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

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## **Merton Junior School**

As I write this, I am listening to the children enjoying the sunshine outside playing with the recently purchased playground equipment. The fantastic games equipment has been very well used helping to support: team games, hand-eye coordination, balance and cooperation and of course to have fun with! Play Leaders (year 6 pupils) successfully run lunchtime activities for the other children. The circus items, hoppers and paired skis are very popular. Lunchtimes are very happy here at Merton, "I love the circus games – they are great fun," Emma (year 3).

This year we have been upgrading the ICT equipment in school and the children are enjoying using our new lap-tops. It allows the IT to be more flexible and targeted to better impact on learning. The children who go to Study Club all avidly log on and enjoy the experience.

As part of our Physical Activity sessions (minimum 3 times per week for 15 minutes) classes have been trying out modern dance routines, following instructions on our 'big screen' in the hall. This has been a real 'hit' with everyone raising their heart rate to support the government target of exercising each week and this type of exercise really helps cross-body coordination and memory skills. Year 6 had a 'dance off' during SATs week and there has even been the odd teacher seen taking part too!

Congratulations must go to Mrs Toomer and all the kitchen staff for a very successful Health and Safety Food Hygiene rating inspection. An inspector turned up unannounced and inspected all the kitchen and routines. Merton Junior School Kitchen has an 'EXCELLENT' standard awarded—the highest possible. The Summer term is always a busy one in school and this year is no exception. Year 5 and 6 are going to Barton Hall on a weekend residential trip. There are visits to Rotherfield Park (year 5) and Sparsholt (years 3 and 4), which will support outdoor learning; 15 children will be representing the school at the Hackwood Arts Festival; 4 children from year 5 will attend 'Peer Mentor Training' (where children will be shown how to run games, listen to their peers and to act as 'buddies' to further help all the children at Merton have happy and enjoyable experiences). We are entering 2 teams into the Science quiz at St Mark's and there also be an opportunity for years 5 and 6 to take part in Ancient Greek Myths and Legends drama course. In between all of these, there will be an Ancient Greek day; sports morning and picnic; transition day, where everyone moves round and meets their new class and teacher; Yr5 cooking workshop; athletics training; recorder and French songs extravaganza; and of course the year 6 will be hard at work practising their drama performance for the end of the year, 'Wind in the Willows'.

## Julie's Gardening Tips

I always find this time of year the most exciting for gardening. The hard work we put in is now being rewarded with young plants growing fast.

I am pleased to say I got the permission to erect the greenhouse, and it didn't take long for the response. I had already started preparing the ground for the base, but it was more work than I expected. There was a large patch of crazy paving buried under block paving which had seen better days. I got all of it removed, but then had to think about what I was going to do with all the extra stone while I laid the greenhouse base. In the mean time I planted peas, climbing French beans, runner beans and berry tomato seeds in trays to get them started, and left them outside. They didn't take long to germinate so I had to get cracking to finishing the greenhouse. The poor greenhouse has moved house many times in its lifetime, so I was very happy when I got it put together without any mishaps. I only had to cut and replace one piece of glass which was broken before I moved house. All the staging and shelving had been dotted around the garden until then, so it looked far tidier once they were all in place in the greenhouse. I sowed more seeds as soon as I could. Although it was already a bit late for some of them, it was worth taking the chance, and the vegetables I had already sown were doing very well. I have tried a variety of herbs, dahlias and sungold tomatoes (which are my current favourite).

The peas and beans were getting to the point they needed planting out by this time, and I still hadn't got any ground prepared.

I spotted some arched canes in the shop where everything is a pound, and thought they would be ideal for the peas in large planters. I did have some 8 foot canes already so decided to use them tied into wig-wams for the beans. There was quite a bit of soil mounded up from where I levelled the ground for the greenhouse, so I used the crazy paving stones and built a dry-stone wall garden. All this means is that I laid layers of stone in rows, overlapping the gaps in the lower row, and not using any cement to hold it together. I piled the excess soil behind the wall, making a raised bed near the greenhouse. I think this will be ideal for a variety of herbs once they are big enough, but this year I used the space for climbing French beans. They will be supported by canes as they grow. The runner beans were also planted in a large planter, but I scrunched up a couple of newspapers in the bottom of the pot and gave it a good soaking before filling it with a mixture of soil and compost.

I was lucky this week to be given 2 nice rhubarb crowns and a bunch of young cabbage plants too. I got a nice deep hole dug out and mixed a load of compost into the bottom before planting it. There won't be any stems fit to pick this year, but hopefully next year there will be enough for a couple of crumbles – can't wait! The cabbages will be used to fill the gaps in the wall at the base of the beans. Once the beans finish, they will be cut back to give the cabbages more space.

I managed to persuade a young man to cut my front lawn while we had a couple of dry days. I just hope it doesn't grow too fast before I can get the mower over it again. The first cut of the year encourages the grass to branch out and grow. It was already too long for the mower, so I had to use the strimmer on it. While the weather is wet and warm the grass will need cutting at least once a week, and ideally twice if you want a lush lawn. Later in the summer if we get an extended dry period, the growth will slow down unless it is watered. I am just aiming to keep it under control this year as there is such a lot of other work to get done in my garden.

My next mission is to lay the rest of the salvaged paving blocks as a path to the greenhouse, and hopefully along one side to form an area for planters. This will make it easier to control slugs and snails at the same time as protecting the lower part of the greenhouse from damage by the grandchildren playing.

The garden still looks a mess, but by next month there should be signs of flowers and young peas and beans!

Popley West: The Aldermaston | Popley East: Roundabout is at last opened and the traffic lights working. Popley Way traffic lights need to have some work on the timings though yet.

The Travellers were moved off Popley They went to Winklebury then came back to Popley and are now camped near the Viables Centre. There needs to be a better and quicker method to move them on, or permanent sites around the country where they can park up and pay a rent etc like everyone else has to. Clearing up after them costs tax payers many thousands of Road is now finished and the bus shelter floor now repaired. There will be other new paths and repairs done over the next few years. The tree survey is pressing ahead and in the coming months we should get it is not more sycamore (Hampshire Weed) with their self seeding seeds that blight so many gardens.

We do not agree with fortnightly collection of the dustbins, just to try to force residents into recycling. There needs to be a better way of doing the recycling. It is difficult to know what can and can't be recycled. The first you know is your recycling bin is left and you are then told there was something in it that was not recyclable so the bin was left. ## Celebrating a Century in Guiding

On 5th September 2009, Girl Guides around the world will begin their centenary celebrations. 100 years to the day, 1.2 million Girlquiding UK members and guests will be attending parties across the United Kingdom to mark this illustrious occasion and, in doing so, launch a year of Centenary Celebrations which will run to 20th October 2010.

Guiding has come a long way since a small group of girls stepped forward at the 1909 Boy Scout rally at Crystal Palace Park and asked Robert Baden - Powell to develop a similar movement especially for them. Since then, Girl Guides have continued to change their lives and the lives of those around them through activity, fun and friendship. Guides have often been at the forefront of helping people in conflict situations and in natural disasters.

As we celebrate the achievements and reflect on the lives that have been positively changed, we also look ahead to the next century and how we can influence the things we care about. In many parts of the world, the situation for girls and young women has improved enormously since 1909. However there is still a lot to be done to ensure that girls and young women enjoy a world free from poverty, hunger, disease, violence against girls and women, lack of education, inequality and injustice.

We will be running a series of events and activities across Popley, Basingstoke, Hampshire and beyond including Rainbows Go Wild!, The Big Brownie Take Over, The Great Guide Getaway, Senior Section Ultimates and Adult Adventures with the centre piece of our celebrations being a centenary camp at Harewood House, near Leeds, next summer. There will also be a Big Gig pop concert in London later in the year featuring big names from the music industry.

The Centenary Finale events will be taking place across the UK giving every member of Girlquiding UK, from Rainbows to the Trefoil Guild, the opportunity to renew or make their promise in October 2010. Our local event will be happening at Milestones Museum.

We have a lot to celebrate, both about the past and for the future!

GirlGuiding is alive and well in Popley with a Rainbow Unit, two Brownie packs, a Guide Unit and a Senior Section offering a range of activities and challenges for girls aged 5 - 25 and beyond!!

## ADD LIFE TO YOUR YEARS, NOT YEARS TO YOUR LIFE

Everest Health and Leisure Club are providing mobility classes for the residents of Magnolia Court and Abbey Court in Popley. The club, which is part of the new Everest Community College, is committed to working in partnership with the community to provide health and leisure to everyone.

One of the full time instructors, Terry Derrick, decided after being made redundant as an IT consultant to retrain as a Personal Trainer at the age of 63, and after qualifying was employed at the club as a full time instructor last year.

The Seniors at Magnolia Court and Abbey Court enjoy a 45 minute mobility class on Mondays led by Terry, who provides a seated session for 12 - 15 residents. Chris Scragg, Health and Leisure Club Manager, says "We know the benefits of exercise to seniors but not all of them can get to a gym or class, so we took the initiative and offered the classes to the residential homes. Terry is a great example of keeping healthy and mobile in later years so the groups can really relate to him. This is one of many community projects we have achieved in the first year of opening"

## Sherborne St John Tennis Club

## Sherborne St John Parish Council

**Logo** SSJ Parish Council is looking for a new logo and has announced a competition to design one. **Footpath** The feasibility of creating a safe footpath between the village and the Merton Rise and Marnel Park areas is to be studied. With more village children attending the Everest Community College a safer way to walk than along Sherborne Road and Chineham Lane is preferable. Possible routes for a footpath are being investigated.

**Bottle bank** The quest for a quiet bottle bank and its location are continuing. The previous bank broke the Health and Safety noise level rules, so a solution to this ongoing concern is being investigated.

**30mph speed limit** Note that the 30ph speed limit will be extended on the A340 through the village by about 200 yards. This is another effort to reduce the speed of traffic through the village. Also the Speed Indicator Device (called SID) is already installed on the A340. This will be moved around the village at regular intervals.

Seniors coffee morning A grant of £500 has been awarded from the Four Lanes Trust for transport to the fortnightly Seniors Coffee Morning at the Village Hall. This will be much appreciated by parish residents. For further details of the event (and if required there is free transport for +60s), contact Shelley Moore tel: 850577.

Rents The annual rent review called for no increases for the tennis and football clubs use of grounds and facilities. Also allotment rents will not be increased this year. There is a short waiting list of parish residents for allotments (though a lot shorter than other local areas) and investigations are proceeding to acquire additional land for this use.

Additional meeting It is proposed to hold an additional SSJ Parish Council meeting at the Everest Community College in September so that new residents of the Merton Rise and Marnel Park areas have and opportunity to meet the councillors and express their views.
