





Hello Folks,

It has been a while since I last wrote for the Popley Matters. I trust you have all been well and are enjoying living in the vibrant Popley Community.

I continue to plod on and I am still enjoying my work. You may be aware that the three current priorities in Popley are as foll,ows: 1) dangerous dogs 2) criminal damage at Popley schools 3) drugs misuse in Glastonbury Close.

I recently attended an address in Melrose Walk and spoke to a resident who had her cat attacked by a Staffie type dog. In recent months I have heard so much about dog issues and this is not just isolated to Popley but rather the whole of Basingstoke. We are currently working towards establishing set protocols when dealing with dangerous dogs, or dog owners who are unable to look after their dog or purposely cause anti social behaviour with their animals. Future proposals could see dog owners being placed on Acceptable Behaviour Agreements should they come to light on a number of occasions. If you have any information about such cases of dangerous dogs then please contact me or the team to discuss. You may have seen that criminal damage at schools and drugs misuse in Popley have been the theme for previous community priorities. These issues will always be there in some shape or form but the community has a voice and has once again chosen the priorities that matter to them. If you know of community issues, or problems that you would like the Popley Safer Neighbourhood Panel to work towards, then please get in contact. The Panel is only what the community make us and we need your continued support in order to ensure a safer Popley for all.

On a personal note I have added a string to my bow in that I am now a HLO (Hunt Liaison Officer) The reason for this is because historically Carpenters Down Woods has been subject to a number of hunts. On one occasion the hunt spilled into Popley along Carpenters Down and I am led to believe that horses ended up in some of the residents' gardens. I am appealing to those who dog walk and any other resident to let me know if they are aware of any local hunts or indeed if they see any such hunt in Carpenters Down. I will then be in a position to either attend and monitor the site and update the chain of command should there be a need for a follow up. I am still the Popley West Safer Neighbourhoods Beat Manager so don't panic!

I know I mention this every year but with Christmas coming up it is a timely reminder that, unfortunately, thieves operate in Popley and indeed everywhere! It would be wise not to display Christmas presents in the windows of your homes. Be mindful also of leaving presents and other valuables in your car. If you must do this make sure they are not in view. If you can see them then so can the opportunist thief. If you are concerned about your home security, or if you know someone who may be vulnerable in the community this Christmas, then drop me a line and I will give them a call or pay them a visit.

On a sad note, and due to an operational need, unfortunately Police Community Support Officer, Steven Smith is no longer the Popley West PCSO. He has joined the Norden team to boost numbers and offer support. I hope you will join me in thanking Steve for all the hard work he has done in supporting the team and the Popley Community. The good news however, is that a new PCSO Sarah Danks will join me either late December or early January. When she joins I will ask her to write an article introducing herself, so watch this space!


Xmas & New Year.

Fairy Lights And Candles:

- ۰. Fairy lights make your home look festive and bright, but it is important to remember to use them safely.
- Fairy lights and Christmas tree lights don't get used very often, so you should ensure they're in good working order before using them:
 - Check that the fuse in the plug is the right size.
 - Replace any blown bulbs
 - Check the wiring is in good working order
- Don't let the bulbs touch anything that can burn easily, such as paper or fabrics (be especially careful with other Christmas tree decorations).
- Always unplug fairy lights when you leave the house or go to bed. ÷
- Candles can be dangerous, if you do use them in your home, always put them out when you leave the room, and keep them away from flammable materials such as greeting cards and decorations.
- Never place candles on a Christmas tree.
- Candles and nightlights are often used in celebrations for Christmas, they should never be put in or by a Christmas tree, plants, flowers or other foliage. You should also be careful that ribbons and other decorations aren't near any candle flames.

Don't Drink & Drive: Have a soft drink and stav alive!

Councillors Page: I hope you all have a great Christmas. I have been to many meetings on the proposal to consult to close Chineham Park School. The decision on whether the consultation will start will be announced in December. The most important element is the children and what is best for them. The numbers of children in the school are low and we were told that one way of saving the school was to increase the numbers of pupils.

Like Paul, I was very concerned to read that 3,800 people and families are no longer on the housing waiting list. This seems an enormous number and I urge you to check that you are still on the housing waiting list. Phone 844844 and they will put you through or take your details, and you will be contacted later.

We are one step nearer getting safer crossings across Popley Way and I am constantly demanding that these vital crossings and paths are needed sooner rather than later. I will continue to work on this issue. Yet another accident, it is time for action!



Don't miss out on more help to pay the rent

More and more families are struggling to make ends the charity for meet and finding it increasingly hard to afford to pay your community their essential household bills, including their rent.



More families with children will now be able to get help towards paying their rent, thanks to new changes to benefit rules. These changes also affect the way pension credit is considered in housing benefit calculations.

The Citizen Advice Bureau is urging parents who receive child benefit and rent their homes but who at present get no housing benefit to check their entitlement again. The rule change also means some parents already receiving housing benefit will automatically see the amount they are entitled to go up, and more people will also become eligible for help in paying their council tax bills.

The extra money will be available to help all tenants with children, whether they live in Council housing, Housing Association property, or private rented accommodation. Some people receiving pension credit may also be entitled to extra money.

It comes about because from Monday 2 November income from Child Benefit will no longer be taken into account when it comes to calculating entitlement to Housing Benefit and Council Tax Benefit. There are also changes to the way the capital limit considered for Pension Credit is calculated.

The Citizen Advice Bureau would urge all parents in rented accommodation who are not at present getting any housing benefit to contact them or the Council's Housing Benefit Department as soon as possible to find out if they qualify for this much-needed extra help, as well as anyone who feels they may be affected by the change in capital limits in calculating pension credit.

We had a much smaller Christmas tree and dinner and little to unwrap that year but for the first time we truly unwrapped the greatest gift of all – God's true purpose of Christmas and a chance to get to know the Saviour.

Whether you find yourself in difficult circumstances in the coming weeks or joining in the shopping frenzy, may I encourage you to seek out that same Saviour and then whether it's just wrapping paper, a Val Doonican sweater or the world's most wanted gadget that you tear open to reveal on Christmas morning, I promise you will have the best ever Christmas.

May the eagerness of the shepherds, the joy of the angels, the perseverance of the wise men, the obedience of Joseph and Mary, and the peace of the Christ-child be yours this Christmas.
