





The Initial Summary of the Consultation on "The New Park for Popley"

At the public consultation held over two days in July at Melrose Hall, the suggestion was also made to also ask the pupils in our schools on what they thought of having a new family park and what they would like to see?

Since the consultation in Melrose Hall the display and information was indeed taken directly to the primary schools in Popley. The exhibition was also displayed at Everest Community College at the end of term. There were 15 feedback forms filled in at Everest Community College plus 14 forms from other primary schools. The vast majority were supportive of the proposals, and wanted to know when it would be happening! The main issues seem to be around dogs versus other park users, and concerns about removing the fence. Concerns were also raised that there could be play equipment for younger children sacrificed at the expense of slightly older children and teenagers.

Some suggestions were to have a seperate fenced off area for dogs to use so that all residents could enjoy the facilities. Concerns were raised about travelers being able to access the site, and these are just some of the issues that are being looked at.

The consultants are revising the proposals to take account of all of the public comments and those raised from Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council Highways and Hampshire County Council with regard to Merton Rise. Once we have the revised version we will publish it for your comment.

Water safety.

Young people who drown are often victims of their own misjudgement of their swimming ability. They may view a river or a lake as a tempting means of cooling off in a hot spell, but fail to appreciate the harmful effects that the cold water can have on stamina and strength.

- Drowning is the third most common cause of accidental death among the under 16s.
- Spot the dangers. Water may look safe, but it can still be dangerous. You may swim well in a warm indoor pool, but that does not mean that you will be able to swim in cold water outdoors!
- Always take extra care around the water's edge, cliff faces and open mudflats.
- Take safety advice: always follow the flags on beaches and notices that may warn you of danger.
 - Don't go alone: children should always be accompanied by an adult.
 - Always tell someone where you are going and when you expect to be back.
- Learn how to help: you may be able to help yourself and others if you know what to do in an emergency.
- If you see someone in difficulty tell a Lifeguard or go to the nearest telephone, dial 999, ask for the Police or the Coastguard.

Children and young people in care need you

Jane fosters 14 year old Elliott who is challenging but always rewarding. For the past seven months she has been helping him to build his self confidence through a range of activities, including sailing. "To see improvements in his behaviour and the laughter and excitement in his eyes, especially after sailing, is my reward, and makes it all worthwhile – it is what fostering is all about," she said.

At any one time there are around 1000 children in the care of the local authority with almost 700 currently living in foster families. Foster carers are highly valued members of the community and play a vital role in supporting children in care across Hampshire.

A bus campaign is currently underway across Hampshire acknowledging the excellent work our foster carers do but also encouraging those with an interest to find out more about the profession. Whilst the focus this year is on teenagers, the campaign hopes to recruit an additional 65 foster carers.

Commenting on the new campaign Councillor Patricia Banks, Hampshire County Council's Executive Member for Children and Families, said: "Fostering is all about making the lives and futures of children and young people better. If you enjoy working with young people please do contact us and find out more about fostering.

"There are different types of fostering. These range from providing vital respite care, emergency foster care, short term placements to providing long term placements, where a child will stay with you until they live independently. Whatever type you are interested in doing you can rest assured that it will make a real difference to a child or young person and their family."

Foster carers come from all walks of life. If you can take on the often challenging role of a foster carer, have the time and space in your life to care for a child, have an ability to understand how a child or young person feels when their life may not be going smoothly and enjoy being and working with children and young people, then fostering could be for you.

Full training and support is available as is an allowance to cover the cost of caring for the child or young person placed in your care. You will need to be able to work with children, their families, schools, therapists and social workers. Young people come into care for a variety of reasons and in most cases the aim is to get them back with their own families as soon as possible.

Fostering can become a career with some foster carers undertaking further training; able to take on more challenging placements and therefore they attract a skills fee in recognition of their contribution.

Julie's Gardening Tips

Well what happened to summer? I can't remember having such a dreary August before. But one bonus is that it has saved a lot of effort with watering. We should have bumper crops of vegetables with the warmth and rain too. Don't forget your neighbours might appreciate some home grown produce, and freezing it is relatively simple. Have you noticed how fast the grass and bushes are growing? I have had little chance to mow my little patch of grass this season, but the strimmer has been working over-time.

Keep picking those dead flower heads off to keep them producing new buds. Earlier flowering plants may well have a second flush of blooms if the weather stays the same. Keep picking your beans regularly to keep the plants producing flowers, and you could be picking them way into October.

Because of the damp conditions, any dead plant material will rot fast and can rapidly kill off plants. Check around the base at soil level and keep clearing the dead stuff out. You will probably find communities of slugs and snails hiding under there as well, giving you the chance to pick them out and dispose of them. Move your planters around to get at the slugs and snails hiding around them too. They like to hide under the top rims and underneath them where it is shady.

Aphids or greenfly and blackfly have had a great summer too. Spray them as soon as you notice them as they cause damage too. A little washing-up liquid in water can be sprayed on them regularly, or use preparations specially for killing aphids. Make sure you carefully follow any instructions.

Weeds always seem to grow faster than plants. They are also producing millions of seeds at this time of year, which if allowed to fall to the ground, will cause hours of weeding next year. If you don't have time to dig them out straight away, pick of the flowering heads to stop them seeding, but make sure you go back in a few days to dig the whole weed out. Dispose of them carefully too, as some will thrive in the compost bin. Nettles, docks, dandelions, bindweed, ivy and brambles should not be composted.

Trim back those unruly climbers, or tie the wandering branches back. Most climbers benefit from a good hair-cut, but leave it for a while yet as the weather conditions are ripe for breeding moulds and other things that can cause enough damage to kill plants.

Start planning for next year now. Seeds and garden products can be found in many places at discount prices now the summer is coming to an end. Take note of what grew well this year, and what didn't do so well. Choose new varieties to try while the seeds are cheap. Work out new places to put things and new ways to grow things. Gardening isn't just chance, and your patch

can be a work of art if you spend as much time on the planning as you do planting. Look out for gardening stalls at car boot sales and fetes, you can pick up some bargains there.

Despite the miserable weather, I am pleased to see my fig trees have fruit swelling on them. Only a couple of fruits, but the first that have set on the plants. Figs form fruit buds during one growing season, then the fruits start to develop the following year. I have to admit I have neglected these plants for the last two years, but they have thrived on that neglect. It would be lovely to actually be able to pick ripe fruits off them to eat, but that will very much depend on a warm sunny autumn. I will keep you posted.

Bankruptcy and IVAs

Basingstoke CAB has seen a steady increase in the the charity for number of people seeking its help with their debts this year. your community As debt levels soar country-wide, more and more people are



having to turn to bankruptcy as the answer to their financial difficulties. The Ministry of Justice reports an increase of 5% in the number of people facing bankruptcy compared to 2007.

Bankruptcy is not for everyone, and won't necessarily resolve all debt problems. Court fines, maintenance payments, student loans will all still be payable after a bankruptcy. However, having lost some of its earlier stigma, if you don't own a home or any other significant assets, it could be for you.

While going bankrupt has become simpler over the years, it is still not an easy option. There is no quarantee that the judge will make you bankrupt in the first place. If they do, there is a lengthy form to fill in, followed by a court appearance in Reading. There are costs as well – fees of £345 for the Official Receiver (OR - the government arm that manages your bankruptcy) and £150 for the court. Some of these can be waived if you are in receipt of certain benefits. There are also interviews with the OR to work out the state of your finances and debts.

The OR takes over your finances – your bank account will be frozen, complete disclosure needs to be made about your financial position, and any assets that can be sold, sold. The bankruptcy will also affect your credit rating for years to come. The OR won't take your car if it's more than a few years old, or the children's computer, or things necessary to daily life or your work (tools, for example). The OR will work out the amount of money you and your family need for daily living using a system of allowances: the rest of your income will be paid to your creditors. Bankrupts are often discharged after a year – this means that the legal restrictions that apply to bankrupts will be lifted after a year, but the payments to creditors could carry on for longer, often 2-3 years.

IVAs (Individual Voluntary Arrangements) are often advertised as the one-stop instant answer to debt problems. In reality IVAs can be very lucrative for the companies that administer them, but are only suitable for certain groups of people.

If you have a regular income and do own a house, for example, and do not want to lose it by going bankrupt, an IVA is a way of getting round this. An IVA is managed by a company who work what you can afford to pay your creditors each month. They then contact all your creditors and ask them to agree to these payments. The company makes a charge for this service. The advantage for creditors is that they will normally get more this way than through bankruptcy. Once agreed, the payments begin and normally carry on for around 5 years. The company's fee is paid first, and only then do creditors start to receive money.

Once an IVA agreement has been drawn up, it is essential to stick to it. If payments are not made, the whole agreement can collapse and the debtor is back to square one.

At Basingstoke CAB we offer advice to many people facing debt problems. Our aim is to let our clients know of all the possible solutions to their problems, and then let them choose the option best for them, be it bankruptcy, an IVA or debt management see last month's Popley Matters article for more information on this. If you would like to give it a try, take a look at our conservation task schedule up to Christmas and contact our secretary who will be able to give you more information.



Diaries from The Old Codger

I was asked to say a bit on what I started my working life as. Well I left school at the grand old age of 14. For the first year I worked with my dad and uncle, they were floor layers. Chinham Park, John Hunt were two of the places I worked, as time went on Dad decided that the future was in mosaics, so I was off on my own into the big wide world. I received £1.17 pence in old money, about 60p in today's money. No it was not an hour or day, it was my whole week's wages and I got stopped tax and insurance. When I got home on pay day mum would split it with me, my money would only last the weekend, mum would give me money



each day and again, I would pay her back every week. This is how we went on. I don't know if dad knew about it. Well onto my job in mosaics. It was a hard job, especially murals and being on your knees all day long cutting the small cubes in order to form a pattern. My love was pictures or murals, it was a long apprenticeship. A lot of the people that taught me were Italian. When I finely got to Italy they were the first things I wanted to see. The Italians work was great and they made me work just as hard. I went through hell with them, if I did a bit wrong they would not let me finish until it was perfect. Don't get me wrong we had fun as well. At the end of the day I would crawl along the ground to the nearest wall in order to stand up. I can remember one man that comes to mind back in the fifty's, he was a street fighter, bare knuckle fighter Smiler Bush, he was great, and played many a joke on me. However I did get my own back. He always sat in the same place at night, and would take his boots off before going home. One morning I got in early and nailed them to the floor, he could not chase me as I shot out the door. I loved doing the apprenticeship. I then went on after to become an improver, that meant two more years. Mosaics have been part of my life from then, on or should I say until they decided it was too expensive to do them. Also the base of my spine wore away, I still suffer badly with that, in fact when I was about 24 they put me on a rack and pulled me, yes a rack. They used it in orthopaedics at the old Basing Hospital. When they stretched me they then put a full body cast on. I had it on for three months, boy did that stink as you could not wash that part of the body. For anyone that goes to London have a closer look around you and look for the mosaics, a lot of people just walk past them. I would love to see a lot of our underpasses done like this, they would brighten up many of them in the town. It was not just Roman's that did mosaics, a lot have been found in some form or another around the world. They come to life if you see them finished. Walk into a church and see them on the floors and walls, mosaics take all forms of shapes and are made of many things, but people still relate to the wonderful ones the Italians produced. I know that many I have done will be there long after I am gone, in fact in thousands of year's time they may even dig one up on time team. Well that was my life as a mosaic artist. Four years in collage, who in their right mind would want to go back to school? I did and again was only too pleased to be given a second chance. I had left school before I should have. I had no education in school, collage and uni are the best years of your life because after that you are on your own to fend for your self. WHAT not saying anything about her in doors this time, not on your life my head is still thumping from last month now I have the MOTHER-IN-LAW move to Basingstoke, I have two to have a dig at in time well three if you count my part time sister. All with the same broom sticks. Till next month The Old Codger


