

Basingstoke Rotary Club Golf Day to help set up Basingstoke Young Carers club.

The latest Charity Golf Day held by The Rotary Club of Basingstoke a raised over \pounds 3,000 with the active participation of Sandford Springs Golf Club and the doubling of the amount raised by Barclays' Charity fund.

Most of the money is set aside to help in setting up a Young Carers Group in Basingstoke but other charities supported by the club will also benefit.

Members of the three Basingstoke Rotary Clubs are part of a Steering Committee being advised by The Children's Society in view of its expertise in setting up similar schemes in the County. Jenny Hine, their Senior Project Coordinator for Hampshire, updated the Club on 20 October along with Lois Hutchinson who will be directly involved with the Basingstoke project.

In the past the Richard Aldworth Young Carers club has been helped but the intention is to reach all schools in the area. It is possible that there could be as many as 1,000 young careers within the proposed catchment area.

To get the scheme off the ground Hampshire County Council is providing funds for the initial work needed to work with the teaching profession to help them identify young carers and providing them with advice on providing appropriate support.

Sherborne St John Parish Council The Red Telephone Box

The matter of the telephone box opposite the Post Office came up for discussion again at the last Parish Council meeting.

As many of you may know BT wish to remove this box. However it now has temporary listing from English Heritage. These listings last 6 months and our box has just under 5 months left. As long as the listing lasts BT will keep the box operational.

If English Heritage confirms the listing as permanent at the end of the 6 month period the telephone box will remain and BT are committed to keeping it operational.

If however the listing is removed then we obviously face a new situation with a very small choice of options.

Firstly we can try to persuade BT to reconsider their decision to remove the box.

The next option would be sponsorship/adoption of the box by a local authority, with attendant costs to be met by the authority.

Basingstoke and Deane have made it clear that they would not consider the adoption/sponsorship of any of these boxes because of the logistical difficulty of the management of these boxes across the area. They feel such action would be best left to individual parishes.

This would mean that should our box not keep its listing and the feeling in the village was that it should remain then the Parish Council would have to adopt it and be responsible for the cost of its maintenance and any insurance. This would obviously come out of Parish Council funds. There is the possibility of long-term assistance in meeting the costs but this is by no means certain. The cost of proper maintenance and insurance could be up to £200 pa.

Further, adoption does NOT mean that the telephone box will necessarily be operational. To persuade BT do this would incur an even greater annual cost and we believe that there has been no more than a handful of calls in the last year.

As stated at the outset there is still almost 5 months left of the temporary listing so there is no need for any immediate panic. Even more importantly there is time for you all to let the Parish Council have your views on this matter.

Miller Zero

Miller Housing made a presentation at the meeting of their plans to build 5 houses in the middle of the latest stage of the development in Merton Rise. These houses will trial new methods of renewable energies, and insulations. Amongst the methods tested will be a ground source heat pump, communal wood pellet boiler and a wind turbine. This wind turbine would be 14 metres high and have a vertical-axis i.e. more like a helicopter's rotor blades than a windmill and we are assured has minimum noise impact!

A340

The extension of the 30 mph speed limit and the new gateway feature to the south of West End, i.e. towards Basingstoke, is to be relocated 200 yds further south on the A340. This should be in place by April 2009.

Also there are new plans for an island pedestrian crossing near the bus stop and Chapel. These have been communicated to the residents close to this and we really m need their opinions, good or bad, on this proposal.


We have enough rooms for the different age groups, so we feel this will work better.



Keeping Hampshire on track in cold weather

A new system which tracks gritting vehicles is being used by the County Council's highways contractor this winter across Hampshire's road network. The data tracking software, 'DataTrak', shows where the gritters are, which direction they are heading in, at what speed and whether they are currently spreading salt.

As soon as cold weather is forecast, over 100 staff prepare to start the regular salting of Hampshire roads to keep them free from ice and snow. Using 'Icelert' - a system which uses strategically placed outposts across the county to accurately forecast cold weather – staff will know when and where to go to combat icy roads in time for the morning rush hour.

A priority schedule ensures that the busiest roads are routinely treated. The first routes which are treated comprise 26% of the road network which carry 85% of the total traffic. They include A roads, major bus routes, and roads to major emergency service bases and large schools. Second priority routes are salted when there are prolonged sub-zero conditions. In the winter , salting is carried out approximately one night in three, and more often during colder spells.

This new tracking system will allow better monitoring where the gritters are and check exactly when and where the salt routes are being run. Being able to monitor each gritter in this way means we know exactly what state each road is in and when, and can advise drivers accordingly.

Keeping the roads safe in winter is a priority for the County Council but I would urge everyone on the roads to be more cautious in frosty conditions and remember that there is no such thing as an absolutely safe road surface. Roads are more dangerous in icy weather even if they have been salted. Salt becomes less effective when the surface road temperature drops below -6°C, although this rarely happens in Hampshire. In bad weather conditions, we all need to change the way we drive to compensate - having to scrape off frost from cars before driving is a good indicator to take extra care.

Advice and information on driving safely in winter is available on http:// www3.hants.gov.uk/roads/highway-information.htm and, in emergency weather situations, residents can check this website for updates on roads in their area affected by adverse weather.

Hampshire County Council uses wetted salt on its road network. This system uses brine which is sprayed onto dry salt as it is discharged from the vehicles. With this system the salt is a more effective de-icing agent as it goes into solution faster and remains on the road surface longer than dry salt because it is not blown around by the wind. Less wetted salt needs to be used to give the same results which is of benefit to the environment.

Take control of your driving future

The County Council's **Older Driver Skills Scheme** aims to find ways of helping older people drive safely for as long as they are fit to do so, rather than taking measures to prevent them from driving at all.

It's ideal for people who've been driving for years and want to update their skills or gain confidence; those recovering from illness or injury; those advised on health grounds; people returning to driving or finding it difficult to adapt to a new car.

What does it involve?

It's not a test – there's no pass/fail. Instead it's an informal, confidential appraisal aiming to offer help and advice, which will enable that person to continue driving with improved safety. General ability is assessed but particular concerns can be investigated. Each person is given a comprehensive de-brief and any concerns or remedial action discussed, a written report follows.

A current driving licence is required and eyesight is checked. The appraisal costs £25 and is delivered from the person's home, using their own car.

Road safety officers manage the award winning scheme with appraisals delivered by Driving Standards Agency (DSA) Approved Driving Instructors (ADI's).

LONGFELLOW PARADE: a public meeting was held at Chineham Park School on Monday 10th November, with Sentinel Housing, Mansell PLC, plus cllrs Andy McCormick and Jane Frankum.

A large number of issues were raised:

- people getting injured on paths;
- street lighting (or lack thereof);
- mud on roads;
- road safety;
- parking;
- lorries turning up too early for deliveries;
- lorry engine noise;
- lorries blocking people in parking spaces/garages;
- bin collections at 6.30am;
- lack of consultation on plans;
- unfinished work, especially in and around Shelley Close;
- parking spaces in Shelley Close with vehicles colliding when parking,;
- utility companies starting to dig trenches, then leaving for weeks at a time; and
- vandalism and anti-social behaviour in Longfellow Parade itself .

Work will not finish until 2010. We have at least another year of construction, so it is imperative we get the security, parking and access issues right.

A follow-up drop-in session is planned for Tuesday 9th December.

As it rained very hard on 10th November I will expect more people to come out and have their say.

FAROE AND MALDIVE FLATS: a lot of hard work has been going on behind the scenes to make sure the planning application will be heard at the *Development Control meeting, Civic Offices, Wednesday 10th December 6.30pm.*

The hearing has already been delayed 3 months, and any further delays could raise questions over the availability of funding (the Housing Corporation will cease to exist on 1st December. Its successor will still hand out regeneration funds for schemes with planning permission but that could soon change later in the new year. The flats are emptying out and their demolition is now an absolute must. If permission is granted, the Maldive Road flats will come down in the new year and Faroe Close will come down in 2010. We will be meeting with Sentinel's Chief Executive on 5th December to discuss the plans and push for improvements to the parking to be added at a later date. We will then hold a *public meeting at Popley Fields on 8th December*. We will confirm this with a leaflet drop nearer the time.

THE CARPENTERS DOWN SHOPS and many of the roads around them have been suffering from anti-social behaviour for at least the past two months. The police are well aware of the situation, arrests have been made, and we hope there will be follow-up action in the form of ABCs and ASBOs.

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Benefits – Are you claiming enough? Is it the right one for you?



Some 6 million people missed out on claiming

benefits last year, totalling a huge £10 million. If you think you might be one of them, Basingstoke CAB can help you.

Whether you're already receiving benefits or about to make a new claim, Basingstoke CAB can help you work out whether you're getting the right benefit and the right amount. We can do a **full benefits check** for you, including allowances for disabilities and children.

If you're over 60, you could be claiming **pension credit**. As many as 1.8 million pensioners failed to claim this benefit last year. And if you're in work, and/or you have children, have you claimed **tax credits**? You can do this online at hmrc.gov.uk. We are no longer allowed to complete tax credits forms at the bureau, but we can help you do it over the phone from the bureau.

If you are considering claiming incapacity benefit, this has now changed. From 27 October 2008, the new benefit is called **Employment and Support Allowance.** Everyone applying for it will go through an initial 13-week assessment phase. During this phase, applicants may be asked to attend a work-focused interview, complete a questionnaire on their capability for work and attend a medical interview. They will also receive a basic allowance while going through this phase.

Once an assessment has been made, those not eligible for ESA will be considered for Jobseeker's Allowance. If an applicant is eligible, they will be put into either a "work-related activity" group, or into the "support" group. Those in the "work-related activity" group will be asked to do work-focused interviews, and face losing some or all of their benefit if they don't attend these meetings.

More than 200 local residents living around Sentinel Housing Association's \pounds 15m regeneration project at Longfellow Parade enjoyed fun and games at a Halloween fun day recently.

The event, laid on by Sentinel and contractors Mansell PLC, provided an opportunity for local people to say what improvements they want to the green space off Wordsworth Close. Sentinel has provided nearly £17,000 of investment for an upgrade of the park, along with other contributions for local improvements. Residents also enjoyed a free hog roast, and there was plenty of family entertainment, including facepainting, an inflatable ride, and treasure hunt.

You may also have noticed that Sentinel is progressing with three new shops and 10 new homes in Shakespeare Road. The main shop will be for the One Stop store and Post Office in Longfellow Parade, which will be moving to the new site next Spring.

Meanwhile, there's been a worrying escalation of vandalism and violence at the Longfellow site. Mansell recently placed lights on the hoardings to help residents during the dark evenings, but vandals have repeatedly cut the cables. More seriously, Sentinel and the police are eager to trace three youths found trespassing on the site by a neighbour. He challenged them and was badly beaten up for his trouble. If you suspect anyone you know then please contact the police.

Additionally, three other youths found trespassing on the site have been photographed and identified by Sentinel and the police. Aside from facing possible criminal charges, if they are living in Sentinel homes, the whole family may face eviction. So please remain vigilant.

As part of Sentinel's multi-million pound commitment to Popley, the Longfellow project team is setting up a local resident group. This would involve attending development site meetings, security briefings, and would allow neighbours to bring other concerns to the attention of the organisations involved. Fairy Lights And Candles:

- Fairy lights make your home look festive and bright, but it is important to remember to use them safely.
- Fairy lights and Christmas tree lights don't get used very often, so you should ensure they're in good working order before using them:
 - Check that the fuse in the plug is the right size.
 - Replace any blown bulbs
- Don't let the bulbs touch anything that can burn easily, such as paper or fabrics (be especially careful with other Christmas tree decorations).
- Always unplug fairy lights when you leave the house or go to bed.
- Candles can be dangerous. If you do use them in your home, always put them out when you leave the room, and keep them away from flammable materials such as greeting cards and decorations.
- Mever place candles on a Christmas tree.
- Candles and nightlights are often used in celebrations for Christmas. They should never be put in or by a Christmas tree, plants, flowers or other foliage. You should also be careful that ribbons and other decorations aren't near any candle flames.
 - Don't Drink and Drive; Have a soft drink and stay alive!
- You can't calculate your alcohol limit.
- It takes less than you might think to become a drink driver.
- Nearly one in six of all deaths on the road involve drivers who are over the legal alcohol limit.


in her way. One minute she is there, the next gone. I know it is not fair on her as she has to do her shopping at weekends because she is out all week at work. If I go to town I am forever saying sorry to people for getting in their way. As usual Her Indoors goes mad at me, but I can't help it. I still think of the time the woman said that people like myself should not be out around Christmas time and that must be five or six years ago.

Before I go on, did any of you see our editor flying around on Halloween? I know Her Indoors was out with the mother. in-law. They all had new broomsticks this year!

Well I know you have asked me about many subjects as I see you on my rounds on the estates or other places if I go off it now and then. One lovely old dear, very sweet, asked if I was The Old Codger but I just gave her a smile. She wanted to know what part of the East End my family came from. It turned out she lived in the next street to my father and went to the same school. I told her about my mother's school by St Luke's Square, Canning Town that took a direct hit from a bomb in the war, killing many children and teachers, along with family members taking shelter in it. She knew the school well and went to the same church as my mum. She asked would I ever go back. I said I did up till I was about 20 but it was changing so much they were pulling down all the old prefabs that were erected after the war and building rabbit warrens in their place. Many areas have become no go areas and, as we see now, gangs fighting each other and young kids getting killed. So bit by bit they have changed their minds yet again and tower blocks are coming down fast, long rows of flats three and four floor stories high are now being pulled down. The idea was that they were built with long balconies so the next door neighbours could sit out side as they did back before the war chatting to each other. This failed because gangs moved in and people would not open their doors. Do we ever learn by these mistakes? No, we don't. They are still trying to build them but in different ways they are giving open space around them hoping kids will play outside. The sad thing is, especially in the inner cities, it is becoming too dangerous to let your children play and have fun. Boy, I don't think she will chat to me again. Mind you, she agreed with all I said plus a few of her own choice words. Please all have a safe Christmas, put the car keys away, let the staff at the hospital not have to tell relatives sad news after a drink driving accident comes through the doors in an emergency. PLEASE, PLEASE if you know that someone is at home on their own over Christmas or if its cold out, just knock to make sure they are safe and warm, as this can be a lonely time of year for some of them.

I know many of you do not have time but if ice is on their paths or snow, just clear it for them. It will only take five minutes and it is better than a fall and time in hospital. MERRY CHRISTMAS ALL.

Some of you may be aware that I have been on an attachment in the rural villages for the past 5 months assisting officers there with various operations and commitments. During this time I have been keeping up with events that have been occurring in Popley as well as monitoring the new builds and developments on current areas.

Popley has come a long way in 5 months and some parts are almost unrecognisable. I am truly impressed with the Bramley Fields area for both the presentation of the area and the speed it has been put up. The re-development sites in the Poets have also come along nicely and I am hoping the residents are not getting too much trouble caused by the construction.

Thankfully I was able to return to Popley for both Halloween and Bonfire night to assist with any Anti-Sociable behaviour our residents may be suffering from. With that said, Christmas is now just around the corner and one of the many roles of a Police Community Support Officer is to help residents in educating them with crime prevention advice especially around these busy times. Therefore I would ask that you please read the advice below to ensure your holiday period stays as safe as possible. Christmas can be a very hard and stressful time and I for one would not like the added stress of a holiday burglary and I am sure you would agree.

- When shopping for Christmas presents, please ensure that no visible presents wrapped or open are left in your car. This also includes bags with brand names on them. Always remove presents from you car as quickly as possible and if it is essential put the presents locked away in your boot.
- Please try to ensure that when you are transporting your presents to your house that no one is watching you take them in. Burglars still operate around Christmas and by showing them what you have just bought may tempt them.
- Please ensure that if you have any presents out around a Christmas tree for instance that your curtains are closed shut. Do not make possible burglars aware of what's in your house.
- Unless in a secure place do not discuss with friends what you have bought over the Christmas period. If people over hear they are aware of what is in your house.

- Ensure that your doors and windows are securely shut. If you have a standard door use the dead lock and chain. If you have a UPVC door please ensure the handle is raised and locked.
- If your home is fitted with an alarm please ensure you set it whenever you are out or even when you are asleep.
- Check that your buildings contents insurance covers Christmas presents left under a tree. Some insurers do not cover presents that are wrapped and left under a tree.

Consider purchasing additional security measures like Smart Water property marking and sensor alarms.

If you feel that your home is not secure or would like advice on how to improve your homes security over the holiday period I will happily attend your home and give you advice on how your home could be made more secure.

On an additional note please can you ensure that you know where members of you family, especially young children and teenagers, are over Christmas. At Christmas time there is a lot of alcohol going around which we all know could lead to anti-sociable behaviour or illness.

I hope you enjoy Christmas and the time off many of you will be receiving. I am hoping this Christmas will be very quiet and hopefully crime free.
