site and it is important for their own safety to keep them away
- 7. From time to time contractors have to undertake work outside the site fencing. Do not interfere or play with building material located outside the hoarding. They are there for a reason and should be respected at all times.
- **8.** If anyone would like any further information or statistics relating to accidents on site, then please contact either Sentinel or Mansell who would be only too happy to provide further information. Mansell have adopted the following measures in an attempt to put a stop to unauthorised entry to site: Being more vigilant by taking photos of any unauthorised person seen on site.

The site security has been increased to two full-time security guards Continuing to liaise with the Police, Sentinel and the Community Wardens in an attempt to identify any unauthorised person or persons entering the site. Please note that ACTION WILL be taken and could lead to prosecution. If the person entering the site without permission is a Sentinel resident or a child of a Sentinel resident, this could result in their tenancy being put in jeopardy.

Mansell have instigated meetings with local agencies to ensure all are working towards putting a stop to unauthorised entry to building sites in the area.

All incidents are logged and these logs are shared and compared with police and warden records.





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Is that debt really yours?

the charity for your community

If you're being chased for a debt, check first that you are actually responsible for it.

In England, generally, if a debt is more than 6 years old, the creditor cannot pursue the debtor through the courts for it. This means the debt is unenforceable. At the CAB we quite often see people being chased by debt companies for a debt that they thought had disappeared many years ago. Such debts are sold on from company to company, and these debt collectors rely on people not knowing that the law protects them from this situation.

There are other situations where you may not be liable for a debt – for example, if the debtor is your spouse and your spouse is deceased. In this case, if the debt was in their name only, the only claim the creditor can make is on the debtor's estate – what they left when they died. If there was no money left over to pay the debt, the debt dies with them.

If you are under 18, then in many cases a debt will be unenforceable in court – someone under 18 is said to be a "minor" in English law, and a minor cannot make a contract that can be held up in court. There are exceptions to this, however.

In general, the first step to take when reviewing debts is to decide whether you are liable for them. If you need help with this, or any other matter, do come and see us at the Citizens Advice Bureau.
